Hatoyama Remains Japanese Premier

TOKYO (AP)—Ichiro Hatoyama was reelected Prime Minister late Friday night by the new Diet (parliament) after a coalition of rival Conservatives and Socialists defeated his candidates for speaker and vice speaker of the powerful lower house.

Hatoyama's reelection never was in serious doubt, but former Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida's Conservative Liberal Party teamed up with both right and left wing Socialists to make inroads upon Hatoyama's control of the Diet.

Yoshida thus was repaying in kind the coalition which Hatoyama's equally conservative Democrats formed with the Socialists last fall when they toppled the Yoshida Cabinet.

Hatoyama received 254 votes. Left Socialist Mosaburo Suzuki got 160. Four of the 418 Diet members present cast blank ballots.

After the surprising Liberal Socialist coalition blocked installation of Hatoyama's lieutenants in key house positions, the Diet recessed, delaying a vote on Prime Minister. It resumed after Liberal Party officials said they would go down the line for Hatoyama, as they had pledged.

The depth of the split that developed among the speakers of the House still could not be determined.

This system would be almost entirely a federal responsibility. The bonds would be paid off in 30 years with proceeds from the federal gasoline tax.

Byrd said the agency set up to float the bonds would be a "dummy corporation," adding "the proposal is incapable of honest federal bookkeeping and accounting."

Byrd proposed repeal of the 2-cents-a-gallon federal gasoline tax, as the state governors have urged, so that the states can add it to their present levies.

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The seriousness of the 5-day-old walkout was pointed out to the President Thursday by Kentucky Gov. Lawrence Wetherby. He asked that the Railroad Emergency Board be reconvened or a new board named "to find the facts."

In Washington, Presidential Press Secretary James C. Hagerly said the White House is watching the situation. He indicated, however, nothing would be done while the National Railway Mediation Board is trying to settle the dispute.

L&N President John E. Tilford said he was ready to put the issues before an emergency board, but a spokesman for the 10 striking AFL unions of non-operating workers said he "could not be sympathetic with such a course."

George E. Leighty issued his comment in Nashville, Tenn., where he was conferring with Francis A. O'Neill Jr. of the mediation service.

After canceling all passenger schedules, the L&N imposed an embargo on livestock and perishables moved over the 4,737-mile system. Solons Quiz Army Officers About Peress

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate investigation subcommittee called Irving Peress' former Army supervisor Friday to tell what he knows about the New York dentist's promotion and discharge.

The witness, Lt. Col. Ruluff Leverich, was chief dental surgeon at Camp Kilmer, N. J., when Peress was stationed there.

ARMY RED TAPE

The subcommittee is seeking to unravel Army red tape surrounding Peress' promotion to major and his subsequent honorable discharge after he had refused to answer questions about alleged Communist connections.

Lt. Col. Chester T. Brown, a Camp Kilmer intelligence officer, testified Thursday he had noted on Peress' promotion request papers that the dentist was "suspected of disaffection," and recommended the advancement be discontinued.

"It seemed to me impossible that the promotion would go through," Brown said.

MAJOR PROTESTS

Maj. Vernon McKenzie of the surgeon general's office here said he also protested promoting Peress and some 700 other officers without consideration of their security status, but the promotion went through.

Chairman McClellan (D-Ark) told reporters he hopes for a windup of the hearings next Friday, after 3 days of testimony by Army Counselor John G. Adams, Secretary of the Army Stevens and Brig. Gen. Ralph W. Zwicker, former commanding officer at Camp Kilmer.

Cain Lashes Octopus-Like Security Setup

Hits 'Prostitution' Of 5th Amendment

WASHINGTON (AP)—Former Republican Sen. Harry P. Cain Friday blasted as "octopus-like" the government's personnel security program and said "we have built our systems faster than we could control them effectively or fairly."

Now a member of the federal Subversive Activities Control Board, Cain also assailed "some in authority" who use the term Fifth Amendment Communist with its "power for destructive evil."

In an address prepared for the seventh annual conference on civil liberties, he termed a "bulwark of freedom" the Fifth Amendment guarantee that a person may not be compelled to testify against himself.

"We should be less concerned," he said, "by the few who hide behind the privilege without justification and much more concerned by those who trifle with and prostitute its significance."

Cain, a former senator from Washington, did not name in his prepared text specific persons in authority as his targets.

"When some in authority refer to Fifth Amendment Communists," he said, "I shudder because of the lack of understanding and power for destructive evil which is inherent in those statements. One who refuses to testify against himself may be a Communist but there are solid and proper reasons why he may not be."

Those who use the term, he said, are as guilty of disrespect for the Constitution as any Communist could be.

Centuries of inquisitorial tortures, mental and physical, and misgivings over man's inhumanity to man," Cain said, "forged and tempered the bulwark of freedom that the individual shall not be required to convict himself."

Cain drew a bead on the employee security program for the second time in 2 months. He called for:

- Appointment of a distinguished, nonpartisan commission to work out consistent, uniform standards and procedures and to annul "the marriage between security and politics."

- Training schools "of the highest order" for persons who deal with "the preciousness of another's reputation."

- An end to suspensions in advance of a hearing.

- Government legal assistance in security risk cases.

- Power for security boards to subpoena witnesses to help them reach "decisions which are firm and just," without need to rely on "a lot of guessing."

- Elimination of what he called contradictions among security systems for the bulk of government workers, for the atomic energy program, and for industries doing defense work.

- Determining loyalty and integrity on the basis of a person's record since 1947 instead of going back farther into the past. The attorney general's list of subversive organizations was started in 1947.

Pat Ward Tells of Life Before She Met Jelke

NEW YORK (AP)—Ex-call girl Pat Ward, breaking down in sobs at times, has testified she had sex relations and visited bars and night spots at the age of 16—before she met Minot F. Mickey Jelke.

Defense counsel emphasized also that she knew at least 2 notorious procurers before she met the oleomargarine heir.

And Jelke's counsel obtained a concession from the prosecution's star witness that she doesn't know how many men she had relations with during the period she associated with Jelke.

A tearful breakdown by the 21-year-old brunette Thursday caused an early overnight adjournment of Jelke's trial on a charge of recruiting her for a society prostitution. She was being cross-examined by defense counsel George Washington Herz about an illegitimate child she bore at the age of 17, before she met Jelke.

The witness mentioned some well-known names when asked about men she knew.

None of the well-known men she mentioned from recollections of her teen years was represented as anything more than a casual acquaintance and there was no suggestion that any were among her vice clients.

During cross-examination about her illegitimate child, Miss Ward said that during her pregnancy a Broadway press agent, Joe Moore, gave her \$50.

Power Contract Okayed by FPC

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Federal Power Commission Wednesday approved a power-exchange compact between the Bonneville Power Administration and the Idaho Power Co.

The 20-year power-exchange contract calls for the company to spend three million dollars for a 50-mile transmission line from Baker to LaGrande, Ore., to connect with Bonneville lines.

Fourth Girl, 7, Dies of Injuries

BUFFALO, N. Y. (AP)—Seven-year-old Iris Ascanazy died Wednesday night, the fourth victim of a rampaging automobile that jumped a curb and struck down a group of young girls strolling home from school.

Three of the children were killed Monday as the car swerved wildly on its 2-block path of destruction before smashing into a grocery store.

Iris died without regaining consciousness. Still in critical condition is a fifth girl, Betty Scheuer, 11.

Bomb Explodes

NAPLES, Italy (AP)—A bomb exploded Friday in the provincial headquarters of the Fascist Italian Social Movement. One office room was wrecked but there were no casualties.

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
