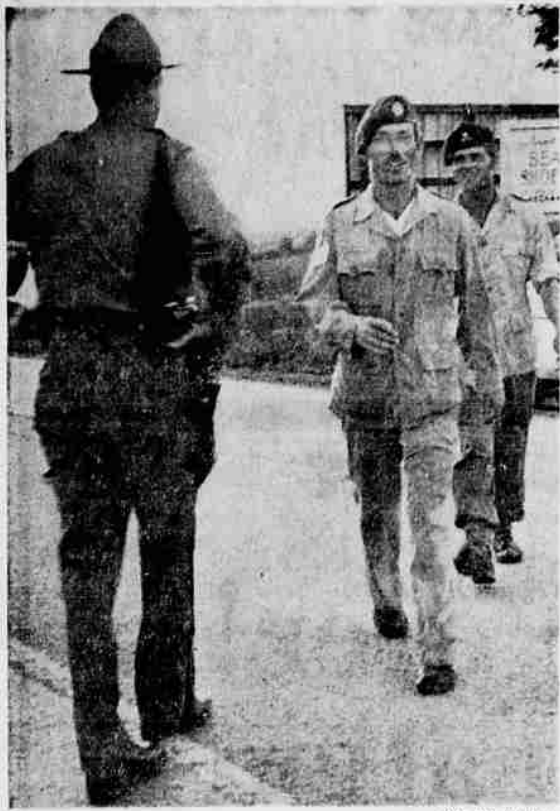

Health Insurance Issue Dominates AMA Parley

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—The world's largest gathering of medical men opened Monday with national health insurance for the aged certain to be a leading topic.

It's the 109th annual convention of the American Medical Assn., with some 14,000 physicians attending the five-day meeting.

The 209-member House of Delegates, AMA policy-making body, will meet throughout the week. It will select the recipient of the distinguished service award, naming a physician who has made an outstanding contribution to medicine.

Dr. E. Vincent Askey of Los Angeles will be installed as president Tuesday.

Three speakers expressed divergent views on health insurance for the aged at the conference of presidents and officers of state medical associations Sunday.

Paul Butler, Democratic party chairman, told doctors they are dragging their feet on health reforms and said they had a "curious" attitude toward his party's health proposals.

"If socialized medicine should come to our country, it may well be that the medical profession itself has brought it about," Butler declared.

Butler predicted that his party would endorse the Forand bill at its convention in Los Angeles.

UO Library Receives Art Books, Catalog

The University of Oregon library has received a number of art books and catalogs from the libraries of Maude I. Kerns and Mrs. Elizabeth Hay Smith.

Stevenson, Rockefeller

Spotlight Focuses On Non-Candidates

The political spotlight continued to focus Monday on two men who insist they are not candidates for the presidential nomination.

The men are Adlai Stevenson, the Democratic nominee in 1952 and 1956, and Nelson A. Rockefeller, the Republican governor of New York.

Both clearly stated their positions Sunday as noncandidates. But that did not eliminate them as possibilities. Neither said he would refuse a draft.

Stevenson's position emerged as a result of a public dialogue with Eleanor Roosevelt, who has called for a Democratic ticket of Stevenson for president and Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts as vice president.

READY TO SERVE

"I have declined repeatedly to comment on questions about a 'draft,'" Stevenson said in a message to Mrs. Roosevelt.

"I think I have made it clear in my public life, however, that I will serve my country and my party whenever called upon."

Mrs. Roosevelt, after receiving the message, commented: "From this statement, I think you will find it clear that Mr. Stevenson is a candidate . . ."

Her interpretation, however, prompted Stevenson to state from Libertyville, Ill.: "I will not seek the nomination for president by the Democratic convention. Therefore, I am not a candidate."

Rockefeller gave his position on a television program when he was asked: "You will not under any circumstances between now and the convention declare yourself as a candidate for the Republican nomination, is that correct?" "That is correct," the governor replied.

He said that Vice President Richard M. Nixon would receive the nomination.

But Rockefeller also said that unless Nixon reveals new positions on defense and foreign policy, "I think it's going to make it very much more difficult for him to be elected."

Rockefeller said he would support Nixon, if nominated, whether or not he elaborated his views.

Meanwhile, a Democratic candidate, Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, accused the Eisenhower administration of following a policy of drift in military and foreign affairs.

PEACE PROGRAM

Speaking on television programs sent to Florida and New York, Johnson said the United States should launch a world peace program.

Another Democratic candidate, Sen. Stuart Symington of Missouri, made a personal bid for support from the Florida delegation to the Democratic National Convention.

He told the delegates in Orlando that the nation's No. 1 problem was "security with solvency" and he was best qualified to handle it.

The delegates, pledged to vote for favorite son Sen. George Smathers on the first ballot, also heard Robert F. Kennedy speak on behalf of his brother, Sen. Kennedy, and Sen. Allen Bible (D-Nev.) speak on behalf of Sen. Johnson.

Court Grants Annulment

ROME (AP)—An Italian court has granted Ingrid Bergman and Roberto Rossellini an annulment of their Mexican proxy marriage.

The court's opinion, filed by Judge Orlando Falco, was made public Monday by one of the attorneys involved in the case.

The ruling paves the way for the Italian film director to marry Sonali Das Gupta, the wife of an Indian movie man who left her husband for Rossellini, bore the Italian a daughter and now is in Italy with him.

Miss Bergman did not contest Rossellini's suit for the annulment. Now 42, she is married to Swedish impresario Lars Schmidt, and they live outside Paris.

Still before the Rome courts is a case to settle final custody of Miss Bergman's three children by Rossellini, 53. The actress has temporary custody of them.
