

Women Plan Annual 'Mothers' March'

Women taking part in the annual Mothers' March from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. on Monday, Jan. 31, will be identified by white arm bands with blue letters reading, "Mothers' March, 1955."

Plans for the march are well underway, according to reports from the Eugene Welfare League, which is again sponsoring the campaign here for the March of Dimes and the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Co-chairmen of the Mothers' March are Mrs. Paul Lafferty and Mrs. L. T. Campbell. Greater emphasis is being placed on this year's fund drive because of the intense research being conducted by the NFIP based on development of the Salk anti-polio vaccine.

TURN ON PORCH LIGHT

"It is hoped that through sufficient funds, polio will soon be wiped out as successfully as smallpox, and that Mothers' Marches will not be necessary in the future," the co-chairmen said this week.

Persons who live in multiple-dwelling buildings are asked to

tie handkerchiefs to doorknobs in order to indicate that they have financial contributions to make. Everyone in the community should leave front porch lights burning during the Mothers' March so the solicitors will know where to stop.

Assisting the co-chairmen are captains for each school area, who will be aided by area lieutenants and hundreds of block walkers.

The block mothers will stop only where lights are burning and will have Mason jars or similar collection containers. Identifications are to be worn on arms and around the jars.

TRANSFER OF MONEY

Block mothers will take the money to their lieutenants, who will take it to their captains. The captains are to take it to the First National Bank or call Eugene police squad cars, except in the River Rd., Santa Clara, Willaglespie and Willakenzie areas. Mothers in those areas will call the sheriff's office.

Solicitors in the downtown Eugene area are to take their money

directly to the bank. Captains and lieutenants will keep accurate count of the workers and collections.

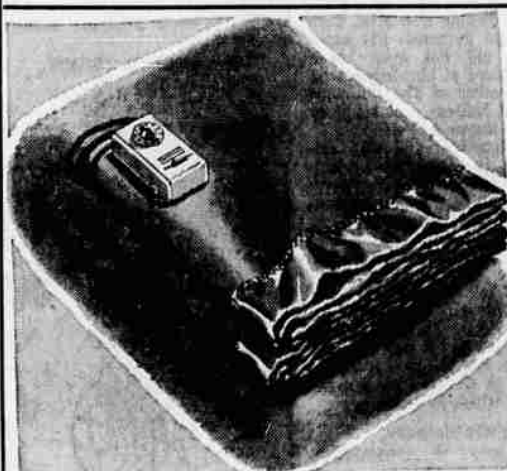
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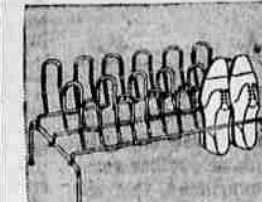
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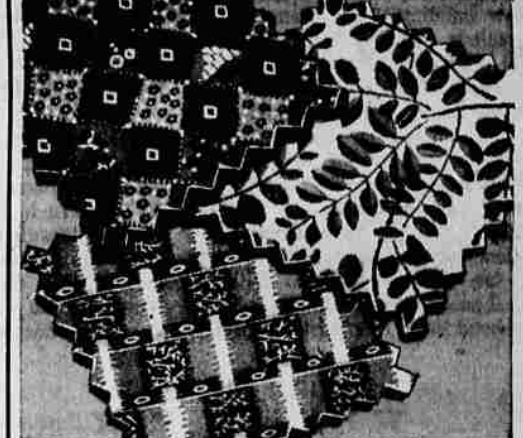
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
