Youth Leaders Mull Social Activity of Youth Problem

"Examination of social activities of youth must be a continuous process by parents, schools and recreation groups," according to Erwin Juilfs, assistant superintendent of school district 4. Mr. Juilfs was moderator of a panel discussion on "The Social Development of Students and What Part Schools Should Take in This Development" at the February meeting of Eugene Council of Parents and Teachers.

Speakers were Mrs. Loyd (Frederica) Coons, teacher at Woodrow Wilson Junior High School; Mrs. Jack Edwards, supervisor of Washington Park Recreation Center; Miss Nina Kitts, dean of girls at Eugene High School; Charles Wilbur, teacher at Colin Kelly Junior High School, and Mrs. J. Don Smith, president of Eugene YMCA.

Mrs. Coons, co-sponsor of social activities at Wilson, told of school parties and extra-curricular activities of clubs during the week. She said the biggest problem was the large enrollment, 770 students, of which only a minority engage in club work, and of the large number who do not attend school parties.

Mr. Wilbur of the social committee at Kelly, explained school parties and the code party set up by students, who average 80% in attendance at school parties. He described extra-curricular activities and ascribed the small number of clubs to lack of time for teachers to sponsor clubs.

Gilbert Sprague, principal of Cal Young Junior High School, spoke extemporaneously of the social program of this school which is very similar to that of Kelly and Wilson. Miss Nina Kitts of Eugene High School lamented the fact that only about 300 students of the 2700 enrolled take part in extra-curricular activities which are carried on at activity period at school, as well as in homes of students.

"We have slipped from the sophisticated to the unsophisticated while I've been at Eugene High School," she said. "We've only had one dance this year, at the request of the students, since they plan the parties." The biggest problem at Eugene High is for students to get acquainted, Miss Kitts reiterated.

Mrs. Edwards rescribed activities carried on for students through Eugene Park and Recreation District. She said that

dances for junior high students had not been successful, but that the arts and crafts program carried on in conjunction with athletic programs is most successful.

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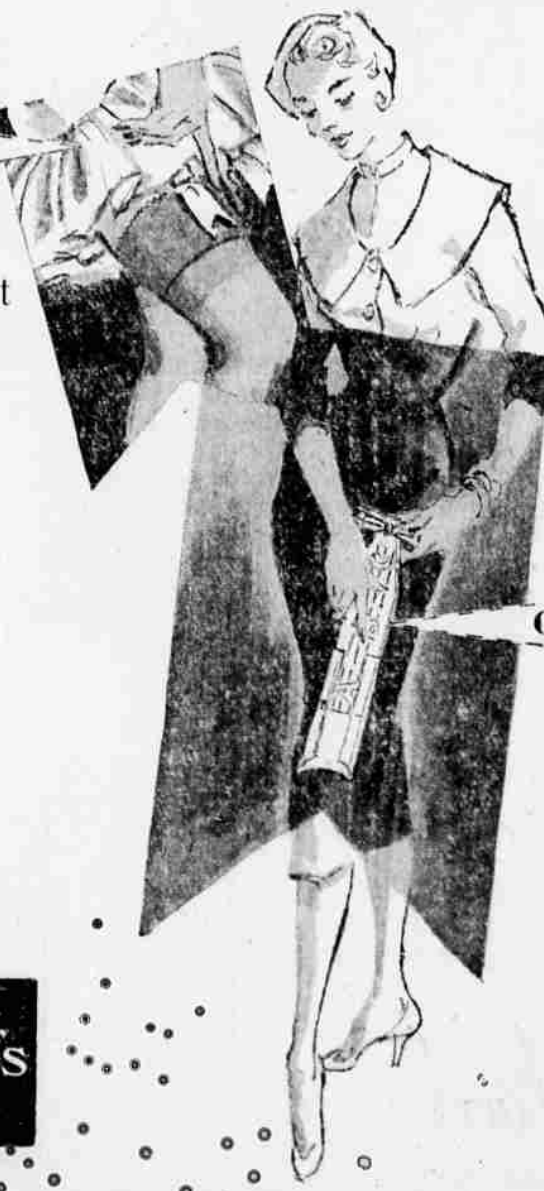
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
