

Sheppard Prober 'Finds a Few Things'

CLEVELAND (AP)—Dr. Paul L. Kirk, University of California criminologist, declared, "The Sheppard case is not closed," as he prepared to return to the West Coast Wednesday after spending three days investigating the July 4 murder of Marilyn Sheppard.

He said his private investigation was "going along satisfactorily," and added:

"I found a few things."

Dr. Kirk, who declined to elaborate, was hired by defense attorneys to make the investigation. He spent an hour Tuesday at county jail with Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard, convicted of second-degree murder and sentenced to life in prison.

Railroad Pay Increase Hit

CHICAGO (AP)—A spokesman for Western railroads has urged a presidential emergency board not to recommend higher pay scales for conductors.

Such increases would be "preferential and discriminatory," Daniel P. Loomis, Chicago, chairman of the Assn. of Western Railways, said Tuesday.

The Order of Railway Conductors has threatened to strike for upward pay revisions scaled to the weights of locomotives pulling the trains on which they work. The current rate averages about \$600 a month for conductors.

Loomis said the conductors received "the same wage increase and extended vacations agreed to by all other operating employees during the past year," and added:

"Labor disputes cannot be disposed of on a lasting and effective basis unless uniform and non-discriminatory treatment is accorded to all crafts and classes of railroad employees involved."

Hearing the dispute before making recommendations to President Eisenhower are Edward M. Sharpe, chief justice of the Supreme Court of Michigan; John T. Dunlop, professor of economics at Harvard University, and Charles A. Sprague, publisher of the Salem, Ore., Statesman.

Twins Weigh 20 Pounds; New Record

CLEVELAND (AP)—Mrs. Wanda Krylow, who weighed just six pounds when she was born, wondered Wednesday how her twins happened to tip the scales at a record 20 pounds, 4½ ounces when they were born.

She said her husband, a laborer for a house-moving firm, also was just a standard weight when he was born in the Ukraine.

Nurses, who assisted Friday when the big twins were born after a caesarian section at City Hospital, believed they had some kind of a world record. Research by Dr. Allen Barnes, professor of obstetrics and gynecology at Western Reserve University, supported them Tuesday.

Dr. Barnes checked medical records through 1950 and found the top combined weight for twins through 1950 was an ounce lighter. He said he had not heard of any set of babies being heavier since.

Mrs. Krylow was born in Poland and met her husband, Fedor, here. She normally weighs about 160 pounds.

They had one child previously, a son who weighed nine pounds, 15 ounces.

Of the twins, a boy weighed 11 pounds, 5 ounces and a girl weighed 8 pounds, 15½ ounces.

General Congratulates Australian Battalion

SEOUL (AP)—Lt. Gen. Calude B. Ferenbaugh, deputy 8th Army commander, Wednesday sent a congratulatory message to the 1st Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment in Korea on Australian Foundation Day.

"The gallant record of the Australian force in Korea is testimony to the invaluable contribution of your country to the United Nations effort against the forces of tyranny," Ferenbaugh said.

Investigators Revises Rules

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Government Operations Committee placed an official ban Tuesday on the holding of one-man hearings by its investigations subcommittee.

Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.), the subcommittee's former chairman, whose one-man hearings of the past often had been a source of deep controversy, and Sen. Mundt (R-SD), who had announced prior plans to debate the wisdom of such a ban, did not attend the closed door meetings.

Sen. McClellan (D-Ark), McCarthy's successor to chairmanship of both the parent committee and the subcommittee, had announced he would allow no one-man hearings even if his proposal to forbid the taking of testimony before fewer than two members were rejected.

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
