

Jet Wreckage, Body Found On Nip Island

Search Continues
For Other Three

TOKYO (AP)—The body of one of four missing U.S. Marine fliers was found Friday in the wreckage of a jet plane on Oshima Island 45 miles south of Tokyo.

The Marine Corps tentatively identified the body as that of Lt. Alan Murdock McAneny, Yonkers, N.Y.

Searchers positively identified the wreckage as the FJ2 Fury jet flown by McAneny and which disappeared Tuesday in the search for two other Marine fliers who vanished in a fog Sunday night.

ENDLESS PATTERN

McAneny was a son-in-law of the publisher of the Rome (N.Y.) Sentinel.

The plane was discovered by islanders as the search neared the end of its fifth day for the first two and a helicopter crewman who was lost Wednesday.

As good weather continued through the last three days of the vast search, officers said they could not explain the absence of results. Destroyers and planes wove an endless pattern over the sea.

"All we know is that the search must go on as long as there is any hope, and there is certainly hope," an Air Force spokesman said.

GRIM SEQUENCE

The grim sequence began Sunday night when a Marine Sky Knight jet ran out of gas in a fog. Its pilot was Capt. Hodgins P. Montague, of Jackson, Miss.

With him was his ordnance officer, 2nd Lt. David Winton Bell, of Wayzata, Minn., son of the president of General Mills.

The following day a search plane piloted by Lt. Alan Murdock McAneny, of Yonkers, N.Y., vanished.

On Wednesday a helicopter ditched during the search. Three of its crew were saved, but one, unidentified, is missing.

The search continues over a wide area off southern Honshu.

Buffalo Bus Drivers Strike

BUFFALO, N. Y. (AP)—AFL bus workers struck Friday against the Niagara Frontier Transit System and halted service for almost a million persons in this area.

Thousands of commuters hitched rides or walked to work after waiting on the curbs for buses that never arrived.

About 1,650 bus drivers, mechanics, office workers and other company personnel were affected by the strike.

The union was reported to be seeking a wage increase of 7 cents an hour. An offer of a 5-cent raise was rejected. Present scales were not disclosed.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The street car and bus strike in Los Angeles entered its eleventh day Friday with every indication that the tie-up would go into a third week.

Douglas Introduces 'Tidelands' Measure

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Douglas (D-Ill.) introduced a bill Thursday to recapture for the federal government the title to submerged oil lands lying seaward from the low water marks along the coasts.

Title to the lands was conveyed to the states in the Submerged Lands Act passed in 1953 after a bitter fight in which Douglas and some others had opposed the move as a "giveaway."

Foreign Aid Ceiling Set at \$3 1/4 Billion

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Thursday approved a \$3,285,000,000 foreign military and economic aid program for the year starting Friday.

The measure, which merely sets a ceiling for future appropriations, now goes to a Senate-House committee to adjust differences. The Senate previously approved an authorization 139 million dollars larger. President Eisenhower had asked about 3 1/2 billions. The actual appropriation, still to be acted on, may be trimmed further.

Segni Granted 2 More Days

ROME (AP)—Christian Democrat Antonio Segni—granted two days of grace by President Giovanni Gronchi—continued his quest Friday for support as Italy's next premier.

Segni was to have reported Thursday night after four days of political soundings whether he could form a cabinet. Instead he told Gronchi he still was unable to say definitely and the President gave him until Saturday.

Segni has encountered obstacles within his own party and the Liberal party. He needs the latter to give his prospective coalition government the marginal support necessary in Parliament. The Christian Democrats alone have only 262 seats of the 590 in the Chamber of Deputies.

His own party has pledged support of Segni, but its right-wing "concentration" which forced Premier Mario Scelba's resignation June 29 still objects to forming a coalition with minor parties of the center bloc.

Douglas Dubious Of Red Elections

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—U.S. Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas said Friday he doubted that either South Viet Nam or the Communist north could be ready for the July, 1956, unification election provided by the Indochina armistice.

The jurist cited the "difficulties of setting up all the local government units and the election machinery." He admitted he knew nothing about conditions in Red-ruled North Viet Nam but said, "I could not help but think that any election in a Communist-ruled country would only be a very suspect election."

Douglas is stopping briefly in Saigon, en route to lecture on constitutional law in Calcutta, India.

Peron Cabinet Takes Shape

President Names
4 New Ministers

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP)—President Juan D. Peron's new Cabinet began to take shape Friday with the appointment of four new ministers. Unofficial sources said they would be sworn in Friday.

The new ministers are Oscar Albio, succeeding Angel Gabriel Borlenghi as interior minister; Francisco Marcos Anglada, replacing Armando Mendez San Martin as education minister; Jose Maria Castiglioni, succeeding Carlos Hogan as agriculture minister, and Alberto J. Iturbe, transport minister succeeding Juan Maggi.

ENTIRE CABINET QUIT

The entire 22-member Cabinet submitted resignations after suppression of the June 16 Navy-Marine revolt against Peron so the president could revamp his administration. Peron was expected to reappoint some of his associates.

The chief change so far has been the retirement of Borlenghi, long an intimate adviser to Peron. He was considered one of the chief directors of the government's campaign against Argentina's Roman Catholic hierarchy, which was climaxed by ex-communication of the president.

REPORTS DENIED

Unofficial sources in Buenos Aires say there are indications Peron is seeking to end his government's eight-month-old quarrel with the church. But reports that the Vatican is sending a special envoy to Argentina were denied in Vatican City Thursday. The Vatican said any diplomatic contacts required can be handled by Msgr. Mario Zanin, the papal nuncio in Buenos Aires.

The Vatican also said it knew nothing of a report that Peron had sent felicitations to Pope Pius XII on the Feast of Saints Peter and Paul last Wednesday.

Blind Couple Proud Parents

DULUTH, Minn. (AP)—A blind Korean War veteran and his pretty blind wife who captured the hearts of thousands upon their marriage last fall became the parents of a son—7 pounds 13 1/4 ounces Thursday.

The baby was born to Mrs. John L. Thornton at St. Luke's Hospital.

The Thorntons were married in Cloquet last Sept. 25 in a ceremony topping off a community drive that resulted in a home and furnishings for the couple and a job for Thornton.

Neither Thornton nor his wife have ever seen each other. They met by chance in April 1953 while Joyce was home from blind school and John was home on leave from a veterans hospital.

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Woman Sues to Recoup \$425 Racetrack 'Fling'

NEW YORK (AP)—A woman who lost \$425 in her first fling at betting on the horses is suing under an almost-forgotten law to get her money back.

Miss Paula Aiello, 28, dress buyer for a store in Patterson, N.J., lost the money at Aqueduct race track in Queens Monday. She has 71 pari-mutuel tickets to prove it.

She filed suit in State Supreme Court Thursday against the Queens Jockey Club, which runs Aqueduct. Her attorney, Lee Bosco Jr., says the suit is based on section 894 of the state penal law which, he says, dates back to 1874 and provides that anyone who loses a bet "may sue and recover same."

The suit is a test of the pari-mutuel law, enacted in 1940. The total handled annually at both the flat and harness pari-mutuel tracks in the state is about 450 million dollars, of which about 70 millions represent bettors' losses.

Describing how she got "the fever" her first day at a race track, Miss Aiello said:

"I overheard tips and 1 bet

on other people's hunches and I hung around the (betting) windows listening to what people were doing.

"When I lost I wasn't angry. I was just upset by all I'd seen, people borrowing money to get home from the track and so on. It's not the money so much."

"I bet on every race, and in one race I even bet on four horses and on three in another."

Neither the pari-mutuel laws nor the enacting legislature, Bosco said, mentioned Section 894, thus leaving it on the statute books.

Bosco said that section was first upheld in 1904 when the Appellate Division approved an action to recover \$100 bet and lost at the old Sheepshead Bay race track operated by the Coney Island Jockey Club.
