Stanford Invades Hayward Field

With a team composed of some men capable of placing in the NCAA but others who couldn't even make the team at Oregon, Payton Jordan brings the best Stanford track team in six years into Hayward Field Saturday.

The Indians will be trying to halt a Webfoot home track win streak that dates back to 1948

and stretches through 33 straight dual meet victories. Stanford has never beaten Oregon at Hayward Field or anywhere else.

But for the first time since March 24 when Oregon was pushed to the twelfth event before disposing of San Jose State, the Ducks will be facing a team with more than just a dream of upsetting them.

Among Jordan's array of talent at Stanford this year is a

lefthanded pole vaulter who has soared higher than any other southpaw vaulter in America. Phil White, the unorthodox junior, cleared 15-1/2 last week during Stanford's 68-63 victory over UCLA.

Only Janis Krasovskis of Russia has gone higher among the world's lefthanders. He has done 15-3/4.

It was White's best vault ever, and as consistent as he is, he rarely ever drops below 14-6,

which incidently is his lowest mark this spring.

Strongest in the field events but by no means slow when it comes running a foot race, the Indians also have one of the nation's best discus throwers. Gigantic Dave Weill (6-foot-7 1/2, 270 pounds), who has come within two feet of the national collegiate record, has hurled the platter 188-6 1/2 this season, nearly 25 feet further than Oregon's Dave Steen and Jerry

Stubblefield. Don Bell of the Cards (168-9) has also outdistanced both the Webfoots.

Add to White, Weill and Bell a couple of 24-foot broadjumpers and javelin ace Art Batchelder who has tossed the spear 241-5 1/2 and it's evident that Oregon will have to run up a pile of points in the running events to escape with its winning streak intact.

After switching his personnel around like chessmen from event to event the past couple of weeks, Oregon coach Bill Bowerman will settle down to playing the game seriously Saturday.

Besides the obvious—wanting to make Stanford the 34th Hayward Field victim in a row—Bowerman will be taking a last look at his squad in competition before sending it to Los Angeles to tangle with Southern Cal.

Saturday, Dryol Burleson shifts back to the mile after three weeks away from his favorite race. He'll go along with Vic Reeve, who pushed Burly to an 8:42.5 two mile clocking a week ago, and sophomore Clayton Steinke. Although he's not liable to threaten Burleson, Stanford's Harry McCalla may be just about all Reeve and Steinke can handle.

McCalla's best mile time is 4:07.6, but he's run each race progressively faster for the past four weeks in a row.

Bowerman isn't taking Stanford lightly in other events either. Harry Jerome will return to his familiar double—the 100 and 220—after running the furlong and the 440 last week against Brigham Young.

And Sig Ohlemann, Archie San Romani and Ted Abram, all who figure to be under 1:49 in the 880 this spring, will go in that event against Rich Klier, who has run the distance in 1:51.7.

San Romani may double back in the two mile along with Keith Forman and Mike Lehner if the meet's winner is still in doubt at the time of that next-to-last event.

Times should be somewhat faster than last week, since the track has been rolled and the Ducks are only a week away from reaching their peak for USC.

The meet has been moved up a half hour—field events starting at 1:00 p.m. and the mile at 1:30 p.m.—because of the Hayward Relays which will be run before and after the Oregon-Stanford meet.

In other action on the coast this weekend, USC hopes to make Washington its 104th straight dual meet victim at Seattle, while Oregon State is favored to defeat Cal and Fresno State in a triple dual meet at Berkeley.

Smeekeens Says He Won't Try To Stop Game

LANSING, Mich. (AP)—You can relax now, Tigers and Yanks and baseball fans.

State Sen. John P. Smeekeens says he won't try and stop Sunday's game between Detroit and New York.

Smeekeens had threatened to seek enforcement of a 1846 Michigan blue law forbidding sports contests and spectating on Sunday if the Senate didn't go along with his contention that the blue laws of Michigan need revising.

The measure, shutting most retail stores on Saturday or Sunday, passed the Senate Thursday. It also legalizes Sunday baseball.

Toronto Nips Chicago, 3-2

TORONTO (AP)—The Toronto Maple Leafs find themselves in the delightful position of being two games up on the Chicago Black Hawks Friday in their best-of-seven Stanley Cup championship and could put an early end to the hockey series if they play with the same authority in Chicago as they did on their home ice.

Aiming to win their first cup in 11 years, the Leafs put on another tremendous exhibition in turning back Chicago's bid 3-2 Thursday night. It was a satisfying triumph because the Hawks played much better hockey than they did in the opener Tuesday when they fell 4-1.

The two victories by Toronto were not totally unexpected because the Hawks have won only one game at Maple Leaf Gardens since Jan. 2, 1960. That was last March 17 by a 3-1 count.

The Hawks cannot be counted out as yet. These are the same Hawks who lost two games to Montreal in the semifinal series and then came back to win four straight.

Billy Harris put the Leafs in front Thursday on a goal at 2:35 while Murray Balfour was serving a penalty. For a time it appeared as if that was to be the end of the scoring. Midway in the third period, however, Stan Mikita tied with the first of his two goals.

Wasting no more than one minute, Toronto came back with Frank Mahovlich making it 2-1 and some seven minutes later George Armstrong clinched the decision with Toronto's third goal.

Game Scheduled By Rugby Club

The Oregon Rugby Club returns to action Saturday after a layoff of nearly a month.

The Ducks will tangle with a team composed of former Western Washington ruggers on the university's practice football field at 3:30 p.m., immediately following the conclusion of the Oregon-Stanford track meet on adjoining Hayward Field.

Boosted by the addition of several new players and the return from the injury list of many others, Oregon will be out to avenge an early season loss to Western Washington—the team for which most of the players in Saturday's opponent were then playing.

There is no admission charge to the game.

Finsterwald Jumps Into Tourney Lead

GREENSBORO, N. C. (AP)—That fat 77 Dow Finsterwald shot in finishing third in the Masters tournament playoff with Arnold Palmer and Gary Player last Monday apparently had no lasting ill effects.

Finsterwald, 32, playing from Tequesta, Fla., carried a two-stroke lead into today's second round of the \$35,000 Greater Greensboro open golf tournament after a super 65 opening round Thursday.

"Finster," as his fellow pros on tour call him, shaved six shots off par, playing the 36-35 course in 32-33. His score was one stroke over the tournament record set 21 years ago by Byron Nelson.

Finsterwald's 12-stroke improvement over his last round at the Masters gave him a two-stroke edge over runnerup Julius Boros of Southern Pines, N.C., who carded 33-34—67. Back of them were six 68 shooters, seven at 69 and 13 at 70.

At par 71, with eight others, was Arnold Palmer, the Masters king, who had a so-so putting day and went to the practice green after his round to sharpen his short game.

The 68 shooters included Mike Souchak, the defending champion, who played the last five holes five under par with a chip-in eagle from 45 feet and three birdie putts of 14 to 15 feet.

At 70 was Samuel Jackson Snead, already \$23,000 richer for having played in previous Greensboro tournaments, and pursuing his eighth success here.

Finsterwald, playing during the day's worst weather—it was chilly and raining hard throughout the morning—holed out a full 4 iron from 170 yards on the first hole for an eagle two.

Boros, husky former U.S. Open king, had birds on putts of 25 and 15 feet and salvaged pars twice on the four occasions he missed the green.

The low amateur at par 71 was Bobby Loy of Virginia Beach, the Virginia state champion.

Emerson, Drysdale Gain Tourney Semis

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Roy Emerson of Australia, the world's top-ranked amateur, polished off Chris Crawford of Corpus Christi, Tex. University in straight sets Thursday, 6-2, 6-1, 6-2, to move into the semifinals of the River Oaks tennis tournament.

Cliff Drysdale of Port Elizabeth, South Africa—playing in his first U.S. tournament—beat Ron Holmberg of Brooklyn, N.Y. 8-6, 6-4, 0-6, 6-4 in another quarter-final match.

Drysdale will play Emerson in the semifinals.

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Springfield Hands Emeralds Second Straight Defeat, 9-5

CASA GRANDE, Ariz.—The Springfield Giants, with Jack Simmons pitching the first five innings and allowing one earned-run, defeated the Eugene Emeralds 9-5 in a spring-training baseball game played in the "big park" here Thursday. The game was played under a blistering sun with no wind.

The Emeralds are now 11-6 for the season following their

second straight loss to Springfield.

Had not manager Bud Ryerly felt obligated to give 19-year-old Willie Merced a "look see" on the mound, the game would at least have been closer. The youngster, who last season had an earned-run average of something over 40.00, walked four and allowed three runs in one inning—the sixth.

Matt Gayeski, the starter who went five innings, was found

for nine hits and six runs, but only four earned. He was not as effective as usual, though. Byerly also tried another newcomer, right handed Dave Squires, who blanked the Giants in the last two innings. The lanky pitcher, who has been out of baseball for a while, allowed two hits, struck out two and walked none.

Julio Linares, Gerry Kushner, Dick Pawlon and Don McGillicuddy furnished the power at the plate for Springfield. Linares had a triple and the other three ex-Emeralds had two hits each in the 13-hit attack.

Despite two errors the Giants came up with two double plays, one started by Linares at second and another by third baseman Joe Sparks. Charlie Koss was on the pivot for one.

Simmons gave up seven hits, but struck out four and walked two. Dick Denton hurled the final four and gave up three hits and three runs, one earned, but struck out only two with four walks and a wild pitch.

Center fielder Carlos Dore had three of Eugene's 10 hits.

Outfielder Wally Cockrell and second baseman Roger Hayden both had doubles and catcher Dick Dietz had two hits for the Emms.

The Emeralds left 12 men stranded.

The Eugene outfielders had a busy day. Dore and Cockrell with four putouts and left fielder Joe McLaughlin with three. The Emeralds are not expected to play Springfield again until Monday.
