Sister of Oregon Man
Models 'to Pay Rent'By GAY PAULEY

NEW YORK (UPI) — To most young career women in New York, you've arrived if you can become a top fashion model.

To Eloise Bethell, modeling is the easiest way to underwriting another future — as a serious artist.

Miss Bethell, a southern-born belle, is an impressive mixture of beauty, brains, talent, ambition and driving energy. She paints in the early morning hours, models during the day, and carries a full academic load in the evenings and Saturdays at New York University. She is working toward a master's degree in the creative arts and plans to continue until she has her Ph.D.

Eloise, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. P. Bethell, Wilmington, N.C., averages \$40 an hour as a clothes horse. She gets anywhere from \$30 to \$50 to \$750 and \$800 for her paintings—the price of each depending on the medium, whether a watercolor, pen and ink drawing, or an oil.

HAS TO PAY RENT

"When I exhibit at galleries, I sell," she laughed, "but in between exhibits there are those

long, hungry spaces. Something has to pay the rent."

Miss Bethell began her painting as a student at Converse College, Spartansburg, S.C., and her modeling when she finished college at the age of 19 and came to New York.

"A former roommate at Converse was going to Columbia University," she said in an interview at her Greenwich Village apartment. "She was paying her way through school by modeling, and she helped me get my first job in fashion."

That was in 1950, she said, and except for a couple of years of travel and modeling assignments caught on the run at Paris Courtyards houses, she since has been pouring her 120 pounds and five feet seven and one-half inches into some of the slinkiest clothes produced in the garment district. "I like modeling, I really do," she said, "but one day I hope to earn my living strictly by painting."

STUDIED IN MEXICO

Her travels "just to paint" took her first to San Miguel Allend, a mountain village 140 miles north of Mexico City, where her subjects were the peasants, the beggars and the scenery. She then moved to Mexico City for six months to study at the Academy of Bellas Artes, started by the famed Diego Rivera.

A "visit" to her brother, George W. Bethell, in Portland, Ore., ended "with me taking over their empty attic for a studio and exhibiting there," she said. Eloise also found time to enroll at Portland State College for more credits toward her master's degree. Then she decided to see Europe. "I worked my way through five countries as a combination driver and tourist guide," she said.

Give Sewing Machine
Good Spring Cleaning

Your sewing machine will purr with gratitude—given a thorough cleaning, a drop of oil here and there, and a few minor adjustments, says Mrs. C. R. (Velma) Mitchell, Lane Extension agent. Most machines, she adds, require little more to ready them for the grand advent of sewing the spring wardrobe.

"Cleaning the sewing machine isn't difficult," she said, "but it is a job you'll want to finish once begun. Set aside several hours for the job on a day you know you'll be neither rushed nor interrupted."

To help guide you in the clean-up job, order the Extension bulletin, "Your Sewing Machine, Care and Cleaning," available by calling Lane Extension Service in the Courthouse, DI 2-1311, Ext. 201.

SUPPLIES SIMPLE

Supplies needed for the job are simple—an old toothbrush, screwdriver, pliers, orangewood stick, small dishes in which to soak machine parts, pie pans that don't leak, an oil can for squirting kerosene into the machine, and, above all, the instruction book that came with the machine. Also, plenty of old rags and newspapers.

Kerosene remains the most satisfactory cleaner for the machine, the agent said. It's safe for use indoors and will cut the gummy substances from the parts of the machine. If the job is to be done outside, cleaning solvent is safe to use. But never use gasoline, the agent warns. And use paint or varnish remover sparingly and with extreme caution. One drop on the painted section will remove the finish—permanently. "Don't be carried away with

the job," Mrs. Mitchell warns. "No one except the experienced repairman should take apart the tension. Few machine instruction books give complete details for putting the tension back together. And at best, the job is difficult."

CAUTION ADVISED

Other cautions for sewing machine cleaners:

Do not run the motor until kerosene or cleaning solvent has completely evaporated. A spark could cause a fire. Wipe dry all parts of the machine with a clean cloth. Then allow several hours for the kerosene to evaporate. Any kerosene remaining in the machine can result in rust.

Do not over-oil. Ordinarily one drop in each hole is sufficient. However, after a thorough cleaning several drops are needed. Oil the machine as it is put back together, turn the hand wheel slowly to distribute the oil, then wipe away excess oil.

Extend the life of the machine by replacing worn and broken parts. These may be ordered from sewing machine repair shops or manufacturers.

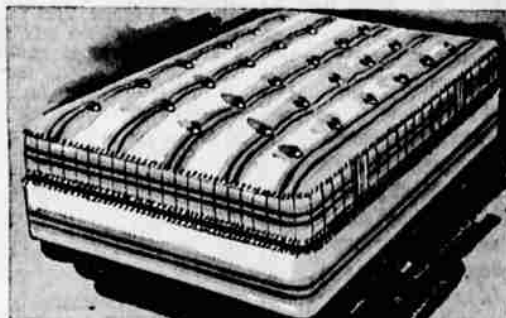
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
