Japanese Print Exhibit Opens at U of O Feb. 1

A display of Japanese block-prints in color, designed to point out how intermingled Japanese and American life and art has become, will open at the Museum of Art on the University of Oregon campus Feb. 1, in connection with the Festival of Arts which begins the same day.

The display explains the process of how a number of successive blocks, each adding a new color go together to make up the final print. Some of the tools, such as the knives used to cut the block, the brushes used to apply the paint, and hand disk for printing the picture are included in the display.

The prints were made by five American artists, who early in the present century became enthusiastic over the Japanese colored prints. They went to Japan to study the art of woodcut printing as the Japanese had been printing them for centuries.

The five artists were Bertha Jacques, Helen Hyde, Bertha Lum, Elizabeth Keith and Charles W. Bartlett. Comparative work

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Early Plays To Be Topic Of Lecturer

"The Patriotic Dialogue in Early American Theatre" will be discussed Wednesday by Frederick J. Hunter, assistant professor of speech in the University of Oregon, when he gives the weekly lecture in the Browning Room of the Erb Memorial Union on the campus.

Discussion leader for the 7:30 p.m. lecture will be R. D. Clark, head of the speech department and assistant dean of the college of liberal arts.

The period of American theater to be covered by Hunter is from 1714 to 1787. He will draw upon previously unpublished plays or plays of which only one copy has been in existence for his illustrations. Research for the lecture was made possible by the recent acquisition of microprints of these plays by the University Library.

Hunter will also show that even though the plays were not performed professionally (1787 is the date of the first professional performance), these shows did contain lively dramatic scenes. His point will be illustrated by student actors who will present scenes from the shows in costume.

Hunter's lecture is being given in conjunction with the university's second Festival of Arts, built around the theme "The American Heritage."

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Hunter Enters Innocent Plea

THE DALES (AP)—A plea of innocent to a charge of manslaughter was entered in Wasco County Circuit Court Saturday by Joseph Warren Ferguson, 39, Mosier rancher.

Ferguson is charged in the death near Mosier Jan. 29, of his brother-in-law, Charles Edwin Eaton, 29, Portland.

Circuit Judge Malcolm W. Wilkinson deferred setting a trial date.

The Wasco County grand jury

returned an indictment last week saying that Ferguson accidentally shot Eaton while illegally hunting deer in the woods about 15 miles southwest of here.

Ferguson first reported his hunting companion had failed to return, then confessed that he had shot Eaton when he mistook Eaton for a deer.

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
