

Oregon Tops Brigham Young 82-71; Beavers Take Third From Huskies

Webfoots Led By Loscutoff; Scores 35

Oregon's 82-71 basketball victory over Brigham Young University at McArthur Court Friday night was a personal triumph for Big Jim Loscutoff. A crowd of 4,689 watched Oregon's heavy-weight center establish a McArthur Court record for rebounds with 32 and a new Oregon record for total points scored with 35.

The new hoop rivalry between the Skyline and Pacific Coast Conference quintets resumes at the Igloo Saturday night. Game time will be 8 p.m., following a 5:45 p.m. prelim between the Oregon Frosh and Fernand Loggers of Longview, Wash.

It was a racehorse basketball all of the way, but the caliber of play was not conducive to perfection in fundamentals as both quintets were guilty of passing and ball-handling errors. But it was fun, especially for Big Jim. In Friday's non-conference clash, free-throws did not have a decisive bearing on the outcome, but Oregon's 24-9 record at the gift line was in marked contrast to the 10-20 record in the overtime loss to OSC at Corvallis last week. Even so, Oregon's field-goal margin was by only three—six points over the visiting Cougars.

LUSCUTOFF DOMINATES

Loscutoff, who missed more than two minutes of the first half and the final 55 seconds of the second, completely dominated the boards—as did Coach Bill Borchert's entire Webfoot lineup. The 77-47 team margin in rebounds set a new Oregon record, the next highest 74 against San Jose State in 1952. Loscutoff's 35 points shaded by three the record 32 collected by Barney Holland against WSC here last season. The 32 rebounds bettered by seven the record established by Bob Peterson of Oregon against WSC in 1952 and by Chet Noe of Oregon against Idaho in 1953. The point total was not, however, a new McArthur Court record, set by Wade Halbrook of OSC, who in 1952 scored 51 points for Lincoln High in the Oregon prep hoop finals in beating Central Catholic.

While Oregon's biggest man paced the scoring, the smallest BYU hoopster, 5-foot, 8-inch, 150-pound Terry Tebbis, led the Cougars with 20—and his tremendous speed and ball-handling kept his teammates in the ball game. Tebbis has been Coach Stan Watts' leading scorer this season. BYU was handicapped, however, by four fouls on their three big men—Lloyd Rasmussen in the last 44 seconds of the first half; Hersh Pedersen in the opening 73 seconds of the second half, and Ed Pinegar in the last 10:06 of the game. Only player to foul out, however, was Lefty Page, in the final 4 minutes and 35 seconds.

BYU took the initial lead when Tebbis intercepted a pass and dribbled the length of the floor to tally in the first nine seconds. Loscutoff hit two freethrows for a tie, but Pedersen tipped one in for a 4-2 Cougar advantage. Ray Bell hit two gift shots for another tie and then, with 2:10 gone, Phil McHugh, on a pass from Bell, drove "around the horn" to score and put Oregon ahead for keeps.

AHEAD AT HALF

Although Oregon quickly moved ahead by eight, 14-6, Pedersen sparked a spree that closed the gap to a single point—with 8:02 remaining in the half. Max Anderson hit three quick ones and Oregon took the intermission with a 41-31 advantage.

Virg Merrill of Drain topped all scorers with 20 points while Hatcher got 15 and Losey 14 for Myrtle Creek.

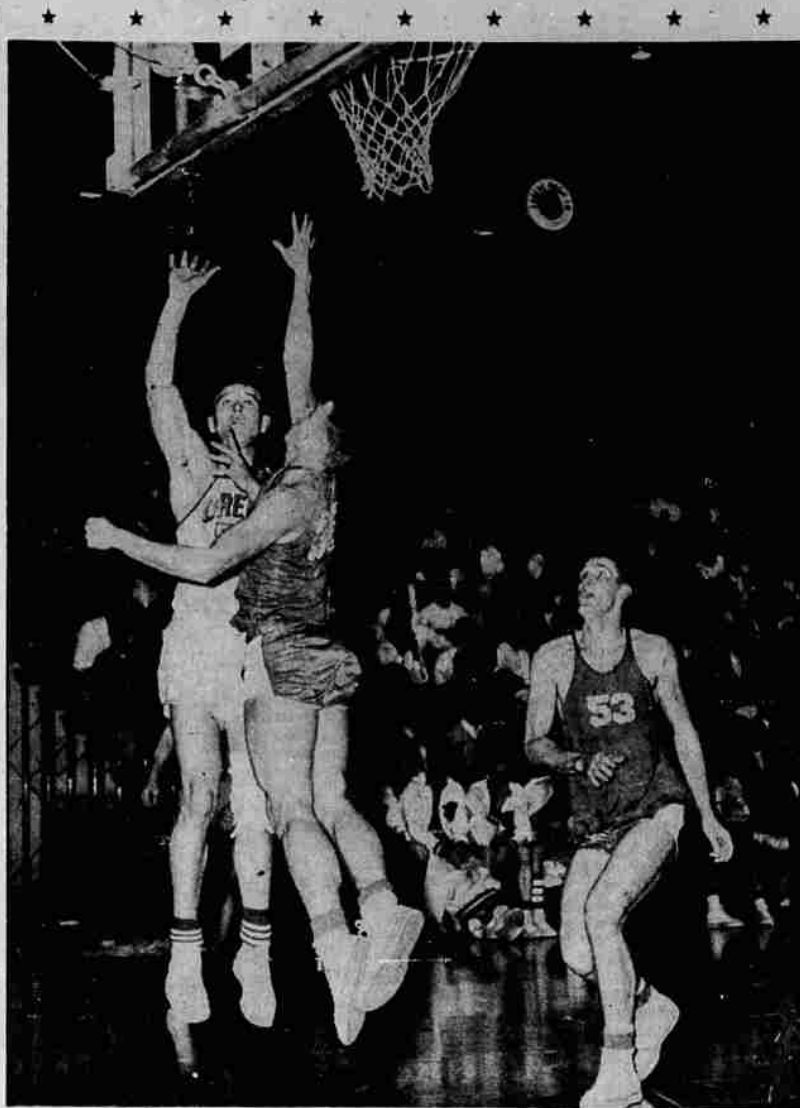
Myrtle Creek also won a close one, 44-40, over Drain's Jayvees.

Eugene Posts 95-50 Win; Willamette Nudges Grovers

Center Mike Moran collected 41 points for Eugene as Coach Hank Kuchera's Axemen roared toward another District 6 prep basketball championship with an easy triumph at Oakridge, while Willamette shared fourth place with Cottage Grove by upsetting the Lions in Friday night's league warfare.

The undefeated Axemen established a district scoring record, claimed their fourth victory, and handed Willamette its fifth defeat, 95-50, while Willamette edged Cottage Grove, 57-56, to leave each club with a 2-3 record.

Eugene 95, Oak. 50

Moran turned the game into a shambles in the fourth quarter when the Eugene Axemen raced for 35 points with the 6-8 center netting 29 counters in this period alone.

With the 90-point in sight the Axemen regulars returned to the floor late in the quarter to reach the high mark and with just seconds remaining in the contest Moran hit two freethrows to close out the scoring for the contest and raise his ante for the night to 41. This total is the second highest recorded in District 6 action. Dean Parsons, former Axeman and now with the Washington Huskies, tallied 48 points in 1951.

Axeman Bob Anderson got the Eugene scoring machine under way in the first quarter and the issue was never in doubt. Ander-

son tossed in seven points to lead Eugene to a 19-7 first quarter lead, and forward Leighton Tuttle paced the Axemen to a 37-21 half-time advantage.

Moran began to hit his stride in the third quarter, counting eight points, as Eugene moved to a commanding 60-29 lead as the final period opened action.

Despite being overwhelmed by the streaking Axemen, three Oakridge Warriors turned in outstanding performances. Forward John Shearer, besides trying to check Moran, tallied 17 points for the Warriors, while Len Tirrell and Gene Oberg had 10 and nine respectively.

Second high man for Eugene was Bud Kuykendall with 16 points and Tuttle contributed 14. Eugene made it a clean sweep by posting a lopsided 66-29 win in the preliminary contest. Roger Peter was high for the Axemen with 14, while Dan Jones had nine for Oakridge.

A tremendous, not-to-be-denied, last quarter effort by Les Wright's Willamette Wolverines pulled an almost certain defeat out of tech record books, as Bill DeYoung scored an almost impossible rebound shot just as the horn sounded.

But DeYoung simply put the cap on a sparkling performance by the entire Willamette team. A team that refused to quit and overcame a six-point deficit in the last minute of play to win.

The score at the end of the third quarter was 48-38 for Cottage Grove and the Lions had maintained a comparable lead throughout the game. Bill Shepherd, a 5'10" junior who did not start the game, launched a personal assault in the final frame for the Wolves.

He scored three times from the field and got some help from Jim Knight, another second stringer, to cut the lead to four points at 50-46 with four minutes to play.

Shepherd hit a fielder and a freethrow for Willamette to make it 56-53, then Knight tossed one in from the side after the Lions had shot and missed. With seven seconds left to play Bob Foster, Willamette guard, was fouled by Ballew and made both shots. Then Foster intercepted the inbound pass and threw a desperation pass to Shepherd.

Shepherd's shot was short but DeYoung got the rebound on the baseline ten feet to the left of the basket. Sophomore Bill twisted and put up a shot that just barely cleared the backboard and went through the net to the accompaniment of the final buzzer and a wild scream from the Wolverine rosters.

Shepherd led Willamette scorers with 15 points, all in the second half. Ron Rice had 14 for the losers.

Willamette won the JV game 56-39 but Mike Theiss of the little Lions led scorers with 14 points.

SEATTLE (AP)—A nice show of burglary by guard Bill Toole set Oregon State up for a 55-51 Pacific Coast Conference basketball victory Friday night over the extremely stubborn University of Washington Huskies.

A crowd of 10,700, biggest in two seasons of the Washington pavilion, saw the opening game of the current two-tilt series. Their victory kept the Staters unwhipped in conference play.

Toole started his burglary act late in the game when his team was trailing by four points. He snatched the ball out of the hands of the Husky player and romped in for the basket that made it 41-39 with seven minutes left to play.

Washington widened the margin to 46-41 but after Swede Halbrook tallied on a hook shot for OSC, Toole banged in seven straight points.

Everything was even at 50-50 when Halbrook—one of three 7-footers in action—caged two free throws and Oregon State went into a game-clinching stall for the last two minutes.

Dean Parsons of Washington, working an effective fake against Halbrook, led the scoring with 20 points. Toole's 15 were tops for the winners.

Halbrook at 7 feet 3 was the high boy of the game. His relief man was 7-footer Phil Shadoin and Washington's sub center Gary Nelson checked in at an even seven feet.

After a see-saw start, Oregon State jumped away to a 27-18 half-time lead and Washington appeared pretty well sunk.

But the Huskies found the range after the intermission and ran up 25 points while the Staters were tallying only a dozen in the first 14 minutes of the period. A hook-shot by Nelson gave Washington the lead at 36-33 with 10 and a half minutes left and Oregon State never threatened until Toole began indulging in thievery.

The winning Beavers lost forward Jay Dean on fouls with 5:44 minutes to go and Halbrook fouled out 8 seconds from the finish.

Tony Vlastelica, usually Washington's nemesis, failed to hit from the floor and contributed only two freethrows to the Beaver cause.

Palmer Retains Palm Springs Lead

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP)—The problem of stopping the hot-shot birdie-making of veteran Johnny Palmer faced the 41 other professionals in the select field as the third round of the \$15,000 Palm Springs invitational golf tournament got under way Saturday.

Palmer is 14 under par for 36 holes here and has a total of 130 strokes—only two ahead of long-driving Mike Souchak, former Duke University football player from Durham, N.C.

On Palmer's last six rounds, including the San Diego Open, where he finished second, he has shot 67-68-69-62-68, the latter two on the Thunderbird Ranch Country Club.

The course will be stretched out to better than 6,800 yards for the final two rounds as the amateurs completed their participation Friday with former National Open champion Julius Boros and his simon-pure partner coming home in front. They had a best-ball of 57-55-112—which is exactly 32 strokes under par.

Johnson Winner On Split Decision

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—A seldom invoked scoring rule helped George Johnson, 10th ranking middleweight, to a hairline verdict over bloody but unbowed Ramon Fuentes at Convention Hall here Friday night.

Johnson, 154, Trenton, N.J., was awarded a split decision over Fuentes, 153, the fourth ranking welterweight from Los Angeles.

The officials were widely split on the verdict. Referee Willie Clark scored Fuentes the winner, 6-4; Judge Jimmy Mina voted for Johnson 6-3-1 and Judge Nick Spano carded five rounds for each man.

However, Spano used a scoring regulation that has been in mothballs in Pennsylvania for longer than most veteran ringside observers care to remember. He gave the decision to Johnson 12 to 5 favorite—on the basis of a strong 10th round.

Creswell remained undefeated in Division 2 of District 6 prep basketball as the Bulldogs registered their third triumph Friday night with an important 55-48 victory over Pleasant Hill's invaders in the division's only game.

Coach Don Kimball's lads were leading by 40-32 midway in the third quarter when Creswell broke loose for 15 consecutive points and a permanent lead. Forward Ron Dersham, center Don Bowden, and guard Vern Bates contributed a basket apiece to reduce the Bulldogs' deficit to 40-38 at the start of the final period.

A lay-in by forward Ed Walton left the two clubs in a 40-40 deadlock in the first minute of the fourth quarter. A free throw, Dersham collected a fielder, and Bowden added another basket and two free throws. That left the Bulldogs with a 47-40 margin and the two teams traded points the remainder of the fray.

A 423 shooting pace on 11 for 26 shots during the first half had helped the Bulldogs lead by 16-15 at the end of the first quarter and 29-26 at halftime. Creswell managed only 7 of 34 for .205 during the half but stayed in the game on free throws.

Gale Cragin and Rich Ward had led the scoring attack in opening half of the third quarter as Pleasant Hill built its eight-point margin only to be blanked during Creswell's rampage.

Dersham claimed scoring honors with 18 but Bowden was right behind with 17, while Jim Bligh-ton netted 16 for Pleasant Hill.

LeRoy Jones scored 10 in leading the Pleasant Hill Jayvees to a 48-47 triumph, while Bob Rand tallied 10 for Creswell.
