

Bums Tip Giants; White Sox Lose

The next 10 days—from now until the All-Star Game break—may decide the American League pennant race. And it looks as if the best thing the four challengers to the New York Yankees can do is pray for rain.

If the Yanks, ahead by 5½ games, don't come out smelling like roses, one of the four contenders, at least, figures to wind up a bit groggy. The pressure is on Chicago, Cleveland, Detroit and Boston.

The schedule tells the story. New York plays 10 games in the 10 days, with two days off. Eight of the games are with Washington and Baltimore, the seventh and eighth-place clubs the Yanks have beaten 17 out of 21 times thus far.

Boston is the only toughie immediately ahead for the Yanks. The Red Sox, whose five-game winning streak was cut by Washington 3-2 Thursday, have lost six of eight to New York but are much stronger now. And Ted Williams probably will be back in service for the Fourth of July double-header at Yankee Stadium.

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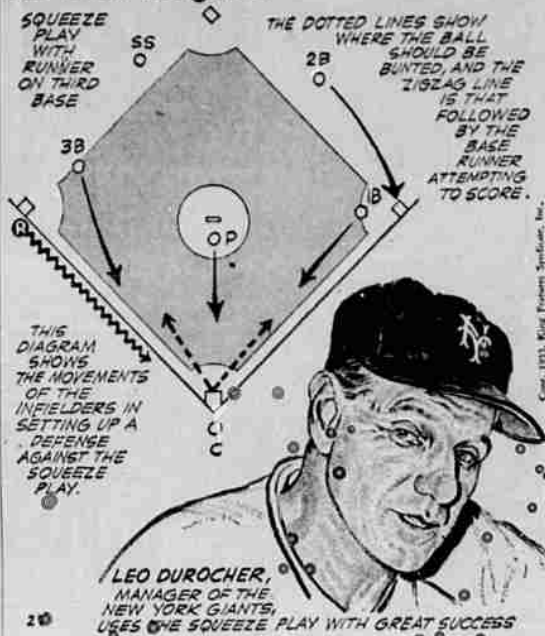
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INSIDE BASEBALL for Little Leaguers

When the batter receives the signal from his manager or third-base coach that a squeeze play is to be attempted, he must bunt the ball between five and 10 feet into the infield—making either the first baseman or third baseman travel the longest distance from his defensive position to field the ball.

The catcher must stay at home plate to take the throw and attempt to tag out the base runner who will be attempting to score from third base.

Since a base runner in Little League cannot leave his base until the pitched ball reaches the batter, the squeeze in Little League resembles the safety squeeze in adult baseball with the base runner holding up to see whether the ball is bunted properly before he commits himself. Even when the runner holds up, this play works frequently and is recommended when the batter has shown that he is a better bunter than hitter.

Rosburg Retains Lead in BC

ANCOUVER, B. C.—Griping its clubs like a baseball player, Bob Rosburg of San Francisco set out Friday hoping to keep a neat hitting average intact for the third round of the 12-hole British Columbia Open golf championship here.

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Trabert Takes Singles Crown

WIMBLEDON, England (U.P.)—Power-hitting Tony Trabert of Cincinnati won the coveted Wimbledon men's singles tennis championship Friday by defeating giant-killer Kurt Nielsen of Denmark, 6-3, 7-5, 6-1.

The boyish-looking, 24-year-old American thus won the equivalent of the world's tennis championship without the loss of a set. Trabert, top-seeded in the tournament, swept through all his earlier matches in straight sets and the best the unseeded Nielsen could do was to take him to one deuced set in the final.

It was the most important title ever won by Trabert, who has been outstanding in Davis Cup competition since 1952 but never before had reached the finals of the Wimbledon, American or Australian singles championships.

For two sets it was a slashing, exciting match that kept a gallery of 17,000, including Princess Margaret and the Duchess of Kent, on edge.

The Dane apparently shot his bolt in the second set and Trabert, stepping up his pace and hitting out with boldness and accuracy, raced through to an easy victory in the third set.

Nearly 35,000 people out through the night outside Wimbledon's main entrance to buy tickets for the Trabert-Nielsen match. They started lining up 24 hours before the gates opened at noon.

Before the singles match, British Angels Mortimer and Ann Shilcock took a 6-2, 6-1 decision from Australia's Fay Muller and Jennifer Slaley Hoad in a women's doubles semi-final.

The all-American grip on the women's singles title became an all-California struggle as Thursday.

The only non-Californian in the last four—Doris Hart, of Coral Gables, Fla.—was upset by petite M. Beverly Baker of Ellettsville, 6-0.

Mrs. Baker will meet Louise Brown of Beverly Hills, in Saturday's women's final. M. L. Brown defeated Doreen Hoad, Long Beach, Calif., 6-3, 6-5 in their semi-final match.

The men's doubles title match Saturday will be between two Australian teams with Ken Rosewall and Neale Fraser meeting Lew Hoad and Rex Hartwig.

Rosewall and Fraser eliminated Trabert and Seixas, the American Davis cup pair, 6-2, 1-6, 4-6, 6-3, Thursday.
