

Singers Preparing For Spring Tour

Forty-five University of Oregon students are currently preparing for the annual University Singers spring tour. The first performance will be a Sunday concert, March 20, in the First Baptist Church in Portland.

The students in University Singers are selected from the entire university enrollment on the basis of quality of voice, vocal ability and general musicianship. The group annually presents musical programs for audiences throughout Oregon. The director this year is Max D. Risinger, assistant professor of music. This is the group's ninth year.

Driver Courses Cut Insurance For Students

Boys and girls who have successfully completed approved high school driver education can now enjoy a 10 per cent reduction on their car insurance, according to an announcement just made by the National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters.

Members of the underwriters are stock insurance companies. The ruling is effective in 29 states and the District of Columbia. Similar rate reduction plans for graduates of high school driver training courses have been in effect in recent years by several insurance companies, including some operating in Oregon.

According to William G. Carr, executive secretary of the National Education Assn., driver education has helped to bring about a reduction in the number of deaths per hundred million miles of vehicle travel from 15.6 in 1933 to 7.1 in 1953. High schools of the nation first began to teach driver training in 1933. Carr praised the standard driver training course as a low-cost bargain that pays dividends in human life and happiness far beyond the dollars and cents investment.

Eugene and Springfield High Schools offer the driver training course.

Library Association Accepting Applications

Applications are being taken for the Marcia M. Hill Scholarship of the Oregon Library Assn., according to Eleanor Ahlers, chairman of the OLA's recruitment and scholarship committee.

Miss Ahlers is also assistant professor of library science at the school of education, University of Oregon.

For many years the library profession has been attracting too few candidates, although the demand for librarians is increasing constantly, said Miss Ahlers. To encourage librarianship as a career, the OLA has set up the Hill scholarship.

This consists of \$150 to be used for a year's study at the

University of Washington school of librarianship. The award is given each year to the person who shows outstanding promise and interest in this field.

Candidates must have completed 4 years of college, satisfied the entrance requirements of the U. of W., and indicated an intention to take a library position in Oregon for at least a year after receiving the library degree.

The scholarship is made possible by donations of library friends and librarians of Oregon. Application blanks may be obtained from Miss Ahlers at Eugene.

Access Plan Would Permit Log Salvage

WASHINGTON — A Senate Appropriations subcommittee was told Friday that the Bureau of Land Management wants to spend \$2,480,000 in the next year on access roads to salvage fallen and bug-infested timber in Western Oregon.

Edward Woolzley, bureau director, said the timber, most of it blown down in a December, 1951, storm, is a breeding place for insects which will spread to green timber if not removed.

T. M. Tyrrel, Portland area range and forestry officer, said the appropriation would make it possible to salvage next year 400 million of the nearly 2 billion board feet of salvage timber in the Oregon-California Land Grant area.

Although he said the timber will retain some market value for many years, he estimates that losses the first 5 years will be 25 per cent of the volume and 25 per cent of the value.

Pleads Innocent

Donald Benton Morgan, 20, of 1850 River Rd., pleaded innocent Saturday morning in Municipal Court to a charge of disorderly conduct. The trial probably will be set for some time in April. Morgan was arrested by Eugene police Thursday noon.

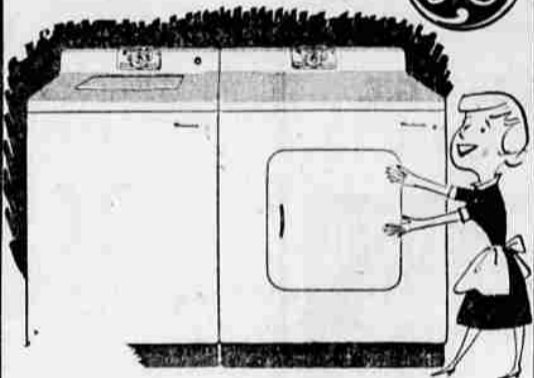
