

On Disarmament

Good Friday Session Held

GENEVA (AP)—Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Valerian A. Zorin threatened Friday to walk out of the 17-nation general disarmament conference if the United States conducts atmospheric nuclear weapons tests in the Pacific in the next week or so.

He made the comment to newsmen after a Good Friday session of the disarmament conference.

In the conference room itself Zorin said the American tests would bring about an extremely tense international atmosphere.

U.S. Ambassador Arthur H. Dean made it clear the United States tests undoubtedly will be held because of what he called the unyielding Soviet attitude.

Dean said the Soviet Union appears to have killed any chance for a quick agreement on an internationally enforced nuclear weapons test ban.

Both Dean and British Minister of State Joseph B. Godber refused a Russian call for an unpolluted moratorium on tests.

The Russians remained adamant against international inspection and control.

The United States, Dean said, "has learned its lesson with regard to a voluntary, unpolluted moratorium which can be broken at will by the Soviet Union on any pretext it wishes to dream up."

The Big Three haggled again about the testing question.

Then, though Zorin had indicated Thursday he might try to force continued sessions over the weekend, the conference recessed for the Easter holidays.

Zorin told the session the projected American tests would collapse the conference and nobody would forgive the United States and Britain if this happened.

Later, speaking to newsmen, Zorin said the tests "would inflict an irreparable blow to the negotiations." Asked to explain what he meant by irreparable, Zorin said:

"There will be no negotiations, that is all."

Reporters reminded Zorin that he had said the American tests would make the five-week Geneva negotiations unfruitful.

He asked the Soviet delegate if he would still participate.

Zorin replied:

"The Soviet Union will not take part in unfruitful negotiations."

While British security agents checked all ports of entry Thursday for the two men whose defection in 1951 caused a worldwide sensation, Labor party Deputy Leader George Brown tried to pin down the government motives during a session in the House of Commons.

Brown asked whether the arrest warrants were intended to keep MacLean and Burgess from coming back to Britain.

Japanese Fish Boat Captains Released on Bond in Alaska

KODIAK, Alaska (AP)—Three Japanese fishing boat captains charged with poaching in Alaskan waters were free on bond Friday with four more days to get out of Shelikof Strait, between Kodiak Island and the mainland.

As they moved out, diplomatic waters between Japan and the United States rippled over the incident.

Capt. Mongo Hanasaki of the Banshu Maru, mother ship for five catcher vessels, was freed Thursday on \$2,500 bond. Tadao Higashima and Satoshi Mine, captains of two catcher craft, were freed on \$500 bond each.

Their trial is to be in Anchorage. The time has not been set.

The trio was arrested last weekend, accused of violating Alaska fishing regulations.

Whether they were in international waters or waters belonging to Alaska is the question.

In Washington, Lincoln White, State Department press officer, said the Supreme Court of Alaska will decide that.

In Tokyo, the Japanese position was that the nation does not recognize Shelikof Strait as territorial waters, and Japan has never been notified by U.S. or Alaskan authorities that the strait is an inland body of water.

The Japanese fishermen were after herring, they said, and that type of fish was dropped from the abstinence list of the Canada-Japan-U.S. North Pacific fishery treaty last year.

In Juneau, Gov. William Egan said, "The state has no choice but to enforce its fishing regulations, whether the violator is an Alaskan, a citizen of another state, or otherwise."

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Cosmonaut May Attend U.S. Parley

WASHINGTON (AP)—Russian cosmonaut Gherman S. Titov is expected to come to the United States later this month as a Soviet delegate to the third annual International Space Conference.

State Department spokesman Lincoln White said Thursday night that Titov had applied for a visa to attend the meeting in Washington April 30 to May 9, and this government had no objections to his visit.

The conference could produce the first meeting between U.S. and Soviet spacemen. Lt. Col. John H. Glenn Jr., only American to orbit the Earth, will present a paper on behalf of the American delegation.

17 Trips Around Earth

Titov orbited the Earth 17 times last Aug. 6-7 in 25 hours and 18 minutes. His flight came four months after Soviet Maj. Yuri Gagarin had become the first man to go into orbit.

The U.S. Academy of Sciences and its Space Science Board are hosts for the international conference.

Glenn, who made his three-orbit flight on Feb. 20, planned to present a paper before the "life sciences" section. He was expected to discuss biological aspects of his space flight.

A spokesman for the U.S. academy said he had no information on Titov's role in the Soviet delegation. But he said he presumed the Russian cosmonaut also would make a presentation.

The conference offered an opportunity for Glenn and Titov to compare notes on the effects of space flight.

Titov said that his 25-hour period of weightlessness did not interfere with his ability to perform assigned tasks in his space capsule. However, he said he suffered an uneasy sensation in his inner ear after his sixth orbit and this remained until he landed. He also reported his appetite was not normal.

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
