

In South Viet Nam Troops Hit Rebel Bases

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Government troops attacked two Communist guerrilla bases in central Viet Nam's Ninh Thuan province over the weekend and killed 74 Viet Cong fighters, the semi-official Viet Nam news agency reported Tuesday.

Twelve government troops were reported killed in one operation Friday and seven wounded. Losses in the second battle Saturday were not reported.

The agency said the government troops liberated 40 mountaineers held at one of the bases. The battles took place 20 miles southwest and 25 miles north-east of Phan Rang, capital of the province.

The agency also reported the Viet Cong blew up a tank truck Sunday in An Giang Province, killing seven militiamen with the truck.

Informed military sources reported that guerrillas operating in the Mekong River delta were believed to have captured several 40 mm anti-aircraft guns last week. Such guns would be a major threat to U.S. Army helicopters that fly Vietnamese troops into battle in the delta.

Stahr in Saigon
The U.S. helicopters are frequently hit by Viet Cong small arms fire, and at least one is believed to have been hit by 50 caliber machine-gun fire. One has been brought down, but no flight casualties have been reported.

U.S. Army Secretary Elvis J. Stahr Jr., visiting Saigon during a Far Eastern tour, said the U.S. government believes Viet Nam can be cleared of Communist subversion in "a matter of a few years" if the people of South Viet Nam are determined to remain free.

Stahr said the battle against Communist subversion basically depends on the will of the people to resist.

Further Buildup?
Asked at a news conference whether a further buildup of American military advisers is planned, Stahr replied: "It depends on the way the situation develops. Whatever is needed we expect to provide." He added that he does not expect the American troops to take part in combat because that is "a job for the Vietnamese themselves."

"We need to give them support, but they can do the fighting," he said.

Also visiting South Viet Nam was a four-man American committee including Allen Dulles, former director of the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency. The committee reportedly is studying combat indoctrination of U.S. armed forces in Asia. It was sent out by the Department of Defense.

Other members are former Army Undersecretary Karl Bendetsen, Brig. Gen. S.L.A. Marshall, ret., a military historian, and Theodore Braun, a Los Angeles public relations man.

Almond Picked For Judgeship
WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy Monday nominated former Virginia Gov. J. Lindsay Almond Jr. to be a judge of the U.S. Court of Customs and Patent Appeals.

The lifetime position pays \$25,500 annually.

Almond, a native of Charlottesville, Va., will be 64 on June 15. He served as Virginia's governor from January 1958 until January of this year. Before that he was state attorney general and a member of Congress.

Almond was nominated to succeed retiring Judge Ambrose O'Connell.

Man, 32, Accused Of Passing Check
Richard K. H. Bryant, 32, of Gold Hill, was arraigned in Lane County District Court Friday on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses.

He is accused of giving a worthless \$27 check to Boon's El Prado Motel in Eugene on April 10. Bryant requested an attorney be appointed to represent him.

Traffic Violations Gain in March
SALEM (AP)—There were 20,492 traffic violations for March of this year reported by Oregon courts to the State Motor Vehicles Department, statistics showed Tuesday.

This was up from the 19,206 convictions reported to the department for March of 1961.

The courts reported 213 convictions for driving while intoxicated, a charge that results in mandatory suspension of the driver's license upon conviction.

The department said it suspended 193 additional licenses upon court recommendations, another 256 because of repeated accident or violation records, and 54 for various other reasons.

Trio Ousted Vatican Supports Archbishop's Act

VATICAN CITY (AP)—The Vatican firmly backs an American Roman Catholic archbishop's excommunication of three segregationists, informed sources said Tuesday.

Archbishop Joseph Francis Rummel of New Orleans, La., was declared to have—as do all bishops and archbishops of the Church—full authority for his action.

"The fact that he took it," one source said, "indicates he probably had no alternative."

The same sources recalled that the archbishop's fight against racism in his archdiocese was of long standing. The Vatican's L'Osservatore Romano, on Oct. 18, 1955, in a stern editorial entitled "Stains of Race," approved his action in defending a Negro priest who had been prevented from saying Mass.

The fight of the segregationists could find no sympathy in the Vatican, whose pontiffs have frequently spoken against racial actions.

These sources also pointed out that the College of Cardinals now includes Negroes and the number of Negro bishops and archbishops in recent years has exceeded 50. There are many Negro priests and nuns.

Canon Law 335 directs bishops to govern their dioceses in spiritual and temporal matters and states they have legislative, judicial and punitive powers.

Only this month, three solemn consistories in the Vatican preceded the scheduled May 6 canonization of the Blessed Martin De Porres, a 16th Century Peruvian lay brother who was the son of a Spanish nobleman and a Negro slave. De Porres will become the first mulatto saint of the Catholic Church. There already are a number of Negro saints.

Spacecraft To Make Trip
NEWPORT NEWS, Va. (AP)—The Friendship 7 spacecraft which carried John Glenn on three earth orbits will make another round the world trip.

Manned space craft center officials at Langley Air Force Base have announced this trip will take several months, rather than 4½ hours.

The heat-sealed capsule is scheduled to leave Washington on Thursday for Mexico City, Rio de Janeiro, and Buenos Aires. The craft eventually will reach the major cities of the free world after its Latin American swing.

The capsule is to remain for three or four days at each stop, officials said. Included on its itinerary are Madrid, London, Paris, Cairo, New Delhi, Manila, Tokyo, Australia and, possibly, the Seattle World's Fair.

The capsule ultimately will repose in the Smithsonian Institution in Washington.

Two Bicyclists Killed in Crash
RED BLUFF, Calif. (AP)—Two young men from southern Oregon were killed Sunday while riding bicycles on the Pacific Highway south of Red Bluff.

They were Thomas F. Schuler, 19, and Clare F. Barney, 21, both of Medford, whose cycles collided with an auto driven by Richard C. Sands, 28, Orland, Calif.

Police said Schuler and Barney had been on a bicycle outing to Chico, and apparently were heading back towards Redding when the accident happened. Both were working at Redding.

The Tehama County Sheriff's office said Sands is being held for investigation of manslaughter.

Goa to Be Evacuated
LISBON, Portugal (AP)—An official announcement says the Portuguese liners Vera Cruz, Patria and Mozambique will repatriate 3,500 Portuguese held since India seized the Goa enclaves last December. Charter planes will fly the prisoners from Bombay to Karachi, Pakistan, where they will board ships.

16 Cubans Win Asylum In Embassy
HAVANA (AP)—Sixteen refugees from Fidel Castro's regime won asylum in the Brazilian Embassy Monday after a city bus driver had smashed his vehicle through two metal fences surrounding the building.

Cuban guards posted around the embassy were too surprised to open fire.

The driver rammed the 35-foot bus through an iron fence at the end of the embassy garden, then tore through a strong steel fence 10 feet beyond.

The passengers, including several women and children, dashed into a building on the grounds where more than 200 refugees are lodged.

The noise of the crash brought scores of neighbors flocking to the scene.

Witnesses said some of the passengers carried packages and bundles, indicating the coup had been planned in advance. One woman appeared to be pregnant.

Only the bus conductor chose to return to Cuban jurisdiction. "I am a revolutionary," he said as he left the embassy grounds.

One Year After Bay of Pigs, Cuban Exiles' Hopes Fading

MIAMI, Fla. — Just a year ago, about 1,500 Cuban exiles invaded their homeland in a daring but unsuccessful effort to oust Fidel Castro.

The expanding and divided exile colony today appears more interested in raising funds to buy the freedom of prisoners taken in that incursion than in buying arms for another move against Castro.

Happiness in much of the colony over the prospect of ransoming all the 1,179 Bay of Pigs invasion prisoners for \$82 million—the price set by Castro—is offset by general gloom over fading hope of returning to Cuba soon.

Cardona at Helm
There is less talk, on the surface at least, of possible anti-Castro military action than perhaps at any time in two years.

The Cuban Revolutionary Council, formed a month before the April 17, 1961, invasion in order to help organize it, still exists. It is the largest of about 200 anti-Castro groups, and the only one maintaining contact with the U.S. government.

Jose Miro Cardona, its first president, still is at the helm. Asked for a statement on the invasion anniversary, Miro Cardona declined. Last weekend, while at Miami International Airport to greet 60 ransomed Bay of Pigs prisoners, the council head said merely his attitude was "one of hope."

Earlier this year, Miro had said he "hoped and aspired" that 1962 would be "the year of liberation."

Four groups calling for action have separated recently from the council.

Division among the refugees extends to the matter of ransoming prisoners. The Student Revolutionary Directorate, one of the withdrawing groups, and
