Man Convicted of Contempt
Given Suspended Sentence

PORTLAND (AP)—The fourth man to be sentenced for contempt of Congress here got off with a suspended sentence Saturday. The other three had drawn prison terms and fines.

Thomas C. Moore, 42, was the last to come up for sentencing, and Judge George Boldt said Moore seemed respectful and courteous. The judge said Moore had a sincere, but mistaken, belief that he did not have to answer questions at a House Un-American Activities Committee hearing here last summer. His sentence of six months and a fine of \$100 were suspended.

The others, Donald Wollam, Herbert Simpson and John R. MacKenzie, were fined \$250 each and sentenced to 10 months to a year in jail. They appealed.

Pelton Case
Before Court

SALEM (AP)—The Supreme Court of the United States will hear arguments Wednesday in the Federal Power Commission's suit against Oregon over construction of Pelton Dam on the Deschutes River by the Portland General Electric Co.

The issue is whether the United States or the state has jurisdiction.

The State Hydroelectric Commission refused to grant PGE the permit, but the Federal Power Commission did grant a license for construction of the dam.

The state won its case in the Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco, and the Federal Power Commission appealed to the Supreme Court.

Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton, who leaves Tuesday for Washington to argue the case, said he has asked every state attorney general in the country to join with him. He said that Texas, Nevada, Utah, Nebraska, Wisconsin, North Dakota, Louisiana, Indiana and the New York Water Authority have filed motions supporting Oregon.

Attorneys for the Oregon Fish and Game commissions also are going to Washington for the hearing.

C. Z. Randall,
Attorney, Dies

PORTLAND (AP)—Charles Z. Randall, 62, retired Pendleton attorney, died in the Veterans Hospital at Portland Sunday.

He was city attorney at Pendleton from 1923 to 1931, and a district attorney's deputy in Umatilla County from 1919 to 1924.

Randall, a native of Superior, Wis., who came to Oregon when a youth, was a partner at different points in his career of the late Judge James A. Fee Sr., and William C. Perry, associate justice of the Oregon Supreme Court.

Surviving are the widow, Georgiana, Pendleton; his mother, Mrs. Lucinda Randall, Drain; seven brothers, A. F. of Drain, Ben of Salem, Kenneth of Oakridge, Burton of Roseburg, Don of Milton-Freewater, Rex of Oakland, Calif., Leon of San Diego, and a sister, Mrs. Eva Taylor of Drain.

Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

RX for Whiskey

CROMPTON, England (AP)—Town councillor Herbert Hargreaves is campaigning to have whisky added to the liquids doctors may prescribe under the National Health Service. He says "there must be thousands of sick people who can't afford to buy whisky." Under the tax-supported service, patients have to pay only a shilling (14 cents) for any prescription.

Family Affair

SALEM (AP)—Mother and daughter, sharing the same room at Salem Memorial Hospital were reported doing fine after giving birth to babies within a couple of hours of each other Friday.

Mrs. Claude D. McAllister gave birth to a daughter, Lisa Ann, two hours before her mother, Mrs. Harvey E. Gilmore, gave birth to a son, Randall Wayne. Mother and daughter are both from Estacada.

Woman Dies

PORTLAND (AP)—Mrs. Christine Moore, 71, beaten severely last Tuesday, died in a hospital here Saturday.

The beating was at the hands of her husband, Isaac D. Morse, 71, who hanged himself afterwards. Police found his body in the basement of their Vancouver, Wash., apartment, and his wife unconscious in a bedroom.

Cloud Seeding Set

HEPPNER (AP)—Ranchers of Morrow, Sherman and Gilliam counties have raised enough money to go ahead with attempts to increase rainfall again this year.

Earlier the ranchers, members of Tri-County Weather Research, reported that the cloud seeding program, under way since 1950, would be dropped because of lack of funds.

The seeding will be handled by the Weather Modification Co. of Redlands, Calif.

Vote Date Hearing

SALEM (AP)—The Senate Elections Committee announced Monday it would hold a hearing at 1 p.m. Friday on the bill to change the primary election from May to August.

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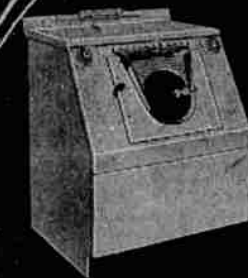
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
