

# Common Market Nations Unity Talks Break Down

PARIS—Efforts by the six Common Market nations to extend West European economic unity into the political sphere have broken down over Belgian-Dutch demands that Britain join in the talks.

The snag arose Tuesday as foreign ministers of the European Economic Community discussed setting up a political authority to coordinate foreign policy and defense activities of West Germany, France, Italy, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg.

The French, who acted as conference spokesmen, said Belgium's Paul-Henri Spaak and Joseph Luns of the Netherlands threw up the roadblock after all six ministers had agreed that any plans for political association should be submitted to London for comment.

## 'Refugees' Ask U.N. For Backing

The Mexican-refugee "Zapata Movement" was seeking the support of United Nations members Wednesday for action to avert the "revolution and blood bath" which it says will sweep through Mexico if its demands are ignored.

The refugees were hoping to find a country which would take their case to the Security Council on the ground that the situation is a threat to peace.

U.N. officials had already refused to intervene, saying the refugees' charges against the government of President Adolfo Lopez Mateos were an internal matter with which the U.N. could not deal.

**'Nothing We Can Do'**  
"There is nothing the acting Secretary General can do about it," a secretariat spokesman said.

Half a dozen Mexicans visited the U.N. Tuesday with a petition bearing 75 signatures saying members of their movement would rise against the Lopez regime within 10 days unless their demands were met.

Marcantonio Diaz Infante, an attorney, was identified as the leader of the opposition group, named for the late revolutionary, Emiliano Zapata.

Official Mexican sources scoffed at the petition, saying its sponsors are "mentally ill."

Jorge Castaneda, Mexico's acting chief U.N. delegate, said the complaint is "too grotesque to merit comment or to be taken seriously," and another official spokesman said it is "absurd... without any basis in fact."

### Naturalized American

Mexican officials said Diaz is a naturalized American who has not been in Mexico since 1956, "when he was arrested and charged with fraud and practicing law without a license."

Police in Mexico City described Diaz as "a paranoid fugitive from justice" born Marco I. Martinez Infante in San Luis Potosi. In addition to the Diaz alias, they said, he has at various times used the name Ignacio Martinez Infante.

They said also that he has a criminal record dating back to 1944 in such U.S. cities as San Francisco, Los Angeles, San Diego, Laredo and Corpus Christi.

A "rebel" spokesman, asked about Diaz's alleged police record, said: "Irrespective of the potential truth of those charges, the government of Adolfo Lopez Mateos is faced with a revolution."

## NCC Gets Permit For Girls Dormitory

A \$133,180 building permit was issued by the city of Eugene's Building Dept. Monday for construction of a girls' dormitory at Northwest Christian College.

The extension will be located at 835 E. 12th Ave., between Alder and Kincaid. The 24,973 square foot addition will be of concrete and brick construction.

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Britain, which is negotiating to join the economic union, suggested last week that the time had come for her to join in the political talks also. The West Germans cold-shouldered the proposal. France reportedly feels the same way.

### Two Balk at Plan

French informants said the French, West Germans, Italian and Luxembourg ministers agreed that a political accord should be signed if Britain, after examining it, raised no objections. Spaak and Luns balked and demanded that the British be brought into the negotiations as an active participant.

Spaak reportedly told the ministers that as long as Britain remains outside the Common Market, he will not sign a treaty on political association even if it conforms to Belgian views.

The six ministers adjourned the conference without issuing a communique or fixing a date for their next meeting. They agreed, however, to continue talks at the North Atlantic Treaty Organization ministerial conference in Athens May 3 or at one of their periodic sessions in Brussels on Common Market affairs.

### Fear Domination

The Belgian-Dutch move indicated that the two lowland nations, which have strong trade links with Britain, refuse to be submerged in a continental bloc dominated by President Charles de Gaulle's government or by a French-West German combine.

Belgium and the Netherlands have been urging a West European federal system with surrender of some sovereignty to a supranational body. De Gaulle wants a looser confederation and is supported by West Germany and Italy.

The French contend any decisions of a political association should be based on unanimous agreement, thus giving each member a veto. The Belgians and the Dutch say some matters at least should be decided by majority vote.

### Dodds New President

LONDON (AP)—Sir Charles Dodds, biochemistry professor at London University, is the new president of the Royal College of Physicians. He succeeds Sir Robert Platt.

LONDON (AP)—Another sharp election setback for Prime Minister Harold Macmillan's ruling Conservative party brought warnings Wednesday that the party's prospects of being returned to office at the next general election are seriously threatened.

A special parliamentary election in North Derby Tuesday gave victory as expected to a Labor candidate. But the resurgent Liberals, riding a wave of government unpopularity, pushed the Conservative candidate into third place.

It was the government's fifth setback in special elections in the last six weeks. Most of the Conservative defectors have voted Liberal.

Wednesday two Conservative papers—the Daily Mail and Daily Telegraph—warned that the Liberals are a serious threat that could split the Conservative vote in the general election, expected in the fall of 1963, and put the Labor party in power.

## Rocket Spreads Mammoth Cloud

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Nike-Cajon rocket spread a huge pink and yellow cloud of sodium vapor high over Virginia Tuesday in a study of wind velocities and upper air densities.

The rocket was launched from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Wallops Island station. It began releasing the cloud at an altitude of 26 miles and continued upward to a height of about 144 miles. The cloud was visible for hundreds of miles from the launching site.

## Moslems Impatient

# Resistance Clouds Future of Algeria

TUNIS — One month has elapsed since the signing of the Algerian cease-fire, but the grim, bloody resistance of the European settlers in Algeria's major cities casts a long shadow over the country's future.

At their Tunis headquarters, the Moslem nationalist rebels are becoming increasingly impatient with the raging terrorism of the European right-wing Secret Army Organization. Tuesday 49 persons—43 of them Moslems—were killed and 21 injured.

The Secret Army Organization is known as the OAS.

### Respect Agreements

Except for an occasional isolated retaliatory attack, the rebel guerrillas and terrorists have observed the cease-fire in obedience to orders from their government-in-exile in Tunis. The rebel command agreed to cooperate with France in setting up provisional institutions and in preparing the country for a self-determination referendum.

But European terrorists have been killing Moslems in Algeria's big cities in a desperate effort to provoke mass Moslem reaction and thus compromise the peace agreement.

In the face of daily bloodshed and France's inability to stop it, the rebels have been growing bitter and angry.

"This situation has lasted too long," warned the rebel government in a statement on Sunday.

# Segregationist's Husband Asks for Excommunication

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—The husband of a segregationist excommunicated by the Roman Catholic Church asked Wednesday while he was joining a pilgrimage group in prayer.

The request to Archbishop Joseph Francis Rummel from Bernard Joseph Gaillot came 14 hours after his dark-haired wife failed in a dramatic plea for grace from the 85-year-old prelate.

"If she is truly excommunicated from the Catholic Church," Gaillot wrote to the archbishop in a letter he disclosed shortly after midnight, "then I too should be excommunicated. We, being two people joined together by God, have done no intentional wrong to our church."

### Remained Silent

As she rose from her knees, Mrs. Gaillot said, "May God have mercy on you. I'm not backing down."

The archbishop remained silent during the episode. Outside his residence and chancery, pickets paraded protesting the excommunication of the three segregationists and the school desegregation decision. Gaillot, 44, a parts clerk for

that God demands segregation, rushed up to the archbishop on the grounds of his residence Tuesday while he was joining a pilgrimage group in prayer.

"I beg your mercy, your excellency," she pleaded as she knelt before the archbishop. "Admit before God and yourself that you did not want to integrate."

An unidentified woman standing by the archbishop interrupted Mrs. Gaillot, but she implored: "Don't listen to Satan, listen to God. Look at me, your excellency. I am on my knees before you. Listen to God."

### Asked for Mercy

Mrs. Gaillot, 41, mother of two children in Catholic schools, was excommunicated Monday along with two other segregationists for opposing the German-born archbishop's decision to desegregate parochial schools here this fall.

Mrs. Gaillot, who contends

an industrial machinery manufacturer, told newsmen he mailed a letter to the archbishop shortly before announcing its text.

The archbishop's chancery had no comment on Gaillot's letter and repeatedly declined to talk about Mrs. Gaillot's appearance at the prelate's home.

An excommunicated Catholic loses his right to receive the sacraments, to be present at Mass and to act as sponsor at baptism or confirmation.

In Vatican City, a spokesman said Archbishop Rummel had—as do all bishops and archbishops of the church—full authority for his action.

## Special Fares OK'd

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Civil Aeronautics Board this week approved special transatlantic charter fares that will allow groups to fly to and from Europe at rates 38 per cent below present economy fares.



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
