

200 Boats to Participate in White Water Parade

More than 200 boats are set to shoot the McKenzie River rapids in the 24th annual White Water Parade Sunday.

A good 10 per cent of them, based on past experience, are expected to take a spill somewhere between Redside, where

the big float begins, and Leaburg Lake, where it ends. Spectators who drive up the McKenzie, both for a day out of doors and for the fun of seeing a variety of water craft move down the stream, will be seeking viewing spots during the morning.

If they wish, they can take in breakfast at the Vida Hall where the Springfield Jaycees will serve all the hotcakes and trimmings you can eat for \$1 for adults and 50 cents for children. Breakfast is served from 8 to 10 a.m.

The parade itself begins about

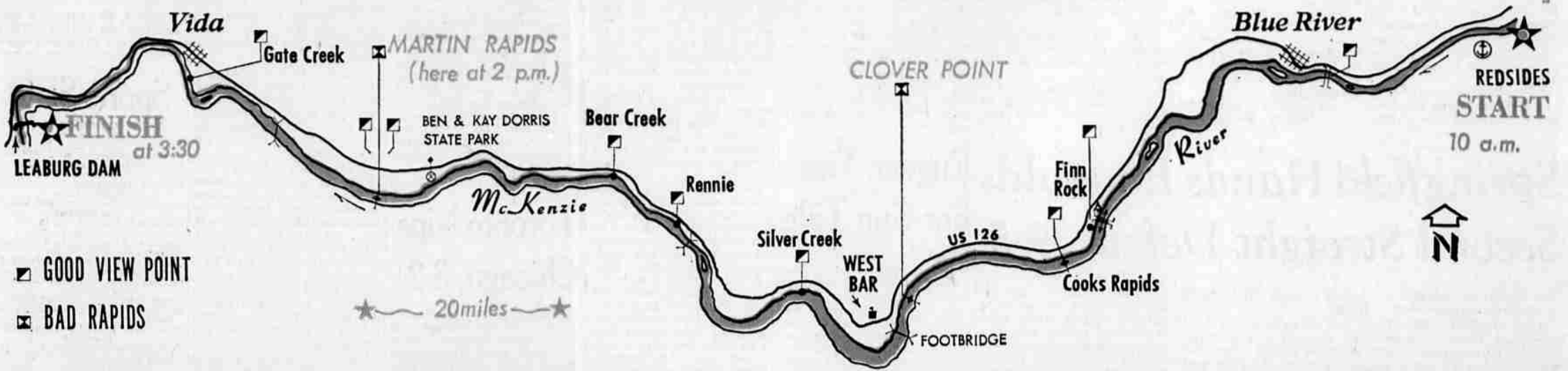
10 a.m. at Redside just upstream from Blue River. It is slated to reach West's gravel bar for lunch about 12:30 p.m. During the lunch stop there will be music, other entertainment and introduction of guests. Sen. Wayne Morse and State Sen. Robert Straub, who will

ride in the parade, will be among those introduced. Their appearance will be graced by the formal introduction also of White Water Queen Karen McClaskey and her court of princesses, Karen Simcox, Karen Kullberg, Linda Loffer and Linda Wilder. All five were picked

from a group of contestants sponsored by University of Oregon's women's living organizations.

As in the past, Fox Movietone Films will shoot the parade for its newsreels with Paris Emery, Seattle cameraman, doing the job.

There will, of course, be more than just the regular guide boats in the parade and from more places than just Lane County. Included in the parade will be kayaks, skin divers and people floating on inner tubes. Some boats are coming from Seattle; some from Colorado.

Bunny Invasion to Aid Annual Easter Seal Drive

Blue, pink and yellow "bunnies" will invade Eugene and Cottage Grove Saturday to sell lapel lilies for the annual Easter Seal drive.

In Eugene, the "bunnies" will be 120 Roosevelt Junior High School girls who volunteered for the sales work in downtown areas. Junior high girls will also be selling the lilies in Cottage Grove, and members of the Boy Scouts and Job's Daughters will be in charge of the sales in Junction City.

Springfield's Easter lily sale will be held April 21. Other Easter Seal drive events this weekend will include benefit movie programs at the McKenzie Theatre in Springfield and the Valley Theatre in Junction City on Saturday from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The admission charge, 50 cents, will be donated to the Children's Hospital School in Eugene.

On Sunday, the Willamette Racing Pigeon Club will have a pigeon race in conjunction with the McKenzie White Water Parade. The sponsor's fee for each pigeon will be donated to the hospital school. Further information on this program is available by calling DI 5-0928.

Council Discusses Stricter Control Of Vicious Dogs

Eugene's city council members Thursday discussed ways to make the city's dog control ordinance more effective against vicious dogs.

They seemed to favor adopting a provision from Portland's dog control law. This would make it illegal for any owner to keep a dog if the owner has knowledge that it has ever bitten a person.

The city's present dog control law simply says that vicious dogs shall not be allowed to run at large.

A Willamette-area housewife complained to the council last Monday that a dog in her neighborhood has bitten four children and an adult and still frequently runs loose. Most of the children were bitten when they wandered onto the dog owner's yard or driveway, she said.

City Manager Hugh McKinley told the council, meeting as a committee-of-the-whole, that his staff will pursue the ordinance change.

Mayor Edwin Cone said one thing that will have to be defined is the difference between a "bite" and a "nip."

In another matter involving animals, the council committee expressed "endorsement of the principle" of an ordinance proposed by the Lane Humane Society.

This ordinance would prohibit stores from dyeing small chicks or rabbits and giving them or selling them to children for Easter promotions. The council members said they intend to adopt the ordinance, but won't have the necessary legal time period to do it before Easter this year.

The council committee recommended the Eugene Planning Commission be upheld in denying a variance request by Albert C. Jagger for an apartment house between Olive and Charnelton, at 28th Avenue; and for denying a rezoning request by Victor Lindgren for property at 830 Sprague St. from RA outer residential to R-2 duplex.

Don Allen, public works director, presented an estimate of the cost of converting an alley to a pedestrian way from Broadway to the park blocks, between Oak and Pearl. He estimated the cost at \$5,000. The council committee decided to see if downtown merchants are interested in sharing in the costs, as they did for the other two pedestrian walkways.

The council committee also recommended the full council give endorsement to the county library system measure that will be on the May 18 ballot; and voted to recommend that the city hall go on "summertime" hours of 7 a.m. until 4 p.m., starting April 29, provided skeleton crews remain on duty to 5 p.m.

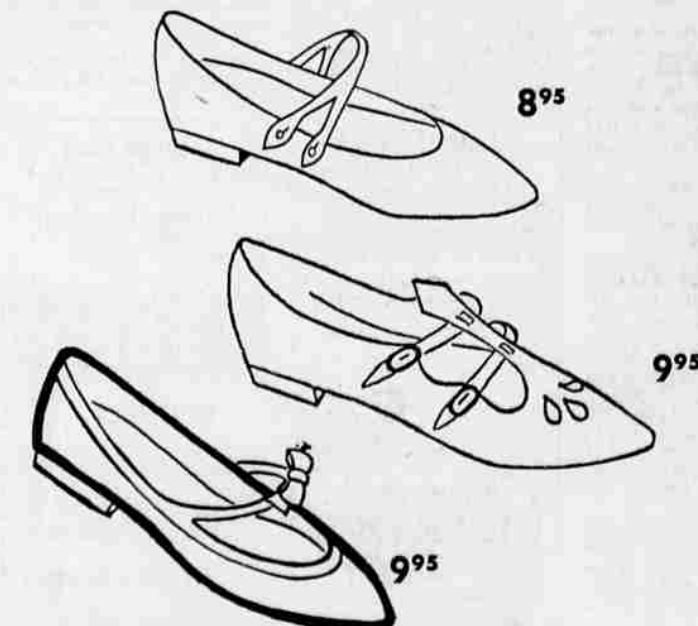
