Nixon Finishes Tour; Urges Mutual Aid

WASHINGTON (AP)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon returned Saturday from a Central America tour and urged a mutual "help one help all" good neighbor economic program to protect hemispheric security.

Tanned and slimmer after a flying 7,500-mile tour of 10 republics, the vice president said the United States must explore ways to reduce trade barriers with the friendly neighbors he visited.

"They need additional investments both from inside and from outside," Nixon said. "We are often asked why the United States should be interested in the economic progress of those countries."

"The answer is simple. If their economic conditions improve, economic conditions will be better in the United States. What helps one helps all. Distress in those areas would be harmful to us."

OUR FRIENDS
"These countries are our friends. Mrs. Nixon and I saw that at first hand, in our talks with chiefs of state and on the faces of thousands of people. We must not take good friends for granted. We have not and will not."

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Diplomats, congressional leaders, and other officials were on hand when the vice president's four-engine Constellation touched down at National Airport — and most important of all to the Nixon family — their two little girls, Patricia and Julie.

They leaned over and embraced the children as they joyfully ran to them.

HOUSE MEMBERS
After shaking hands with Latin American diplomats and with senators, including Republican Leader William F. Knowland (Calif.), a group of House members moved toward him.

"Even the House?" Nixon exclaimed with a big smile.
The vice president and Mrs. Nixon flew here from Port au Prince, Haiti, last stop on his tour of Cuba, Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, El Salvador, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, Panama, the Dominican Republic, Haiti, Puerto Rico and The Virgin Islands.

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Disease Hits Dix Soldiers; Many in Peril

FORT DIX, N. J. (AP)—A 3rd soldier was stricken with meningitis of the blood stream at Fort Dix Saturday, and authorities immediately took precautionary measures to check the spread of the dangerous disease among the 40,000 men and women on the post.

One man died of meningococemia and another was flown to Walter Reed Hospital in Washington for emergency treatment Friday night. The 3rd man became ill Saturday morning and was reported in critical condition.

The latest to be stricken with the blood infection was Pvt. Michael T. Danza, 18, New York City.

Pvt. Irwin Weinrib, the first man stricken, died last month. The second was Pvt. Richard A. Robinson, 21, Norwell, Mass., who was taken to Washington in critical condition Friday night.

Capt. Tom Hamrick, Fort Dix public relations officer, said that as soon as Danza's case was diagnosed, post doctors began distributing sulfa dione among all the personnel and their families. Each soldier and civilian employee is getting four half-gram tablets of the drug within a 12-hour period.

All unmarried troops were restricted on the post until they had taken the prescribed dosage of the drug. Married men were allowed to take their medicine to their homes off the post.

Multnomah District Bill To Be Argued

The bill to divide counties into districts for purposes of electing state representatives will be discussed Monday at a public hearing in Salem. It will be at 11 a.m. before the Senate State and Federal Affairs Committee.

The bill (Senate Bill 6) as originally introduced would have divided the state's three largest counties for representation.

Since then Lane and Marion Counties have been dropped from the bill. Only Multnomah remains in it.

Lane County Democrats, however, want Lane put back. They have indicated that they may appear at the hearing to explain their reasons.

Idaho's Legislature Quits, and Is Praised

BOISE, Idaho (AP)—The Idaho Legislature ended its 1955 session Saturday two days late. It was praised by Gov. Robert E. Smylie for having held the line on expenditures and for balancing the budget with a 9-million dollar general fund tax increase.

Smylie, who received virtually everything he asked for 62 days ago, went before a joint session shortly before noon to praise the legislators for their bipartisan approach.

More Border Murders Charged

GAZA, Egyptian-Israeli Frontier (AP)—Arab-Israeli tension which has threatened the peace of the Middle East, erupted Saturday in new violence on the Israeli-Jordanian frontier.

Jordan charged before the mixed armistice commission in Jerusalem, that 5 Jordanian Bedouins were murdered by Israeli troops Friday night.

SNEAK ATTACK

Israel charged Syria with a less serious frontier violation near the Hagovrim settlement where, it said, shots were fired from Syrian positions wounding 1 of 2 workmen on a waterworks project in upper Galilee. Israeli reinforcements returned and silenced the Syrian fire, the Israeli complaint said.

The commission already is considering Egypt's charges that an Israeli army unit on last Monday night staged a sneak attack on an Egyptian military post in this Egyptian frontier area, killing 42 Egyptians and wounding 29.

The situation here was so danger-packed Saturday that families of the United Nations truce team—including one American woman—were evacuated from the Gaza area.

Egypt charged that Israeli artillery opened fire during the night on a 2nd Egyptian military outpost, but inflicted no casualties.

The evacuation of U.N. families was ordered as a precaution against their becoming involved

and possibly being wounded or killed in such clashes.

U. N. officials identified the American who was evacuated as Mrs. Pierre Dubet, formerly of Geneva, Ill. She is the wife of a Belgian civilian radio operator.

COUNTERS CHARGE

Israel, which has denied the Egyptian charge of responsibility for the bloody Gaza battle, also countered the Jordanian charge of an unprovoked attack in Jordan territory on the opposite side of Israel.

Jordan told the mixed armistice commission its nationals were cut down deliberately in retaliation for the deaths of a young Israeli couple Israel claimed was murdered two weeks ago.

Zoning Issue On Rail Line Is Coming Up

A decision on a request for rezoning a portion of land along the Southern Pacific Brownsville line in Springfield will face the Springfield Planning Commission Monday night.

The commission delayed its decision last month to obtain further opinion on the request, which was made by the McFarland Lumber Co. The firm wants the land rezoned from residential classification to warehouse use so it can sell a site for a warehouse.

At last month's meeting, several members of the commission said they felt the issue goes beyond the McFarland request to what the future of the whole area along the railway line should be.

The commission will meet at 8 p.m. at the city hall.

the towns became critical.

Dr. Jerry Eaton, seismologist at National Park Observatory atop Kilauea, said, "The quakes continued in a manner peculiar to eruptions." Eaton said a man whom he trusts reported seeing a characteristic pink glow in the sky, which usually precedes an eruption.

"It appears that there is an eruption somewhere between Kilauea and Kapoho in the Chain of Craters area," Eaton said. The area is rugged and mostly inaccessible. The land is pockmarked by old and ancient lava flows and craters.

The eruptions area was hit by local thunderstorms during and immediately following the new quakes. These made it impossible to spot any eruptions, from the air.

If the eruption occurred in the suspected area it might possibly send lava cascading quickly to the coast, a 20-mile course which drops rapidly from more than 3,500 feet to sea level.

The area contains at least 10 big pit craters ranging toward

the sea, some of which were active as late as the 1920's.

With word of possible new eruptions, Gov. Samuel Wilder King announced that he was leaving Honolulu for a second inspection of the volcanic area, with the thought in mind of issuing an emergency declaration which would call all government and military agencies into play in helping to meet the disaster situation.

Earlier the authorities ordered the evacuation of all residents of Pohoiki, where a steady flow of lava toward the town threatened it with fiery destruction.

Baby, Swallowing Toy Balloon, Dies

PORTLAND (AP)—Nine-month-old Michael W. Blenkinsop died in a hospital Saturday while undergoing surgery for removal of a toy balloon which he had tried to swallow.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald W. Blenkinsop, Portland. Michael's was the second Portland death attributed to swallowing a balloon in less than a month.
