

# Springfield May Join Dog Control Program

Springfield's city budget committee Tuesday night tentatively agreed to provide funds for the city's participation in a new county-wide dog control program.

The decision was made after the committee heard an explanation of the program by Veterinarian A. C. Baronti, a member of the county dog control board.

Terming dog control a "sore thumb all the way through in the past," Baronti said the Lane County Humane Society has undergone a complete revision to

take over the job of picking up stray dogs.

**BUDGET BOOST**

"We're asking you to go along with the rest of us," he told the Springfield group.

To join in the county-wide plan, the committee will have to increase the \$300 budget estimate for dog control to \$2,100. The higher figure includes about \$600 anticipated in license fees plus a 1 cent monthly per capita payment to the Humane Society.

The \$300 estimate was for operation of the city's own dog pickup and dog pound.

Baronti asserted that the only reason Springfield operated its dog control for \$300 last year was "the Humane Society has been picking up 90 per cent of your dogs whether you know it or not."

**EXPENSE TRIMMING**

The budget committee also heard Howard Buford, Lane County planning consultant, explain functions of his office and plans

for the addition of two new staff members to meet demands for more assistance from the agencies which support the central planning office.

The committee tentatively decided to meet the planning consultant request for \$2,500 as contrasted to \$1,000 this past year, as the city's share of the increase in costs.

The committee also took steps toward trimming some of the anticipated expenses for the coming year.

It appeared likely that salary increases will be reduced from a total of about \$20,000 to about \$13,000 on recommendation of Mayor Edward C. Harms Jr.

Harms suggested that the request of the city's department heads for an increase from present salaries of \$4800 to \$5400 be shaved to \$5280—a raise amounting to \$480 per month.

He said such a raise will put the department heads' salaries among the top third of Oregon cities of comparable size, based on 1955 salaries, and should remain in the "top half" in the coming fiscal year.

## CD Booklets At City Hall

Do you know what to do in the event of a bomb attack? Or what each blast of a siren means in air raid warning?

Louis Borde, director of civil defense for Eugene, made a limited number of official home protection instruction booklets available Wednesday in an effort to provide the answers.

The "family action program"

consists of an eight-point plan for the average family. It includes preparation of a shelter, instructions for action during an air alert, home fire protection, home fire fighting, emergency action to save lives, what to do if someone is trapped, provision of safe food and water and home nursing.

There are 39 pages of instructions and suggestions in the booklet prepared by the Federal Civil Defense Administration. There are illustrations to emphasize the points.

Borde said the booklets will be available while they last—at the city manager's office free of charge. There are about 1,000 of the booklets, to be given on a first come, first served basis.

The manager's office is in the first floor of the city hall, 11th and Willamette St.

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## U.S. Renews Bid to Free Red Prisoners

WASHINGTON (AP)—The State Department disclosed Wednesday the United States has renewed its demand that Red China release 63 Americans still held by the Communists.

Henry Suydam, department press officer, told newsmen Franklin Gowen, U. S. consul general at Geneva, has renewed contact with Red China's consul general there.

He said Gowen was told at a meeting last Monday of the impending release of the four U. S. fliers who have been freed since then.

The U. S. - Red China contact at Geneva was established after the Far East peace conference there last year.

### REVISED LIST

Suydam said Gowen handed the Red Chinese a "revised list" of Americans still held by Peiping. Suydam said the Chinese representative promised to send this list and a report of his meeting to Peiping, with a reply later at some unspecified date when Peiping sends further word.

Suydam said the list included 52 names—41 civilians and 11 fliers. He said Gowen inquired also into "the cases of 11 Navy and Coast Guard personnel" whom the Red Chinese have been professing complete ignorance.

These 11 include 5 Navy men and 5 coastguardsmen lost in separate planes Jan. 18, 1953, near Swatow of the Communist-held China.

### RELIEVE TENSIONS

Suydam said the Red Chinese at Geneva volunteered that the purpose of their release (of the four U. S. fliers) was to relieve international tensions.

He said the meeting was arranged at Gowen's suggestion.

## Drivers' Strike Closes Portland Milk Plants

PORTLAND (AP)—AFL drivers struck the Mayflower Milk Distributing Co. here Wednesday, and dairy operators promptly announced a shutdown of all plants in the city if the dispute continues through the day.

"It would not appear that milk will be available from any source—home delivery or stores—within 24 hours," a dairy industry spokesman said.

The unexpected strike and plans for a lockout overshadowed a strike of some 1,000 carpenters in the Portland district, which started Tuesday morning.

Federal conciliators called a meeting of the dairy industry representative and the union in an attempt to bring a swift end to the strike which was based, both sides said, on working schedules.

**SET POLICY**

W. F. Luberg, Eugene spokesman, said the question was whether union or management should set the policy of delivering milk. The union, he said, insists on no power over any schedule change and he added that the change sought by the industry is elimination of Sunday deliveries.

George Park, secretary of the Dairy Ice Cream Union, Portland, said that rather, the union's objection was to a schedule change which would deny employees two consecutive days off.

Park said the union, although picketing the Mayflower plant, had authorized deliveries to hospitals and schools.

Luberg said, though, that it would not be feasible to keep on plant in operation for such small volume. He said no plan to keep up those deliveries was immediate in sight.

**PAY BOOST**

The strike of carpenters reported by Elmer Harris, secretary of the Portland district of the union, was against all employers who have not agreed to a pay boost of 10 cents an hour.

Alfred Northrup, president of the Portland Home Builders Assn., said 82 per cent of the Portland area home building would be affected. But Harris said only 1,000 of 4,800 carpenters in the district were on strike and not more than 20 per cent of the building industry would be affected.
