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Flood of Bills Introduced in Legislature

SALEM—The Senate Education Committee approved a bill Thursday to abolish non-high school districts, which send their children to high schools in other districts and pay their tuition. The tuition would be paid by existing elementary and high school districts.

Another bill approved by the committee would make it impossible for any school district to take the same number as any other district.

UNION LABEL

Sen. Monroe Sweetland, Milwaukie Democrat, introduced a bill to permit use of the union label on state printing, when it's requested by the department head who orders the printing.

State Police Supt. H. G. Maison protested to the Senate State and Federal Affairs Committee against a bill to allow dismissed state police officers to appeal to the Civil Service Commission.

He said the bill, by Sweetland, would undermine his department's discipline. Maison pointed out that officers now can appeal to a trial board consisting of Maison or his deputy, and two superior officers.

He said permitting appeals to civil service would put the responsibility for discipline in the hands of an agency that knows little about police work.

INDEPENDENT REVIEW

Sweetland argued that the bill would treat the dismissed officers more justly by granting them an independent review.

A bill to put state police under all provisions of the civil service law has been introduced in the House by Rep. Maurine Neuberger, Portland Democrat.

bills to permit the state police to use radar to catch speeding motorists, to set up a separate state parks department, and to increase industrial accident benefits.

Radar now is used by police in several Oregon cities, but the state police don't want to use it until they are sure that its use doesn't violate the state's anti-speed trap law. The bill says that use of radar doesn't violate that law.

LABOR MEASURES

The independent State Parks Department would take over functions of the Parks Division of the Highway Commission. It would have \$1,500,000 a year to spend.

Two labor-sponsored measures would increase industrial accident benefits for partially disabled workmen by about 10 percent, and also broaden the coverage by eliminating the provision that these accidents must be caused by "violent and external means." Thus it would allow payments for virtually all industrial injuries.

Sen. Rudie Wilhelm Jr., Portland, introduced a bill to take away the Supreme Court's power

to appoint temporary circuit judges.

REINSTATE EMPLOYEES

Another new bill would give the Civil Service Commission power to reinstate dismissed state employees. Now it has power only to recommend reinstatement.

Man Saves Landlord From Blazing House

PORTLAND—The interior of the house was in flames when 19-year-old Alvin Stormo learned his landlord was inside.

Twice, Stormo tried to get inside to rescue 79-year-old August Pederson, and twice he had to run back from the heat Wednesday.

Finally he threw a wet blanket over his head, and made it inside. He found Pederson lying on the floor, and dragged him outside.

Pederson, who owns the house and the nearby one where Stormo lives, suffered some burns, but hospital attendants said his condition was good. Stormo was not injured.

counties spend more money to advertise their resources, permit county courts and commissions to regulate speed on county roads, and permit the Oregon Development Commission to advertise the state's resources to attract new business to the state.

Sen. Robert D. Holmes, Gearhart Democrat, introduced a bill to abolish the Board of Control. Its powers would be transferred to the governor.

RUNS INSTITUTIONS

The board runs state institutions. It consists of the governor, secretary of state and treasurer.

The Joint Ways and Means Committee approved a bill to let the Highway Commission put 1,700 maintenance and shop workers on a 40-hour week.

Many of these employees now work 44 hours.

The committee also decided to introduce legislation to give the Public Welfare Commission \$95,000 of federal aid funds which it has been keeping since liquidation of the Federal Emergency Relief Administration.

This money was allocated to the department some 20 years ago to aid in work relief programs. The government never has asked for return of the money.

HONG KONG—Gen. John E. Hull, U. S. Commander in chief in the Far East, said Thursday he contemplated "no immediate changes at present" in deployment of American ground troops under his command as a result of President Eisenhower's Formosa message to Congress.

Formosa Stand Hit

LONDON—The Soviet government newspaper Izvestia charged Thursday that the United States is "seeking pretexts for unleashing military conflict" in its decision to defend Formosa. Izvestia, generally reflects Soviet Foreign Office opinion.
