Jobs for Youth Drive Begins

Publicity drums are beating from Washington, D. C., throughout the country, including Eugene, to get employers to recognize the need to find jobs for young people out of school. Proclamations calling attention to the problem of unemployed youth have been issued by the President, the governor, and Eugene's mayor. Mayor Edwin Cone's own proclamation noted his endorsement of the nationwide drive proceeding under the slogan "Put Youth on a Job—Today's Investment, Tomorrow's Profit." 800 Seeking Work The Eugene office of the State Employment Service reported Monday that 800 out-of-school youths in Lane County are looking for work. There are half a million such employe possibilities in the nation, 8,200 in Oregon. James H. Bagan, manager of the local employment office, issued a news release saying his office will "step up" its regular promotion of jobs for out-of-school youths. He said he is laying plans that will call for participation of business, labor education, veterans', and government organizations. A Fresh Outlook Publicity connected with the "Put Youth on a Job" campaign stresses the qualities possessed by young job hunters, including a fresh outlook, ability to learn quickly, and eagerness to do a job well. The mayor's proclamation regarding the campaign stated, in part, "I call upon all local employers to fill existing trainee and other beginner jobs openings now and to make ready to fill the developing gaps in their work force by hiring trainable youth now. I also urge that employers avail themselves of the know-how of the State Employment Service in matching the skills and aptitudes of young beginners with their job openings."

Springfield School District 19 \$3,910,092 Budget Gets Committee OK

A proposed 1962-63 general fund budget of \$3,910,092 was unanimously approved Monday night by the budget committee of Springfield School District 19.

The total budget—including the general fund—calls for expenditures of \$4,899,150. That includes \$458,106 in bond interest redemption; a serial levy fund of \$82,500; a school lunch fund of \$250,152; a construction fund (from bond issues) of \$98,500; and others.

The general fund budget figure represents a 14.4 per cent increase over the current year's expenditures in the general fund—\$494,569. And it will necessitate a tax levy increase, which Supt. Walter Commons estimated to not exceed 6 or 7 mills.

The current district tax rate of 56.6 mills therefore could rise to about 63.6 mills.

Reason for Increase

The major reason for the increase, Commons said, is the addition of 31 new teachers, two new principals and a dean of boys to next year's staff—bringing the district's total staff to its highest ever. The new teachers are being hired, said Commons, to keep pace with growing enrollment (expected to increase by 300 next year) and a lessening of numbers of students per classroom.

Predicting the tax-rate increase is speculative at best, Commons said, because it is impossible to know at this time what the assessed valuation of taxable property will be and whether the overall county tax levy will be approved.

Directors set a public hearing on the budget for 8 p.m. April 9. An election is expected to be slated at that time for May
