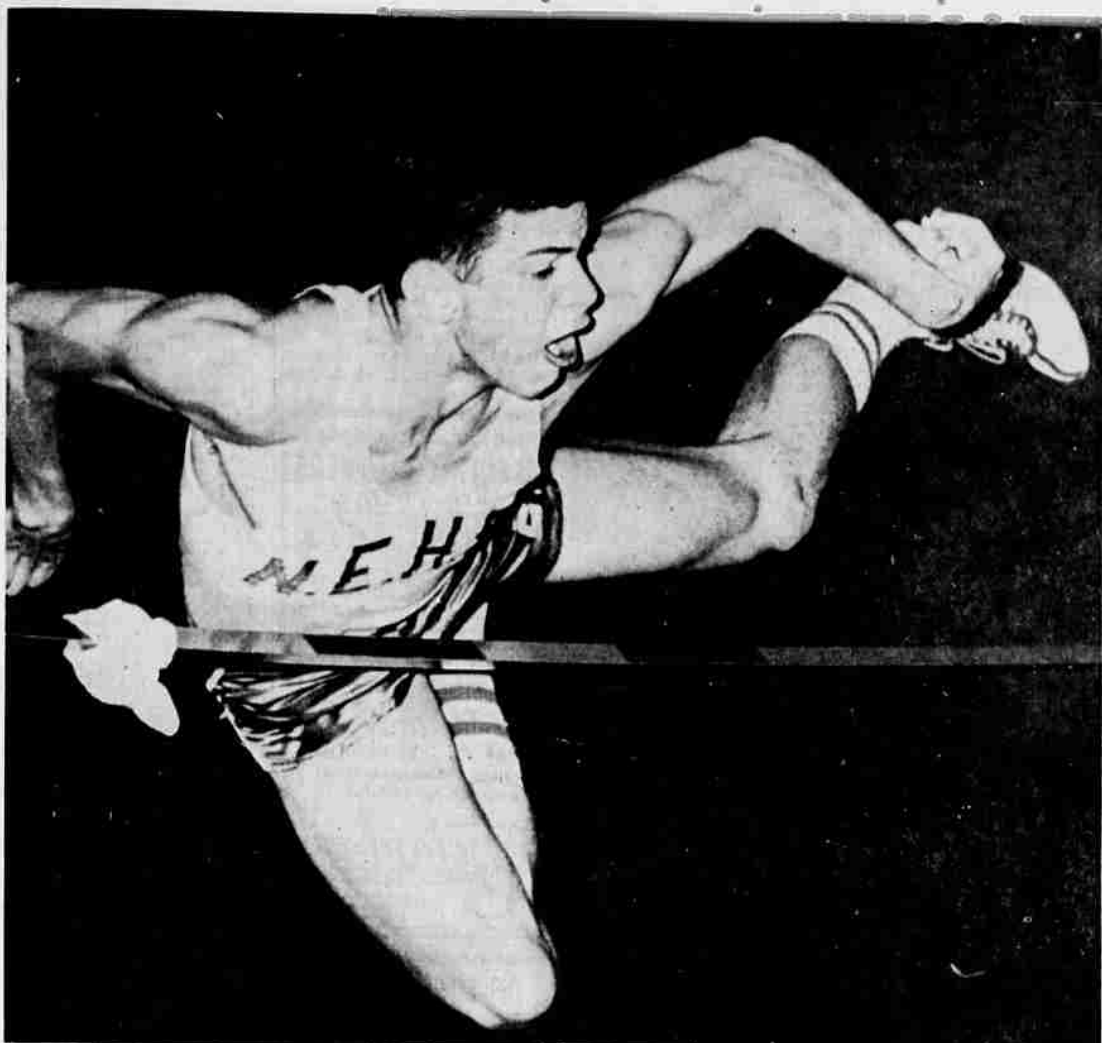

And Set Two Records

NE Trackmen Win Lane A-1 Relays

Two record-breaking performances — the only two in the meet — paced North Eugene to victory Friday night in the third annual Lane A-1 Relays.

In piling up 84 points at Silke Field, the Highlanders shattered the two-mile relay record and barely beat the distance medley mark.

It was a 1:55.7 clocking in the anchor leg of the two-mile by North Eugene's Dave Deubner that highlighted the meet. Deubner, who ran a 4:12.8 mile a week ago, also ran a 4:22 mile in anchoring the distance medley team.

The weather wasn't the best — it finished in the rain — but no one expected the meet to equal last year when nine records were broken in 13 events.

One record was tied, that a 15.2 clocking in the high hurdles by North Eugene's Pat Helfrich. But the meet had other standout individual performances.

● Gordon Payne of South Eugene was clocked in 48.8 in the anchor leg of the mile relay that was won by North Eugene.

● Allan Richards of Cottage Grove got off a heave of 55 feet, 4 1/4 — best in the state this year — in the shot put as the Grovers

finished second to North Eugene.

● And Lou Bonzon of Cottage Grove got off a throw of 181-6 to win the javelin.

Behind North Eugene in the team scoring came Cottage Grove with 59-5/6, Thurston with 47 1/2, Willamette with 47 1/2, Springfield with 45 and South Eugene with 40 1/2.

Ken Moore led off the distance medley for North Eugene with a 3:17.1 three-quarter, Ralph Rotter followed with a 5:1.2 quarter and Mike Curtis a 2:11.9 half-mile to set the stage for Deubner's 4:22.

Dave Hardy ran 2:04.2, Lynn Atkins had 2:06 and Curtis ran 2:03.3 to set the stage for Deubner's 1:55.7 in North Eugene's record two-mile relay.

North Eugene won seven of the 13 events and another victory was thrown out by disqualification.

In Texas Relays

Records May Fall If Weather Good

AUSTIN, Tex. (U) — One record was in the book but others were quite uncertain today as the rain-delayed Texas Relays prepared to jam all its finals, 50 of them, into an eight-hour period.

Texas Southern, first all-Negro college to compete in the relays, ran the 800-yard relay in 1:23.7 Friday before the rain set in and it was the lone record that emerged from a morning and afternoon of preliminaries.

It was the first time that the big track and field carnival had to postpone a schedule in its 35-year history.

Some good marks under the circumstances were turned in. Oklahoma did 1:25.8 in the university division 880-yard relay. Pete Whitehouse of Notre Dame

ran the 120-yard high hurdles in 14.5, and Donald Smith of Missouri heaved the shot 57 feet 10 inches. Jerry Dyes of Abilene Christian tossed the javelin 222 feet, 4 1/2 inches and Bill Miller of McMurry broad jumped 23 feet, 7 1/2 inches, although getting only two jumps before the event was postponed.

One open event was run off — the 400-meter hurdles. Rex Wilson of Texas and Bob Swafford of Texas Tech eased through in 54.4 to lead the way.

Weather permitting, there should be about five records set in the university and university-college classes and Texas Southern is considered capable of approaching the world's record in the 880-yard relay, a mark now possessed by Abilene Christian College.

Abilene Christian did it in 1:22.6 last year to set the world's mark.

Kansas and Missouri may push each other to a new two-mile relay record. The Texas Relays standard is 7:30.8, but Missouri has done 7:28 and Kansas 7:29.2 this season. Kansas also is taking aim at the distance medley mark of 9:51.5, having already posted 9:48.8.

The pole vault record of 15-1 might fall before the efforts of Dexter Ekins of Southern Methodist, Baylus Bennett of Texas and Fred Hansen of Rice, all having gone over the 15-foot mark.

The 120-yard high hurdles record also appears in danger if the footing is good since Ray Cunningham of Texas has dipped under 14 seconds several times and the mark is 13.9. Cunningham, however, could do only 15.8 Friday although qualifying for the finals.

Texas Southern appears destined to be the big winner of the entire meet because it is capable of winning all five of the relays in the college division and setting records in four of them.

Another Fighter Hurt

Heavyweight Suffers Brain Damage

BLUEFIELD, W. Va. (U) — Veteran heavyweight Tunney Hunsaker, 32, was in critical condition today from the effects of a knockout punch delivered in the 10th and final round of a fight Friday night.

He was afflicted with the same type of brain injury that caused the death of former welterweight champion Benny "Kid" Paret in New York this week. Doctors said he had a 50-50 chance for recovery.

Paret, who was to be buried in Miami today, never regained consciousness from the beating he suffered at the hands of Emile Griffith March 24. In contrast, Hunsaker walked to his corner after taking the 10-count and collapsed while being examined by the ring physician at nearby Beckley, where the fight was held. His opponent was Joe Sheldon of Cleveland, Ohio.

Hunsaker, a former police chief of Fayetteville, W. Va., was rushed to the Bluefield Sanatorium, a distance of nearly 45 miles, and underwent an emergency 2-hour operation by Dr. E. L. Gage, a brain specialist.

Dr. Gage said Hunsaker underwent surgery for a sub-dural hematoma hemorrhage on the right side of the brain, which had caused paralysis to the boxer's right side.

Paret suffered a similar injury after his 12th round beating from Griffith.

Dr. Gage reported Hunsaker showed slight improvement

after the surgery. He said the coma was clearing and the paralysis of Hunsaker's right side was easing. The surgeon said Hunsaker squeezed his hand and that he thought the fighter recognized him.

Mrs. Hunsaker, who collapsed when she first entered the ambulance at Beckley to be at her husband's side, said Dr. Gage told her after the operation there were signs of movement on Tunney's right side.

"But we are not encouraged to quickly," the doctor told her. "As soon as I realized he was unconscious, I thought of Paret and how similar it seemed," she replied. Mrs. Hunsaker said that only a few days ago a sportscaster had asked her husband for his views on the Paret case, and he replied: "You can get killed in a traffic accident just as easily."

Spectators said Hunsaker and Sheldon had mixed it freely. Hunsaker was stunned in the third and took an eight-count in the next round. He made a strong comeback.

Then, late in the 10th round, Hunsaker caught a vicious right cross that felled him. He got up after the 10-count and wobbled to his corner.

A professional since 1958, Hunsaker had won six, lost 11 and fought one no contest in 18 fights before last night.

A native of Princeton, Ky., he was the heavyweight Golden Gloves champion in Texas in 1952 while serving in the Air Force.

Swim Marks Fall in AAU; Saari Wins

BARTLESVILLE, Okla. (U) — A 17-year-old water polo player who just wanted to beat an Olympic champion is the first man ever to swim 1,500 meters in less than 17 minutes.

And a college sophomore whose mother taught him to swim has beaten one American record and plans to shoot for another mark.

That was the picture today in the 1962 men's AAU swimming and diving meet after Roy Saari stroked the metric mile in 16:54.1 minutes and Ted Stiekles swam the 400-yard individual medley in 4:18.1 minutes last night.

Finishing fourth in the 1,500-meter race was Ken Webb, Portland, Ore., who in a preliminary heat had bettered the meet record.

Webb was clocked in 17:26.6 minutes in a heat which saw three swimmers stroke the distance under the 17:34.0 AAU meet record set by George Breen of Buffalo, N.Y. in 1957.

All three swimmers — Webb, Brian Foss of Southern California and Lynwood Straw of New Haven, Conn. — also eclipsed the 17:33.0 time by William Chase of Yale for the fastest indoor 1,500-meter by an American citizen. Murray Rose, an Australian swimming for Southern California, holds the American record of 17:21.8.

Webb, a 16-year-old high school junior who swims for Portland's Multnomah Athletic Club, was pressed by Foss, a Southern California sophomore who was clocked in 17:26.8, and Straw, a Yale sophomore who posted a 17:29.2.

Christiansen Spins Five-Hitter

Ducks Blank Linfield, 5-0

Oregon's Webfoots came up with one of their best baseball performances of the season before about 350 fans on Howe Field Friday, defeating Linfield 5-0. Bob Christiansen became the first Oregon pitcher to go the nine-inning route this season and he had errorless support. The veteran right hander now has a 3-1 record for the season.

The Webfoots have now won 10, lost 4 and tied 1, including a sweep of the five-game series against Linfield who have won two while losing the five to the Webfoots.

Don Kirsch's Oregonians made good use of two double plays in a game that required only one hour and 52 minutes to complete.

Christiansen struck out six and walked only one as he set down the side in order for the first four innings. Two of the six hits he allowed were scratch singles.

The Webfoots had three extra-base hits of the eight off starting pitcher Clayton Stubbs, although the Linfield left handed

hurler allowed only two earned runs. Catcher Ray Haroldson paced the Oregon hitting with three in four trips to the plate, including a double. Fred Pettengill, sophomore third baseman, had a double and added his third home run of the season in the fifth—a 360-foot driver over the left-center field fence.

What proved to be the winning run came in the first inning when Haroldson was safe on a scratch single and went to second on a throwing error. He scored on Dave Moore's single.

A base on balls, Pettengill's double, two Linfield errors, a wild pitch and Christiansen's scratch single scored three runs in the third. Pettengill's home run ended the scoring.

Linfield's biggest threat came in the seventh when Bill Wallin walked with one out. John May, who had three hits for Linfield, singled to left. Dennis Schweitzer, was credited with a scratch single where Pettengill moved in front of shortstop Leon Hayes on the grounder — filling the bases. Devin Dempsey grounded to second baseman Moore who

tossed to Hayes at second for the force and the relay to first baseman Sandy Nosler completed the double play that retired the side.

Bob Raffalo, a second baseman, pitched three innings of hitless ball for Linfield.
