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HIGHCLIMBER

★ SANTA CRUZ.—Spring football is a necessary evil! Most gride coaches will agree and all would be happier men if all would agree to eliminate the off-season practice sessions that normally last about a month. . . . Many schools have outlawed the spring drills, but those to play intersectional foes who have the extra experience are under very definite handicaps. . . .

As far as the press is concerned, little attention is given the grid sport for several reasons—the gridmen have their chance to claim fame in the fall the spring sports schedules in most colleges overshadow the sport that builds stadiums and fills athletic coffers. . . . Locally, football will receive even less attention—because of the Northwest Baseball League that opens regular play only a few days after Len Casanova calls his Oregon warriors to arms. . . .

Spring practice is even more important to Casanova than usual, because he and his staff are faced with a tremendous rebuilding program, what with the loss of key men like George Shaw, Walt Gaffney, Lloyd Powell, Jack Patera, Ron Pheister, Hal Reeve, Keith Tucker, Dick Mobley, and Dean VanLeuven. . . .

Most football fans consider the loss of Quarterback Shaw the largest shoes to fill—and that will be one of the major projects during the 20 days of spring practice. . . . Cas is planning no major change in offense, retaining a fundamental "T" but he has some convictions regarding backfield responsibilities. For example, Cas believes that his halfbacks should also be capable of filling the fullback positions and that his left halfback would be more valuable alternating at quarterback.

SUPPORT THE EMERALDS

★ There are any number of quarterback candidates and 1. Johnny Keller, will be absent because of baseball. The list includes Johnny Russell, Tom Crabtree, Dick James, Dick Jarvis, and Ted Overton. . . . Crabtree and James are also left halfbacks and they might well grab the jobs on an alternating basis. . . . James, who missed spring practice last year because of grades, has just a cast off his wrist—as the result of a cracked bone suffered during last season. . . . Russell is still bothered a bit by rheumatic fever that caused soreness in his knees and wrists. . . . Jarvis is the freshman who looked good in beating the Baby Beavers last fall. . . . Overton, who has been playing an end position, came to Oregon originally as a quarterback. . . . Another possibility is Jack Henkel, who is ineligible for spring practice because of grades, but who could qualify for service in the fall. . . .

Jack Morris, the ex-Medford star who is a freshman in track, is a good bet to alternate at fullback with Larry Rose. . . . Possibly more of a major problem in the way of manpower than the quarterback position, is the end situation where only Phil McHugh appears to have the equipment to hold down a sure-fire starting berth. . . . There are about 3 wingmen up from the Fresh ranks who could help, but the best bet seems to be the 4 junior college transfers who report next Tuesday. . . . Best of the crop appears to be Bruce Bremm from Boise JC—but we've seen transfers before who came highly recommended and have failed to deliver. . . .

There is certain to be one shift in the line, moving Jim Potter from a guard to a tackle position, to go along with Lon Stiner, Harry Johnson and Chuck Austin. . . .

Oregon football, despite the loss of manpower who made possible last year's Northern Division championship, might well be the surprise of the Pacific Coast Conference.

Oregon's Ducks, rained out of 7 non-conference games this spring, kept a weather eye on the skies Wednesday as the Northern Division opener with Oregon State on Friday at Corvallis became the next order of business.

The scheduled pair of games with the Linfield club of the Northwest Conference was rained out Tuesday and left the Webfoots with 7 wins and 3 defeats in the early season results column.

Five of these wins came in a row during the brief spell of sunshine which warmed the area last week. Both Coach Don Kirsch of Oregon and Ralph Coleman of Oregon State were not too pleased with the loss of their last warmup games and also were worried about the condition of their respective diamonds. The 2nd game of the series is set for Howe Field on Saturday at 1 p.m., if the weather gets better.

Ken Bond, the sophomore third baseman from Baker, is currently leading the Webfoot hitters with a healthy .750 average, but Co-Capt. George Shaw's lusty .400 was the best among the regulars at the close of the 1st 10 games.

Another sophomore, Jim Pingree, is 3rd with a .368 effort and the other top hitters include Co-Capt. Pete Williams at .343, John Keller at .320 and Dick Schlossstein at .312.

Shaw also leads the extra base hitters with 3 triples and 3 homers already chalked up. Jerry Ross is the leading base stealer with 5 and Shaw ranks 2nd with 4 to his credit.

Brundage Leaves Olympic Site

SYDNEY, Australia (AP)—Avery Brundage left Australia for Japan Wednesday with a warning echoing behind him that the 1955 Olympic Games could be taken away from Melbourne unless the organizing committee "wakes up" by June 10.

Brundage, president of the International Olympic Committee, pointed out that the IOC has a meeting scheduled in Paris in June and the Melbourne decision "depends on the work done in Melbourne between now and June 10."

"If there is no improvement, there could be a sensational decision at Paris," said Brundage. "I haven't made any threats or given Australians any deadlines. But they know when the international committee meets."
