

U.N. to Discuss Cease-Fire Plan

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The Western powers went ahead Saturday with plans for a United Nations Security Council meeting Monday to discuss a Formosa area cease-fire despite flat rejection of the idea by both the Chinese Nationalists and the Communists.

Communist China will be invited to the meeting to send representatives to New York to argue the case before the United Nations, which has repeatedly voted against seating the Chinese Reds as U.N. members.

Peiping Radio broadcast another tirade against the United States Saturday, vowing to "strike back with heavy blows" if U.S. armed forces "dare attack" Communist forces attempting to "liberate" Formosa.

NATIONALISTS FIRM

At the same time the Nationalists reiterated their "irrevocable" opposition to U.N. attempts to bring about an armistice in the Formosa area, maintaining that they had the right to reconquer the Chinese mainland—the same way the Reds took it—by force.

Despite the flat opposition of both belligerents, there was no let up in U.N. efforts to get a cease-fire. Sir Leslie Knox Munro of New Zealand, security council president for January, was expected to take the lead in inviting the Reds to send representatives to the debate, with India playing a prominent role as go-between.

DEBATE CLARIFIED

Munro made it clear that the U.N. debate does not involve Formosa or the nearby Pescadores Islands, which President Eisenhower has been given congressional permission to defend. He said the debate will be confined to the "question of hostilities in the area of certain islands off the coast of mainland China."

The security council meeting was expected to be taken up by the adoption of an agenda and the invitation to Red China. It has been announced that the invitation will not be vetoed by either the United States or Nationalist China. The council then would adjourn for sufficient time to allow the Communist representatives to arrive.

The Red rejection of a cease-fire was announced through the official government organ Peiping Peoples' Daily. The Nationalist position was explained in a United Press interview with a high-ranking government official.

Lane County Residents Urged to Attend Meeting of Willamette Basin Committee

With \$100 million worth of federal dam construction still scheduled for Lane County, the work of the Lane County Willamette Basin Project Committee is far from complete, committee chairman Fred Knox observed Friday.

Knox urged a large turnout of those interested in flood control and water resources at the committee's annual meeting Monday in the Springfield Memorial Bldg. "We want to acquaint people with what the Willamette Basin Project Committee is doing for them," he explained, "but we also want to know what else should be done."

QUESTIONS INVITED

He said anyone with particular problems or questions in regard to future dams, revetment structures or similar subjects will have an opportunity to discuss them at the meeting.

Yet to be constructed in Will-

amette Basin's overall program for flood control are the proposed Hills Creek and Fall Creek dams in Lane County, estimated at \$40 million, plus three proposed dams on tributaries of the McKenzie which will require an estimated \$80 million, Knox said.

SPECIAL SESSION

Monday's program will open at 10 a.m. with a special session devoted to the new Upper Willamette Soil Conservation District.

Lee McAllister, Soil Conservation Service area engineer, will discuss "Reclamation" at 11 a.m.

Mrs. Green Named To Interior Committee

WASHINGTON (AP)—The state of Oregon became represented on the Interior and Insular Affairs Committees of both houses of Congress Friday with the appointment of Rep. Edith Green, Oregon Democrat, to her second committee post.

Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, Oregon Democrat, was named to the Senate Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs at the start of the session.

Featured speaker at a no-host luncheon with the Springfield Lions Club will be Robert D. Lytle, a member of the Upper Columbia River Basin Commission.

AFTERNOON SPEAKERS

Afternoon speakers will include Kenneth W. Sawyer, state director of the Farmers Home Administration, who will discuss that agency; Harold Tower, state director of the Soil Conservation Service, who will discuss the small watershed bill; Gen. C. T. Beecher, a member of the State Water Resources Committee, who will discuss water resources; Carl Baker, a resident of the McKenzie River area, who will give a recreation report; and Col. James U. Moorhead, district engineer for the U.S. Corps of Engineers, who will discuss projects remaining in the Willamette Basin program.

Knox said two subjects which will probably be discussed by the Resolutions Committee include the proposed Cougar Dam on the South Fork of the McKenzie, and the question of whether bank revetments should be maintained by the federal government or by local groups.

Bomb Scares Said Likely

WASHINGTON (AP)—Federal Civil Defense Chief Val Peterson said Saturday he thinks there may be more scares growing out of rumors that atomic bombs have been planted in American cities—but he indicated the time still has not yet come when such a threat could be regarded as serious.

Peterson referred to a news conference to rumors Thursday night that A-bombs had been

planted in Washington, Philadelphia, and New York. These reports generated considerable excitement, but proved false.

The civil defense chief said he believed there may be more such incidents in the future, but he added:

"You cannot carry an atomic bomb in one suitcase. Some day you may be able to. You can carry the parts that way, but then you have to do some assembling."

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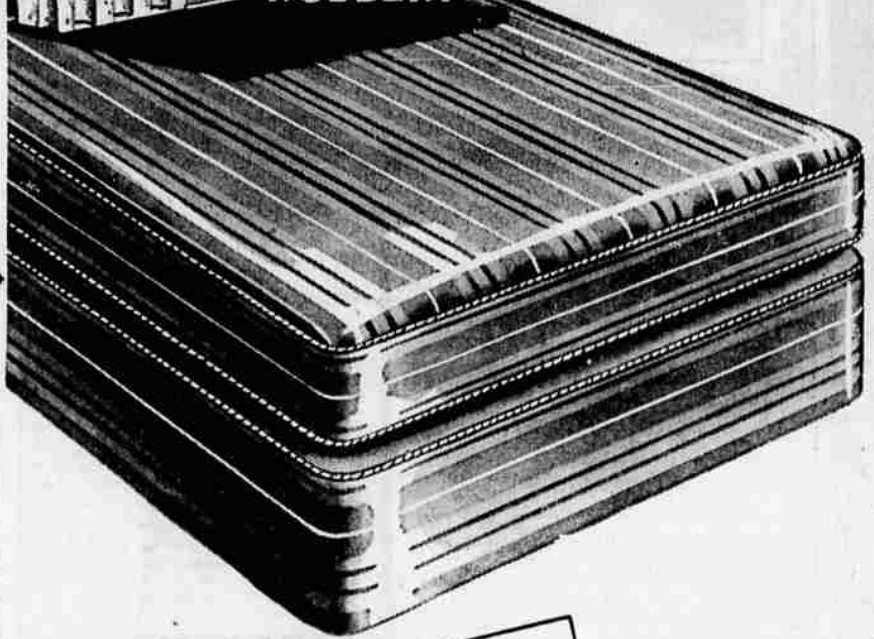
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
