

N. Y. Beauty Gives Fashion 'Gypsy Look'

PARIS (NEA) — Life began for pretty, New York-born Audrey Sedor, 23, in a Paris cafe last year.

A year after "birth" she is the favorite American model of fashion Designer Jules Crahay in the luxurious salons of Nina Ricci.

Before Audrey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Phillip Sedor, of Sunnyside, L.I., N.Y., "arrived," she acted and thought like thousands of other New York City secretaries with high school diplomas. After all, that's exactly what she was.

Like many of them, she dreamed of a grand tour of Europe, visiting Italy, France, Switzerland, Austria. So she worked and saved for two years in Erwin, Wasey, Ruthrauff and Ryan, an advertising firm in New York. Then took two months' leave of absence and set out to attain her goal with a girl friend.

MOVIE PLOT

The trip probably was like many another taken by an American working girl abroad — until the last four days which Audrey had saved for Paris.

What happened then reads like a movie plot.

Audrey explains: "On our last day we were having lunch in a little bistro near the Madeleine. At the next table was a group of young Frenchmen. One of them was Jules Crahay. Through a member of the group who spoke English, he asked me whether I would be interested in a job as a model with Nina Ricci."

An appointment was made for that afternoon. Audrey was asked to try on a couple of dresses. They fit. She was offered a job on the spot because Crahay decided that she personified his favorite exotic "gypsy look."

NEW AUDREY

But Audrey had to go back to New York. So it wasn't until several months later when Ricci and Crahay came to the U. S. that

she signed a contract and arranged to return to Paris in December, 1959. It was then that a new Audrey Sedor was born.

She had much to learn—how to walk, use makeup and speak French. Although she studied the language for three years in high

school, no one in France could understand her. But in the mannequin's dressing room, Audrey soon learned the necessary words.

After a year, "everything is so exciting and the novelty has not worn off," Audrey says.

GOOD SALARY

"I get on very well working with French girls even though their outlooks on life are totally different from those of American girls."

"Not one of the six French mannequins is a conformist. Each

has a very definite personality and of individuality.

"Anyway, French women are not spoiled the way we American women are. Another thing — at 18, a French girl is more mature than her American counterpart is at 26."

Audrey does well financially, despite the fact that it takes her two hours to make as much as she would in one hour in the same position in New York. She is very much in demand posing for international fashion magazines.

LONG HOURS

She admits the work is hard; there are grueling hours of standing while Crahay works out his particular ideas for each mannequin. These hours with little sleep come twice a year, in each of the months immediately before the seasonal showings in January and mid-summer.

But there also have been side trips to model Ricci collections in London, Casablanca and the major French provincial cities.

The pert New Yorker now lives in an apartment on the Left Bank with another American girl, a student. They shop at local stores. Never has she run into anti-American feeling.

"Instead everybody has been extremely kind and helpful, particularly in the beginning when we had some difficulty making ourselves understood."

And now this new "baby" is growing up in a dream she never believed could happen to her.

SEATTLE (P)—Heather Thomson, 20, an attractive lass from Canada, won the Metropolitan Opera's Northwest Regional Auditions Sunday at University of Washington.

Miss Thomson, a soprano from Vancouver, B. C., will be this area's representative in the semi-final auditions at the Metropolitan Opera House April 3.

If she should win in New York City, she will be entitled to a \$2,000 scholarship and a contract with the Metropolitan Opera Company.

Second place was won by Mrs. Joan Winden, 29, of Seattle, a mezzo-soprano.

Mrs. Winden is a cousin of William and A. B. Hallstrom and a niece of the G. A. Hallstroms, all of Eugene. She teaches voice at Pacific Lutheran College in Tacoma. Her husband, also a singer, is working for his master's degree at University of Washington and teaching there.

Carole (Mrs. Stanley) Stewart of Eugene represented Oregon in the lyric soprano class at the auditions.

Helen C. Bolton, 22, of Portland, a mezzo-soprano, won third place and the \$100 Anne duPont Payton Memorial Award.

Jack E. Turner, 29, Seattle baritone, was fourth.

Leonard R. Gaskins, 32, Tacoma lyric-tenor, took fifth place and a \$100 Seattle Opera Guild Award.

The judging was by Richard Crooks of Los Angeles, a former tenor for the Metropolitan. The finalists were selected from 27 singers from throughout the Pacific Northwest, British Columbia and Alaska.
