

Christendom Celebrates Festive Day

Services, Parades Held on Easter

The joyous story of Easter was retold in churches and at outdoor services Sunday as Christians around the world celebrated their most festive day of the year.

Religious pageantry celebrated the resurrection of Christ and marked the end of the penitential period of Lent. Displays of fashion welcomed the spring in many places.

Generally fair weather prevailed.

Makeshift churches in outposts were used by members of the armed forces and civilians on overseas duty.

Pope John XXIII celebrated an Easter Mass in the Basilica in Rome which was attended by about 30,000 persons.

Addresses Throng

The Pontiff later stood on the balcony of St. Peter's and addressed more than 250,000 in the courtyard. He warned against godlessness that he said could break the peace. The peace of the world is threatened, he said, and "all people tremble at the thought that it could be lost."

Pilgrims from distant lands celebrated the day in the holy city of Jerusalem with hymns of joy.

An estimated one million persons joined the traditional Easter parade on New York's Fifth Avenue, which was closed to traffic for 15 blocks. The mercury reached 85 degrees—a record high for the date in the city. The previous record was 84, in 1902.

St. Patrick's Cathedral, the Episcopal Cathedral of St. John the Divine and many other churches in New York had throngs of worshippers.

Peace Marchers

Peace marchers mingled with the crowds in New York and paraded in front of the Hollywood Bowl in California, where 20,000 persons gathered for an outdoor service.

President Kennedy took his wife and their two children to the Palm Beach, Fla., home of his father, Joseph P. Kennedy, for a private Easter Mass.

Hundreds of thousands of Londoners attended services and took to the outdoors in balmy weather.

Easter afternoon dances and get-togethers—traditional in many parts of America and elsewhere in the world—were held by churches, civic and other organizations and family groups.

The New China News Agency in Tokyo reported that church services were conducted and chocolate Easter eggs were sold in Communist China.

Musical Opens At Night Club

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Actor Van Johnson opened in "The Music Man" at the Los Angeles Coconut Grove Saturday night and the movie colony turned out in force to welcome him.

Johnson, who just finished a year's run of the show in London, is scheduled for a five-week stand at the Ambassador Hotel night-spot.

"The Music Man" is the first current hit musical to play at the Coconut Grove in the club's 41-year history.

Salan Begins Fight To Escape Death

PARIS (UPI)—Ex-Gen. Raoul Salan, captured commander of the Secret Army Organization, Monday began mapping strategy for his fight to escape the guillotine or the firing squad as a traitor to France.

The former general, captured Friday in Algiers after a year-long hunt, scheduled a meeting in his cell at Sainte Prison with four attorneys he has named to defend him against charges of treason.

Mme. Salan, who was seized along with her husband, was flown here Sunday and locked up in a cell in the Fresnes Prison in southern Paris. It was not immediately known what, if any, charges would be brought against Mme. Salan.

French authorities also flew in the Salans' 16-year-old daughter Dominique, and turned her over to relatives who promptly went into hiding with her.

Salan was brought to Paris by plane within hours after his arrest by agents of the Surete Nationale in a small apartment in Algiers.

At Annual Spring

Cameras Out-Number Easter Eggs

WASHINGTON (AP)—Caroline Kennedy's playground was the center of attraction at the traditional Easter egg rolling on the White House south lawn Monday.

Thousands of children and adults who came for the annual spree made a beeline for the play area—even before taking a close look at the executive mansion.

President and Mrs. Kennedy and their two youngsters are vacationing in Palm Beach and the Kennedy children's play area was the closest the visitors could come to the first family.

The egg rolling itself seems to have lost its significance since it was started in 1878.

There were more cameras Monday than gaily-colored Easter eggs. And the children and adults who accompanied them seemed confused about what the occasion called for. White House policemen answered a constant question such as:

"What do you have to do, furnish your own eggs?"

The policeman explained, "You bring your own eggs." They told the inquirers this was a tradition started years ago to give the children a place to play on Easter Monday and that the White House does not provide for either hunting or rolling. Many children had showed up with empty paper bags and empty Easter baskets.

"We came here for nothing," a little boy listening to the explanation commented.

For those who remembered to bring their own eggs there was plenty of lawn to cavort on. Four military bands provided music. Despite threatening weather, 5,350 people gathered in the first hour.

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Guido Said Ready to Wipe Out Elections

BUENOS AIRES (AP)—Unofficial sources said Monday President Jose Maria Guido will declare null and void all elections since Dec. 17, 1961—thus eliminating posts won by Peronists on March 18.

Naval forces announced Sunday they were demanding such action by the president, thus ending his brief one-day respite from political crisis.

The report from unofficial sources came after lengthy presidential sessions at the presidential residence attended by military leaders, including the navy secretary, Rear Adm. Gaston Clement.

He announced Sunday the navy had reached a "firm decision to insist by all means at its reach" that Guido honor a pledge to wipe out the March 18 elections. These precipitated the current crisis and resulted in the overthrow of the regime of President Arturo Frondizi.

Some sources expressed belief that the crisis was easing in the wake of the early morning meetings at the palace.

In a bulletin to all naval commands, Clement said that to assure the "survival of democra-

cy and liberty" in Argentina, it was imperative to outlaw communism "and all other totalitarian systems."

Acts Quickly

The navy, which led the revolt that toppled Peron in 1955, acted quickly after Guido on Saturday arranged a truce between opposing army factions that had appeared on the verge of a shooting war.

Clement said his stand was fully supported by the armed forces "despite reiterated interferences opposed to its being carried out."

Guido had appeared the winner in a struggle with the military when the top army brass was forced out Saturday. Gen. Enrique Rauch, a tank commander, threatened to storm the capital and demand the ousters

of Army Secretary Marino Bar-tolome Carrera and Gen. Raul Poggi, the army commander in chief, who had tried to pressure Guido into nullifying the Peronist election victories by decree.

Two Resign

Both Carrera and Poggi resigned and Guido named a relative unknown, Gen. Juan Batista Loza, army secretary. Loza then named himself commander in chief, and Rauch in turn resigned his command.

Rauch supported Guido's stand that nullification of the election

results by decree would be unconstitutional, and that the Peronist wins could only be canceled by Congress.

Many members of Congress are opposed to canceling out the election results, which give the Peronists nine provincial governorships and 43 seats in the lower house.

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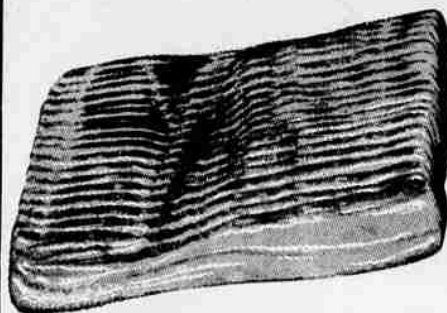


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
