

OSU Wins ND Opener

Ducks Lose by 4-2 In Error-Filled Tilt

Oregon State, scoring all its runs on one hit in the seventh inning, beat the University of Oregon 4-2 in a Northern Division opener at Howe Field Friday.

The win keeps the Beaver's unbeaten streak alive at 16-0 for the season. Oregon's loss gives the Ducks a season mark of 17-5-1.

All the runs scored in the game were unearned in a loosely played contest which saw seven errors committed.

Each nine got three hits in the speedy game played in less than two hours before a crowd of 1,000 on the chilly, overcast afternoon.

Oregon ace righthander Bob Christiansen, who pitched a no-hitter his last time out, was breezing along with a one-hitter until the Ducks booted the ball three times in the seventh to allow all the Beaver runs.

Brian Bailey reached first on an error by Duck shortstop Leon Hayes to open the seventh. Kirk Chapman replaced Bailey on a fielders choice and Larry Petersen followed with a single to center — the first hit off Christiansen since the first inning.

Dave Hayward then walked to load the bases before Oregon third baseman Fred Pettengill threw the ball away to allow all three runs to score and Dave Long to reach second. A wild pitch and another error by Hayes scored Long with the fourth Beaver run.

The only other time the Beavers got a man past first was in the ninth when first baseman Harry Demorest worked his way to third on a walk, a single and a fielder's choice off Robbie Snow, who replaced Christiansen.

Oregon's runs came in the second inning on a double by Pettengill and a base on balls to Dave Moore. A throwing error scored Pettengill and Sandy Noster hit a sacrifice fly to right field to score Moore and give the Ducks an early 2-0 lead.

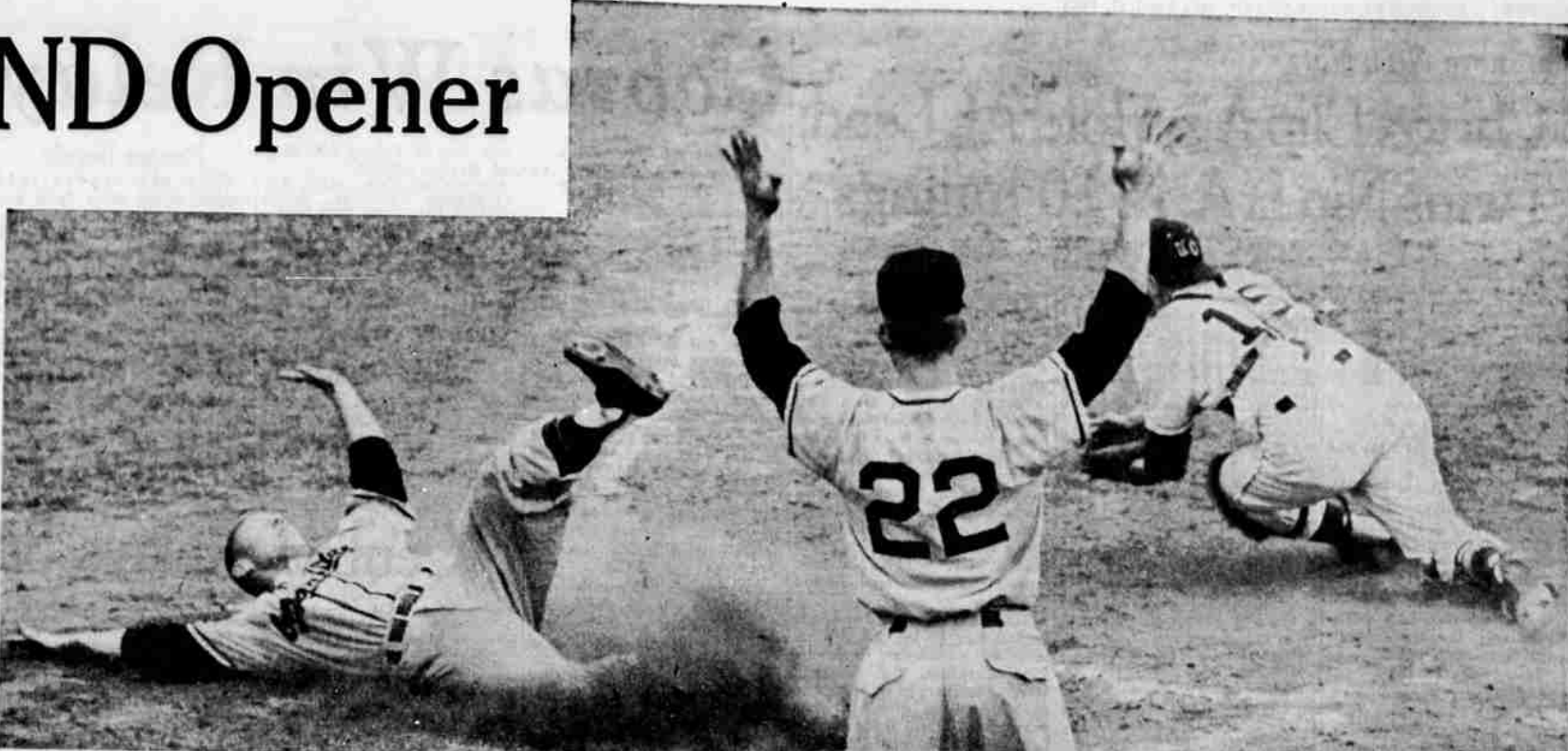
Bailey punched a single down the third base line as the second batter in the game but was quickly erased by a double play. Christiansen walked Hayward in the fifth inning after retiring 12 straight batters and had the game well under control until the Oregon errors in the seventh.

Christiansen, who now has a 4-2 season record, had pitched 26 scoreless innings before the roof fell in.

Cecil Ira, the little curveball-throwing southpaw, was just as effective as his Duck opponent. He weakened in the ninth when Oregon got men on third and second with no outs, but got

Three NE Milers Break 4:30

Deubner Clicks Off 4:14.6 Mile, 1:58.5 Half; North Routs Lions

Dave Deubner still is flirting with the national high school mile record. He could crack it anytime.

The North Eugene senior clipped off a 4:14.6 mile Friday at North Eugene as the Highlanders handed Cottage Grove a 75-48 1/2 defeat.

The national record is 4:10 flat, set a year ago by Morgan Groth of Martinez, Calif.

Now, in his only starts this spring, Deubner has run 4:12.8 and 4:14.6, by far the two fastest in the nation this season.

Deubner was overweight Friday, some eight pounds heavier than he was two weeks ago. "I just ate too much," he said. "But it will come off pretty fast."

The weather was chilly and there was a steady breeze that made it none too comfortable. But Deubner said that didn't bother him.

He was clocked in 63.8, 64.7,

64.1 and 62.4 for the quarters as he took the lead and the start and held it all the way.

Ken Moore, another North Eugene runner, was clocked in 4:25.5, second best mile in the state this year.

And third-place Mike Curtis, also of North Eugene, ran 4:28.5.

Deubner came back in the 880 and turned in a 1:58.5 in his first flat half-mile of the season. He had run 1:55.3 and 1:55.7 in relay legs.

Pat Helfrich of North Eugene raced over the high hurdles in 14.4, one-tenth of a second off the state's best, and came back with a 20.3 in the low hurdles.

Ralph Rotter of North Eugene stepped down from the quarter-mile and ran the 100 in 10.05, then ran the 440 in 50.7 seconds, his fastest ever and second best in the state.

The big battle in the field events came in the shot put when Al Richards of Cottage Grove got off a heave of 54 feet, 4 1/2 feet to beat Neil Steinhauer

of North Eugene with 53, 5 1/4 inches.

In winning the 440, Rotter edged Joe Olds of Cottage Grove who was timed in 51.4.
