Kremlin Shows Nervousness Over Growth of Chinese Reds

The Kremlin has displayed in public for the first time its great nervousness about the prospects for the growth of Chinese Communist power in Asia.

In a speech published in Moscow last Sunday the boss of the Soviet Communist Party, Nikita Khrushchev, dropped some pretty broad hints on the real reasons for the current intensive Soviet campaign for strengthening the Eastern marches of the U.S.S.R.

'GO EAST'

In effect, Khrushchev told an audience of Soviet young people, Siberia bound: "Go east, young men and women—and stay there! Marry and have big families to make the nation strong!"

As the Associated Press correspondent in Moscow cabled

through Soviet censorship, Khrushchev "did not say that Red China claims to have three times the population of the Soviet Union. But literate Soviet citizens know this and marked it well. Khrushchev told the Moscow youths they must go into the farthest reaches of Siberia to settle the land and stay there and not come running back."

The Soviet youths whom Khrushchev addressed will join some hundred thousand and more who have been in the areas of South and Central Siberia and Northern Central Asia for the last year. They, like previous settlers, will join in the "new lands" program to plow up 75 million acres of virgin lands and sow them to grain.

Until now the Soviet public statements have stressed in the

"new lands" campaign only the theme of greater production of wheat.

GLORIOUS TERMS

But Khrushchev has made clear that the questions of Soviet population and settlement of sparsely inhabited eastern areas of the U.S.S.R. which border on Communist China and the currently Soviet satellite of Outer Mongolia is as topmost in Kremlin minds as grain production.

Khrushchev declared: "If to our 200 millions of people we could add another 100 million, and even that would be too little."

He spoke in glowing terms of the opportunities for development of farming and other branches of the economy in the maritime provinces of the Far East, in the Khabarovsk region, in Krasnoyarsk district and other areas.

All the areas he talked about are along the Soviet border in Asia, with frontiers either on Communist China or Outer Mongolia, which may in the long run turn out to be an uncertain puppet in view of the gravitational pull of the Mongolians in China.

CHINESE HISTORY

It should not be forgotten that Russia once seized most of these territories from the Chinese Empire, or at least nominal suzerainty to it. It must not be forgotten that Genghis Khan once united all of them under his Mongolian-Chinese rule. It need not be left out of mind that Vladivostok was located on what was Chinese territory until recently, nor that Outer Mongolia and its neighboring area inside the Soviet Union of Buryat Mongolia were Chinese territories once.

The Chinese have certainly not forgotten these facts.

The "new lands" program is only one phase of Soviet development work in Eastern Siberia. Dams are being built, industries constructed in addition to the considerable ones already there, and extensive rail systems built.

It's all a part of a pattern. Apparently the Kremlin leaders are not convinced that their Chinese Communist allies will always be allies.

Contests Open To 4-H Youth

Three special 4-H contests sponsored by Safeway Stores will be offered in Oregon again this year, according to Burton S. Hutton, state 4-H Club leader.

They are the livestock breeding project, dollar dinner demonstration contest, and the demonstration of food preparation or preservation.

The livestock breeding contest offers \$25 4-H summer school scholarships for outstanding livestock breeding projects in counties. The 4-H Club member with the highest scoring project in the state receives a \$100 college scholarship.

In the dollar dinner contest, low-cost meals for four are prepared. State winner in the senior division receives a \$100 college scholarship, and the junior winner gets a 4-H summer school scholarship. These contests are decided at state fair.

In the food preservation or preparation contest, the award is given to a high scoring demonstration team or individual. In the county division, a \$10 award is given, and at state fair, a \$50 savings bond.

Crosby had been under treatment for the malady for about a year.
