HEU's 'Show Off' Talents

Justifiably pleased with the success of their own production—Lane County's 24th "Homemakers' Festival"—some 400 homemakers settled back Thursday to review the year's activities in the home extension program, to admire exhibits arranged by neighboring units, to meet new officers and directors and enjoy the accompanying festivities.

Mrs. Clark Hill, Junction City, chairman of the Lane Home Extension Advisory Committee, presided over the morning session in the Agricultural Bldg., Lane County Fairgrounds. Her successor, Mrs. Lloyd Strand of Thurston, presided in the afternoon.

Other new officers who represent some 1500 homemakers (the members of 39 home extension units) are: Mrs. Glen Beamer, Route 5, Eugene, vice-chairman; Mrs. D. M. Bush, Eugene, treasurer; and Mrs. Foster Harold, Route 1, Cottage Grove.

Two new committee members were installed by Mrs. Carl Rutherford, Eugene, a member of the Oregon Home Extension Council. They are Mrs. Walter Roberts, Blachly, and Mrs. Vernon Kelso, Elmira. Mrs. Hill and Mrs. Lloyd Diess, Route 5, Eugene, retiring members, will become members of the Alumnae of Lane Extension Advisory Committee.

Speaker on the morning pro-

gram, Dorothy Sherrill Miller, Oregon Extension specialist in family finance, described her audience as homemakers with a "ready to go" spirit, eager to meet the modern challenges in homemaking.

"The work load for the modern homemaker is lighter, but the mental load has never been heavier," she said, adding that the source of this mental burden is money. The position to be desired regarding money, she said, is to be able to "push money around—not to let it push you around."

"Deal your savings off the top of the paycheck," she said. "Few people are successful in saving 'left-overs'."

Among other money-saving tips Mrs. Miller shared with homemakers:

- Make a totem pole of values and goals then translate it to a "plan for spending."
- "Spot check" spending, then plug the leaks.
- Avoid impulse buying by "pausing before purchasing."

Pearl Heath, chairman of the art department at Oregon College of Education, Monmouth, delighted her audience with a description of her tour through Russia. The slides she showed, she confided, had been taken with a "camera I bought in Russia from a man who couldn't speak English, and I can't speak Russian." (The pictures were excellent).

But it was the exhibits about them that got the big share of attention from the homemakers. The octagon-shaped building was a colorful kaleidoscope with exhibits from most of the 39 home extension units.

Cheeseboards, wooden plates, cupracks, bowls—all bore the quaint designs characteristic of the freehand approach to peasant art taught during a creativity workshop. The Junction City unit struck a serious note with its "Grandma's Pantry"—a seven-day food supply for an emergency.

Hayden Bridge and Blachly units depicted "how to work smarter, not harder" through efficient work habits. Willakenzie, Noti-Walton and Spencer Creek units arranged tantalizing displays of "Party Sandwiches." Goshen, McKenzie River, and Willagillespie units carried out the festival theme, "A World United."

Lakeside unit near Cottage Grove displayed a space cake—with a brown frosted world balanced over a white frosted sheet cake!

Hints From Heloise

Dear Heloise:

In my nearly 40 years experience in retail drug business, I have received thousands of requests for the "best" method of removing certain types of spots and stains.

The usual run-of-the-mill spots and stains respond to the various commercial preparations available at every corner drug store. I am mentioning a few answers for some real toughies. CHOCOLATE stains seem to be a perennial problem and are quite easily removed by the application of glycerin. Just massage the glycerin into the fabric well and wash out with plain water. If all the stain is not removed the first time, additional applications will do the trick.

MERTHIOLATE and MERCUROCHROME stains seem tough, too. These stains may be removed with acidulated alcohol, and this usually works wonders. Just add a little vinegar to denatured alcohol and in most cases the stains will be removed from either cloth or the hands with the first application. (1 teaspoon vinegar to 1 cup alcohol).

From my experience, another tough, common spot to remove is one caused by complex matter such as gravy or food containing sugar, grease and solid matter combined.

Lay the spotted cloth flat on several thicknesses of a towel. Dab on ordinary detergent and water and massage gently. Use enough water in the mixture to send the stain right through the cloth into the absorbent material beneath.

When all the evidence of the stain has disappeared, keep on dabbing plain warm water through the area that was stained.

It is a good idea to shift the stained cloth to different areas on the absorbent material beneath.

Finish by wiping the now thoroughly wet area where the spot was with a clean wet cloth from the outside of the wet ring towards the center of the spot.
