

Church Plans Alaska School.

Methodists to Seek Funds for College

NEW YORK (Special)—To help find what will be the first four-year, church-related college in Alaska, the Division of National Missions, the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church, has announced it will seek gifts from the nearly 40,000 Methodist churches in the United States.

Plans for a church-wide appeal were completed at a meeting in Denver, Colo., of the Alaska Methodist College Committee, a subsidiary of the Division of National Missions. The Division, with headquarters in New York, administers the mission program of the Methodist Church in the United States, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

By vote of the Division, the proposed college will be erected on a 242-acre campus in Anchorage and will be named the Alaska Methodist College. The Division plans that the college will be a fully accredited liberal arts school with an enrollment of up to 500 students.

NO GOAL SET
The Alaska Methodist College Committee set no goal for the church as a whole or for conferences, districts and local churches. But it reiterated a previous decision of the Division that no construction can be started before two million dollars in cash has been obtained. Of that amount, one million would be for buildings and one million for endowment, the committee said.

Bishop A. Raymond Grant, Portland, Ore., committee chairman, reported that cash and pledges from a fund-raising campaign in Anchorage this spring total about \$700,000. The original goal was \$500,000. In the six years since the Division decided to establish a college in Alaska, Methodists have given about \$200,000.

At the meeting, the Rev. Earl R. Brown, general executive secretary of the Division, appointed three men to work with an Alaskan committee on plans for college development and to direct the appeal to churches for funds.

"The Division of National Missions is not embarking on a campaign with set goals and quotas," the Rev. Mr. Brown said. "Rather, we are planning to present the cause of the Alaska Methodist College to Methodist churches through our bishops, district superintendents, pastors and local church commissions on missions. We believe that, as always, when Methodist people see the need, they will respond."

WILL ACK PLEDGES

"We will seek gifts from churches as a whole, from individuals in churches and from church groups, such as Sunday school classes, youth fellowships, Bible classes and mens' clubs. We will ask that pledges be made over any period up to five years. Thirty-six Methodists from the states, mostly district superintendents representing bishops, went to Alaska late in March to see the site and to observe the Anchorage campaign. They will work with the Division in obtaining gifts in their areas.

The site is owned by the Division and was purchased as the campus by the City of Anchorage from the federal Department of the Interior. No date has been set for the college opening, pending obtaining the necessary money and completion of plans for curriculum, board of trustees and faculty.

The only senior college in Alaska now is the University of Alaska, a land-grant, tax-supported institution at Fairbanks. The Presbyterian Church, U.S.A., maintains the Sheldon Jackson Junior College at Sitka.

Report Called Public Power 'Blockbuster'

WASHINGTON (Special)—Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn.) disclosed Friday he has received a turnaround from former President Herbert Hoover on his demand for immediate publication of what Kefauver says is "a blockbuster" attack on public power by a Hoover Commission task force.

He announced he has renewed the request in a telegram to Hoover declaring that "I am at a loss to understand" the refusal. The task force is an arm of the Commission on Organization of the Executive Branch of the Government, which Hoover heads.

Kefauver told the former president that "leaks in the press" indicate the subgroup has made some sweeping recommendations to the full commission.

Hoover's reply was in a telegram dated Thursday, which Kefauver made public. It said Hoover felt he had no authority to release the bulky report, and doubted that the full commission would do so now.

In a statement making public the telegrams, Kefauver said it has been reported that the task force report is a "blockbuster" against the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) and similar public power projects.

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Billy Ending London Stint

LONDON (Special)—Billy Graham brings his second London crusade to a close Saturday after a week's rain-soaked services attended by nearly half a million listeners.

The sun finally shone over the Greyhound racetrack where the American evangelist was to conduct two final services before moving on to the continent. Through Friday night 334,300 persons had jammed into Wembley Stadium, despite the chill rain that dampened four services.

There were 56,000 persons in the Friday night crowd and 3,546 stepped forward under umbrellas to make their "decisions for Christ."

After a week's rest Graham will conduct meetings in France, West Germany, Holland, Belgium, Denmark and Norway.

Gadget Records Action of Heart

NEW YORK (Special)—A radio device that can signal warnings of heart trouble is on display here.

The device, developed by the Navy, works this way: A transmitter fitted to a patient broadcasts electrocardiographic signals, measures of the heart beat and other audible heart sounds to a receiver.

This enables a heart specialist to record changes in the heart while the patient is engaged in normal activities. Heretofore such records have been made with the patient in a resting position.

The new process, said Dr. Maximilian Kern of Chicago, should make it possible to determine more reliably how much exercise the heart patient can tolerate, and to warn of an impending attack.

The device is being exhibited at the annual meeting of the American College of Cardiology.

'09 Channel Flight To Be Re-enacted

CALGARY, Alta. (Special)—French inventor Louis Bleriot's 1909 flight across the English Channel is to be re-enacted this summer by a Calgary-built copy of his historic monoplane. The copy was built at the Provincial Institute of Technology and Art. Its pilot will be Jean de la Bruyere, 27.

Prohibition of Atom Bombs Urged by Presbyterians

LOS ANGELES (Special)—Business and professional leaders of the 167th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church after the group called for the prohibition of atomic and hydrogen bombs in Friday's meetings.

The 4,000 delegates attending the week-long assembly unanimously adopted a resolution similar to the stand taken by the World Council of Churches in Evanston, Ill., last August.

Police Arrest More Priests

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (Special)—Federal police have arrested a number of Roman Catholic priests in a three-day series of raids on private homes and some convents, it was reported Saturday.

Reliable sources said the government carried out the raids in connection with an alleged plot by Roman Catholic followers to "disturb the public peace."

The sources said the arrests began Thursday night and were still being carried out early Saturday with "several" Roman Catholic priests being held by police at Central Headquarters.

High police officers headed by Inspector-General Miguel Gamboa have conferred on the police action since Friday and are giving instructions to the police force, the reports said.

Indian Proposes Truce Committee

TOKYO (Special)—The newspaper Mainichi reported Friday from New Delhi that India is striving to set up a five-nation truce committee to prevent hostilities in Formosa Strait.

The newspaper said it had learned authoritatively that India's V. Krishna Menon, now in Peking, also has proposed two conditions for a cease-fire in the Formosa area.

India wants Nationalist President Chiang Kai-shek to waive his claims on the mainland and to withdraw from Quemoy and the Matsus, the newspaper said.
