Huffman Leads 17-Hit Attack; Chase Gets 12th.

KENNEWICK, Wash. (AP)—Eugene sprayed the air with 17 base hits Wednesday night but barely eked out a 6-5 Northwest League baseball win over Tri-City which could get only seven safe blows.

Big gun for the Emeralds was George Huffman, leftfielder, who got four hits in four trips, including a triple which was the only extra-base hit made by Eugene. Huffman added another four to his record-runs batted in.

Tri-City managed to group its seven safeties with considerable efficiency. One was a second-inning homer by Danny Holden.

Milt Martin got a double in the 7th to drive in the Braves' second run and then hit a three-run homer in the ninth to wrap it up. Huffman's triple in the eighth inning put the Emeralds ahead 6-2 before Martin connected.

Eugene got one in the fifth, added three in the sixth on a walk, singles by pitcher Frank Chase, Ron Jackson and Huffman plus a second walk. In the eighth Chase and Jackson singled and Huffman then unloaded his game-winning triple.

Chase pitched steady ball for his 7th win and 12th victory this season. Dick Green was the loser, yielding 10 hits and 4 runs in the five innings he worked.

They will look over the rookies for several days before the bulk of the 47-man squad reports July 25 to begin preparing for the National Football League campaign.

Four of the club's rookies will report after the College All-Stars meet at Cleveland Brown at Chicago Aug. 12. They are Joe Ho, Notre Dame halfback; Mel Triplett, Toledo fullback; and tackles Roosevelt and Penn State end Rex Suggan of Mississippi.

HAPPY WITH NEW PUTTER Snead Tops PGA Qualifiers

NORTHVILLE, Mich. (AP)—Sammy Snead, happy with a new putter that "works like magic," held a one stroke lead Thursday as the field teed off for the second and final qualifying round of play in the PGA golf championship.

Using the putter for the first time in championship play, Snead, who has lost a lot of big ones because of trouble on the greens, needed only 29 putts as he teared the 6,701-yard Meadowbrook Country Club course in a five-under-par 66. He had seven one-putt greens.

"If I can just putt like that, that's all I need," Snead, who is shooting for his fourth PGA title, grinned. "I did the best putting yesterday I've done for a long time."

Snead tried out the new center-shaft putter for the first time Monday and Wednesday worked with it four hours, "changing my back stroke just a bit."

"Apparently did the trick," Snead added. "Putting is 90 per cent mental and a question of confidence. When they drop for you like mine did yesterday, well you have that confidence."

Snead, on of the co-favorites for the title along with defending champion Chick Herbert and Cary Middlecoff, had a hot back nine with four birdies, dropping putts of seven feet on the 10th, 11th, 18 on the 14th and 12 on the 18th. He also dropped one of two feet for a birdie on the seventh.

He had to can that 12-footer on the 18th to take over the lead for Skee Riegel of Ithaca, Pa., and Jack Burke and Doug Ford, both from Klamath Lake, N. Y., had come in with four-under-par 67.

Trailing them by a stroke were Ernie Ball of Oak Park, Ill., and Don Fairfield of Casey, Ill.

Both Riegel and Ford are competing in their first PGA, for this is the first year they have been eligible for it. Riegel had an unusual round-nine birdies, two double bogeys and one bogey.

In all, 17 pros on the field of 124 broke Meadowbrook's 35-36-7 par, and there were 61 golfers with scores of 73 or better, indicating that the low qualifying score might be as low as 146. The low 63 and Harold Goyer of Omaha, Neb., qualified for the match play beginning Friday.

Every now and then this season the smoke sent up by the sluggers, zeroing in on the major league home run records with 1,400 to date, clears away and some brilliant pitching shows through.

Boston's George Susce Jr. was the leader Wednesday giving Kansas City just one hit in a 6-0 victory. It was the fifth one-hit job in the American League this year and eighth in the majors.

The 24-year-old right-hander, son of the A's bullpen coach, gave up a leadoff single to Vic Power in the first and that was all.

Big Don Newcombe came close to his second one-hitter of the season, but Chicago wound up with two singles off the Brooklyn right-hander as he won his 16th in the first game of a twi-nighter 10-1. The Cubs snapped a nine-game losing streak in the nightcap 5-3.

It was relief pitching that won a fifth straight for Washington, with Pedro Ramos hurling a 5 1/2 innings of hitless ball to beat Cleveland 6-4. Ray Narleski, Don Mossi and Mike Garcia, incidentally, tossed no-hit stuff in 6 1/2 innings of relief for the Tribe.

Saul Rogovin allowed just five hits as Philadelphia beat Cincinnati 6-0 and Curt Simmons' followed it up with a four-hitter as the Phils won their ninth straight in the second game of the twi-nighter 4-2.

Clutch pitching paid off for the Chicago White Sox, who barely made an 8-0 lead hold up in an 8-6 victory over New York that got the Yankees' AL lead to two games again. Billy Pierce, third Sox pitcher, ended it with runners on second and first by getting Mickey Mantle to hit into a forceout.

In the other AL game Baltimore snapped Detroit's four-game streak 6-3. And in the National, Milwaukee fell 4 1/2 games behind Brooklyn with a 4-3 loss at Pittsburgh while St. Louis whipped New York 9-2.
