

Playoffs Slated For Volleyball

Playoffs will start at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday on Roosevelt Junior High School courts to determine champions in Major and Minor divisions of Eugene's city volleyball league.

League schedules for the season were divided into halves and the winner in each half will compete in a best-of-three playoff for the titles. Three games are scheduled Tuesday in each division playoff and the team that wins two of the three will earn one point.

The playoffs will resume a week later and the first week's winner could claim the division crown by again winning two of three games for the necessary second point. If Tuesday's loser wins the second round, a third round would decide the championship.

Hale Kane and Hyland Lumber will clash for the Major title, while Active Club and Eugene Planing Mill No. 2 will meet for the Minor crown. Hale Kane won the second-half race with a 13-2 record after Hyland Lumber was first-half winner, while Active Club finished the Minor second half with a 5-0 mark and the Planing Mill outfit was tops in the first half.

The Paddock's Rex Davis is far ahead in total points with 250 in 12 games but Holland still owns the best average with 184 points in 9 games for a 20.6 pace.

Makes the Los Angeles Coliseum and Chicago Soldiers Field look like hush-league ball parks. And remember, these people had less than 20 years ago a 3-year Civil War that just about wrecked the country. The inside pitch of the stadium at Madrid is so steep that at first you get dizzy looking down on the playing field—that literally appears underneath you.

"And brother, they play hard, fast and rough! No protection except plastic shin guards. Yet, no one was knocked out. Those who get knocked out are some of the hysterical spectators. They have a regular brigade of stretcher bearers to carry out fans overcome with excitement.

"Here is a gimmick we might try out in the States. There is no loudspeaker rasping at you. There are 4 or 5 other games going on at the same time in other parts of Spain. The local spectators are interested in their progress. On top of the stadium is a huge scoreboard, showing the scores in progress. The scoreboard is so coded to the printed program as to shorten the needed space.

"It was about 40 degrees with a chilling wind blowing down from the snow-covered Guadarama Mountains. At halftime the hucksters came out with bottles of cognac and poured out stiff jolts into small paper cups at 8 pesetas (20c) per snifter. Not a bad idea! Most of the top players are Basques, who know their soccer as well as their Jai Alai. It looks as though bullfighting is now running a poor second to futbol.

"Who won? Naturally Madrid, 5-1, with obvious help from partisan referee. But next week play will be in Barcelona and I'll bet you 2-to-1 Barcelona takes them because the referee will be a hometown boy—really the 12th man on any local team."

★ Art Litchman has dug up some interesting statistics on the year-by-year performances of Roger Bannister, John Landy and Wes Santee as compared to Oregon's Bill Dellinger. . . .

At 17, Bannister was 4:52, Landy 4:58.9, Santee 4:30.9 and Dellinger 4:28.5. At 18, Bannister 4:24.6, Santee 4:26 and Dellinger 4:30.8; at 19 Bannister 4:17.2, Santee 4:18 and Dellinger 4:10.6. . . . Landy did not run again until he was 21 and at that age he ran 4:14.6. At 20, Bannister ran 4:11.1 and Santee 4:08.0. . . . Last year Landy, at 24, ran 3:57.9; Bannister, at 25, ran 3:58.8, and Santee, at 22, ran 4:00.6. . . .

Bill Bowerman figures that Dellinger will not reach his peak this season until June and that about mid-April he will be satisfied with 4:20. . . . The National Track-and-Field publication recently ranked the top 50 milers in the world, ranking Dellinger only 35th, but 5 of the runners outranking him have been beaten by the Webfoot. . . .

A couple of bakers, Mr. Robert Hamilton of Eugene and Mr. Buchanan of Seattle, will have vital interest in a basketball game at Eugene High Monday night. . . . Hamilton, who produces the Spudnut in Eugene, is a coach of the Martin Signs quintet. Buchanan, owner of 1 of the big bakeries in Seattle, is sponsor of the Buchanan Bakers who play the Martins for the Northwest AAU championship at 8 p.m. Monday—with a berth in the National tourney at Denver in the balance. . . .

One of the strong rooters for the Eugene entry will be Bill Williams, who wrote Buchanan a cute letter last year when the Seattle quintet enticed Ken Wegner and Ed Halberg, both Oregon varsity players, to play for Seattle rather than the Eugene team.
