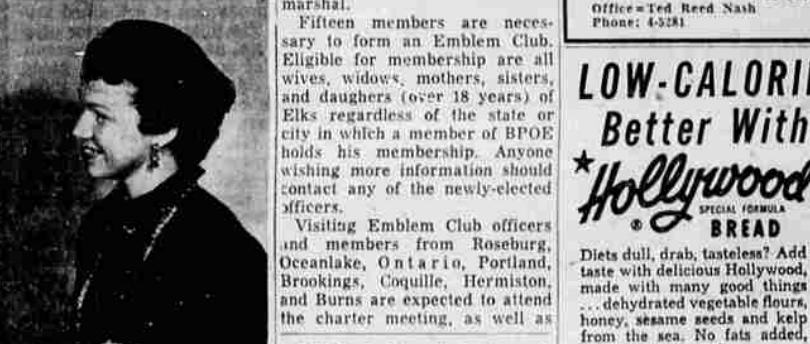

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THE CAMERA CORNER

If your camera has a depth-of-focus scale and you know how to use it, this column isn't for you. But if you're one of those many unfortunates who gets fuzzy foregrounds and backgrounds in your pictures, this is right up your alley.

Any camera lens has only one point of focus. Every thing located at this point will be sharp. But unfortunately there is a space in front of and beyond this point of focus where objects will appear sharp. This is called "depth of field." The smaller the lens stop used, the greater this depth of field.

The depth of field of any lens extends about 1/3 of its distance in front of the point of focus, and about 2/3 beyond that. Allow for this difference. If you want to picture a group of people extending in depth from 5 to 20 feet away from you, focus on the 10 foot mark. Use as slow a shutter speed as you can and reduce your lens stop accordingly. Every one in the group should come out clear and sharp.

Box cameras have a universal depth of focus by being focused at 15 feet and using a lens stop of about f16. With any camera this focus and lens stop gives a depth of field from about 6 feet to infinity. Not bad for a low-cost camera! We have a choice of these EASY-TO-USE cameras for the beginner.
