

# Extension Office Halts Rodent Bait Program

Distribution of rat and squirrel bait will be discontinued by the Lane County Extension Office as soon as present stocks are sold.

This was announced Monday by County Agent W. B. Parker, who explained that the educational program that has been conducted through use of a county rodent control fund has proved helpful in eradicating rodents in various parts of the county.

However, he said, since Warfarin rat bait is now being sold in commercial channels, it is the opinion of the County Board of Commissioners and the extension staff that the program should be discontinued.

Last year people of the county purchased about 10,000 pounds of Warfarin rat bait in two-pound sacks.

# Price Declines Stir Dairymen

Sharp price drops suffered by Oregon dairymen in recent months are expected to touch off the industry's most ambitious spring sales promotion campaign in years, reports Oscar Hag, Oregon State College dairy marketing specialist.

An intensified advertising and educational program already underway to promote "the economic food value" of dairy products will hit its peak during June Dairy Month.

Oregon Dairy Products Commission, Oregon Dairy Council and the Oregon State College extension service marketing program are spearheading the campaign which Hag says has been made possible through a "definite increase in interest from all groups within the industry."

From October to February, the average price paid to Oregon producers for all milk decreased 10 per cent from the same months a year ago. At the same time, report OSC economists, costs of producing milk increased more than 2 per cent. This includes milk used both in the Grade A trade and for manufacturing.

Milk producers who previously had a measure of protection under the late milk marketing act are seeking new ways to maintain a stable market, Hag states. "They realize that the potential for a price-cutting situation exists under present conditions."

June Dairy Month is being planned in cooperation with the American Dairy Assn. ADA activities include market research, retail store promotions, radio and television shows and newspaper and magazine articles on nutritional value of dairy products. Oregon Dairy Products commission allots part of its dairy products promotion budget to ADA.

# Timber Structures Appoints New Regional Distributors

Timber Structures, Inc., of Portland has announced the appointment of new western Oregon distributors, the firm of Randolph and Cole which is temporarily located at 603 McKinley St., Eugene.

Also associated with the firm is William F. Randolph, a graduate of the U. S. Naval Academy and of the Oregon State College school of engineering who has had experience as a design engineer with Boeing Aircraft Co. and as manager of a large southern Oregon cattle ranch.

Timber Structures, Inc., manufacturers glued-laminated ribs for farm buildings, trusses and rigid frames for commercial and industrial purposes. These will be used by Randolph and Cole with other local materials to fabricate buildings for any purpose.

Also offered will be farm, commercial and industrial buildings, packaged and ready for erection. A complete farm building planning service is to be featured by the new firm.

San Francisco (AP)—The outlook for new housing in the Western states is good, activity is higher than a year ago and the year's new starts will exceed 1954 and probably 1953 in the opinion of directors of the Federal Home Loan Bank of San Francisco.

This forecast was given at a news conference by directors from California, Nevada, Oregon, Montana, Utah, Washington and Wyoming, here to attend the annual meeting of stockholders.

Frank S. McWilliams of Spokane, chairman of the board, said there is no indication that housing activity will be overdone in the area in view of the continuing population gains and the steady increase in formation of new families.

Kirk Reynolds of Portland agreed that housing activity is on the increase. Gerrit vander Ende of Tacoma, said home owning is spreading because of the low down payments, that people are moving from public housing projects into their own homes and that there is an increase in the demand for conventional home loans as against GI and FHA loans.

Ralph Johnson Lumber Co. of Lane County has been listed among 31 private forest owners who have had acreage certified by the Industrial Forestry Assn. as new West Coast tree farms.

The Johnson Co. farm covers 630 acres. Altogether, the I.F.A. reports, West Coast tree farms now cover 4,450,585 acres in Washington and Oregon. There now are 108 tree farms in western Oregon alone, and a total of 274 in the two states.

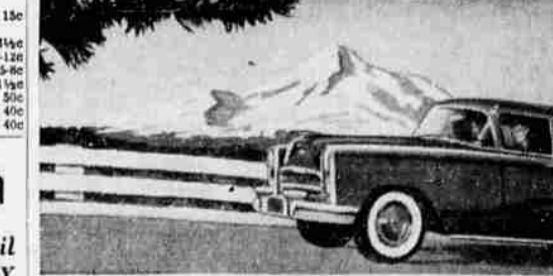
