

Israel Held Responsible For Attack

U.N. Group Charges 'Brutal' Aggression

JERUSALEM (AP)—Israel has been charged by the U.N. Mixed Armistice Commission as a "brutal" aggressor who deliberately attacked Egyptian forces in the Gaza Strip a week ago.

The armistice group said the bloody assault, in which 38 Egyptians and 8 Israelis died, violated the 1949 Palestine truce agreement.

The commission's ruling Sunday heightened speculation at U.N. headquarters in New York that the Security Council would vote similar censure against Israel when it takes up the explosive issue again next week.

Maj. Gen. Edson L. M. Burns of Canada, U.N. Palestine truce chief, was expected to leave for New York in a few days to give the Security Council a personal report on the Gaza incident, which has strained relations in Palestine to the breaking point.

At Sunday's meeting on the Egyptian-Israeli border, the truce commission adopted an Egyptian resolution declaring the Gaza attack Feb. 28 "was committed by Israeli regular army forces against an Egyptian regular army force." It was carried over Israel's objections by the votes of the Egyptian delegation and the U.N. chairman, Commandant Francois Geicomaggi of France.

At the same time the commission brushed aside an Israeli counter complaint that an Egyptian unit had ambushed an Israeli patrol, starting a running fight that took the Israelis into Egyptian territory. This complaint was killed when the Egyptian delegation voted against it and Geicomaggi abstained.

Israel appealed the condemnation decision to a special committee headed by Burns, who was not present at the 8-hour meeting. At its initial meeting on the Gaza incident last Friday, all the Security Council's 11 member except Russia denounced the affair. Russia remained silent. Most indicated they blamed Israel and voiced sympathy for Egypt.

Winter Chill Rolls South

A late winter chill covered the nation east of the Rocky Mountains Monday and rolled into the South as far as Northern Georgia and Northern Texas.

It whetted to a knife edge the vigorous winds in some sections and brought scattered falls of rain and snow, ranging up to .57 of an inch at Cape Hatteras, N.C., and three inches of fresh snow at Caribou, Maine.

Only the Deep South, the Far West, Southwest, and scattered sections along the Atlantic Coast escaped.

The cold was most intensive over Minnesota, the Dakotas and Wisconsin, but temperatures in the 30s were recorded along a line running from Northern Georgia to Northern Texas. Early morning readings were in the 20s in the Rockies and Northern New England, in the 60s in Florida, and ranged from the 50s in Southern California to the 30s in Washington.

The Ohio River, swollen by heavy rains Sunday over tributary watersheds in West Virginia and Kentucky, menaced lowlands between Pomeroy, Ohio, and Louisville, Ky.

Press Rumors Still Link Margaret, Townsend

LONDON (AP)—Persistent press rumors that Princess Margaret will wed divorced air ace Peter Townsend got unexpected support Monday. A big circulation tabloid carried an interview with the RAF group captain indicating there may be something to the stories.

British papers first dropped hints that Margaret was in love with Townsend—more than 15 years her senior—2 years ago when he was an equerry in the royal household and they were frequently seen together at social functions.

The reports died down a short time later after Townsend suddenly was whisked off to Brussels as air attache at the British Embassy. Since then, as far as the British public knows they haven't met.

STILL ALIVE
But 2 big Sunday papers—the People and the Pictorial—asserted this weekend that the romance is still very much alive and that the matter will soon come to a head.

Monday the Mirror, which is under the same ownership as the Pictorial and has a circulation of 4½ million, carried an interview with the 40-year-old Townsend in Brussels which gave the impression the stories had some basis.

'DON'T QUOTE ME'
Mirror reported Howard Johnson said he told Townsend that the Pictorial had commented that if Margaret "places above all the man she loves, then she need fear no enduring rebuke."

He quoted Townsend as replying, "That is nice to hear."

Johnson said he also told Townsend the Pictorial had predicted there soon would be an announcement from Buckingham Palace.

In a statement prepared for the Yugoslav Parliament and broadcast by the Belgrade Radio, Tito said: "Well equipped institutes have been founded in Belgrade, Zagreb and Ljubljana for nuclear research... Yugoslavia has ample raw materials for exploitation of nuclear power for peaceful industrial purposes and it is in the position directly to undertake work toward the generation of nuclear power."
