## Lebanon Girl Critically Hurt

A 16-year-old girl was critically injured Wednesday afternoon when she was thrown from a car and struck her head on a curb after a collision at the intersection of 11th and Mill Sts.

Taken to Sacred Heart Hospital with fractures of the skull and pelvis was Patricia Smith, a Lebanon High School student. She was unconscious for several hours after the accident and remained in poor condition Thursday.

The injured girl was a passenger in a car driven by Mrs. Grace A. Burns, 62, also of Lebanon. Mrs. Burns and another passenger Betty Nightingale, 16, suffered minor bruises. They were not hospitalized.

Mrs. Burns' car collided with a car driven by Charles C. Chapman, 20, of 1789 Columbia St., Eugene, Chapman, who was alone in his car, was not injured.

Police said Mrs. Burns, driving north on Mills St., failed to notice the stop sign at 11th Ave. She was cited on a charge of stop sign violation.

The impact of the crash spun the Burns car around in the intersection. All three occupants fell out when the door on the right side of the car flew open.

The car came to a stop partly on top of the Smith girl, who was the first to fall out. Bystanders lifted the car off the injured girl and called an ambulance. The accident occurred about 3:15 p.m.

## Allies to Answer Soviet Proposal

LONDON (AP)—The Western Big Three will propose to Russia in identical notes Friday an early Vienna meeting of ambassadors to draft a state treaty for Austria, diplomatic informants said Thursday.

The sources said the Big Three have agreed to sidestep Russia's proposed conference of foreign ministers in Vienna until after the ambassadors meet.

They added the Western nations have decided that further "clarification" is needed on the agreement concluded between Austrian and Russian leaders in Moscow last week.

The notes are expected to suggest that, after the ambassadors have cleared the way, the foreign ministers of the United States, Britain, France and Russia meet with Austria's foreign minister to sign the treaty.

## Daylight Time Begins Sunday

PORTLAND (AP)—Daylight saving time arrives in many parts of the United States early Sunday morning. It will make some changes in Oregon where standard time is mandatory.

Portland television stations will present their shows on a schedule adjusted to the fast time. Most Portland radio stations will tape network shows and rebroadcast them at the regular time—but some changes may be made in this.

Some airlines expect to operate on daylight time. Railroads and buses will continue on standard time.

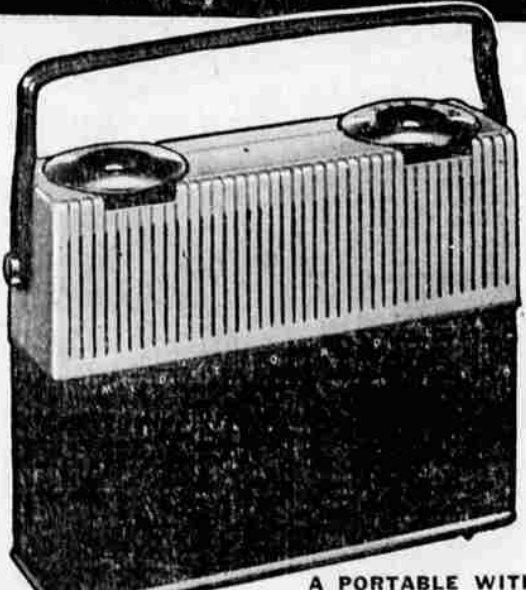
