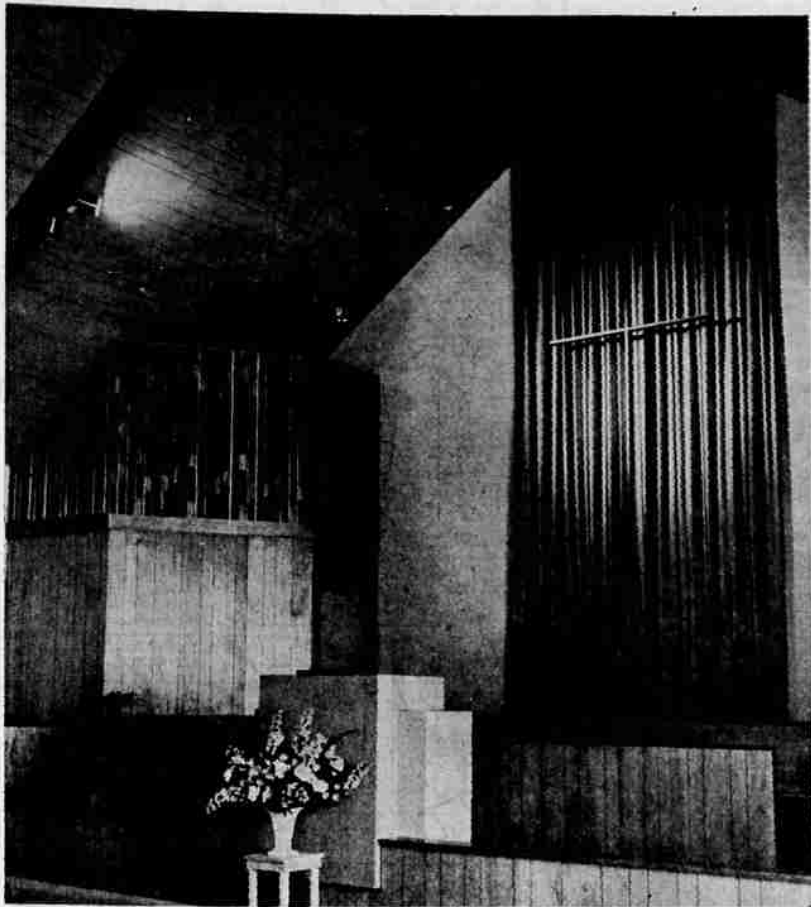




## New Church

Modern design, native woods and architectural simplicity are featured in the new Cottage Grove Free Methodist Church, used for worship services for the first time on Easter Sunday. The church sanctuary seats 240 persons, with an overflow room in back. At the front of the sanctuary, a 10-foot mahogany cross is hung against a gold cloth curtain. Exposed laminated arches are featured in the church's construction. The church is located at S. Sixth and Harrison streets, and the Rev. Herbert Hansen is pastor.

## Church Notes

### Church First To Observe NCC Day

First Christian Church of Eugene will be first to observe Northwest Christian College Day in the Northwest. The church has scheduled the Rev. Donald McGavran, head of the Institute of Church Growth at NCC and former missionary to India, as speaker for the church's 11:45 a.m., daylight, service Sunday.

Most Northwest churches, NCC officials said, will have their annual observance on May 6.

Offerings for NCC will be received at the morning service and also at the evening program, 6:30 p.m., daylight, when NCC's male quartet will present a program of sacred music, readings and ventriloquism. The public is welcome and there will be no admission charge.

**DAYLIGHT TIME**—to switch or not to switch to it—will be on the agendas of many church meetings this week. As of Thursday night, First Christian Church, Unity Church of Eugene and Eugene Free Methodist Church were on standard time "at least for the time being," according to church secretaries and pastors. Ebbert Memorial Methodist Church will remain on standard time. In the daylight time camp are the Eugene Unitarian Church and First Baptist Church of Eugene. For today's church news, all church events—whether or not the sponsoring church is on daylight or standard time—have been listed in daylight time, if the events occur after the beginning of the daylight time period—2:07 a.m. Sunday.

NCC's field representative, the Rev. Carroll Roberts of Eugene, will be the guest speaker Sunday at the 11 a.m., daylight, service at Northwest Christian Church, meeting at Page School, 1300 Hayden Bridge Rd., Springfield. He is former pastor of First Christian Church, Eugene.

**FIRST ASSEMBLY** of God Church in Eugene reports that 2,366 persons attended the three services of the church's Easter Sunday pageant, "Road to Calvary."

**UNITY CHURCH** of Eugene, meeting at 1215 Oak St., Eugene, has announced the beginning of two weekly programs. Tuesdays at 9 p.m., daylight, a study class will be formed to discuss the ebook, "Dare to Believe" by May Rowland, director of silent unity, the prayer department at Unity School of Christianity at Lee's Summit, Mo. Midweek services at the church will begin Thursday at 9 p.m., daylight.

The church's pastor, the Rev. Rose Elaine Lightburne, said that this will feature prayers for healing and a series of lessons on "developing prosperity."

## Regular Contributors Decline

### Released-Time Classes in the Red

The released-time Bible classes sponsored by the Eugene Council of Christian Education are running in the red.

Financial statements for the program, released this week by the Council, show that the Council owes its four teachers \$528.02, has some \$206.90 in unpaid bills (some due since July of last year) and is faced with \$625.38 in state and federal taxes for the quarter ending March 31.

Cash on hand, the report indicated, totaled \$214.23. The released-time program, authorized in Oregon law, is supported entirely by donations from churches, individuals, groups and businesses.

These donations, Council officials said, just haven't been coming in.

Although the 870 children in the Eugene-Springfield metropolitan area who are enrolled in the program represent some 70 individual churches, only 10 churches in the area have given regularly this year, the report says.

"Regular" donations during the years 1956 to 1962 were from a total of 27 individual churches, the report said.

The Council's monthly budget for the program is \$909.29. This budget provides \$700.83 for salaries for the four teachers, \$128.70 in withholding taxes, \$55.06 in FICA deductions, and \$24.70 for state taxes.

Average monthly support for the program from the ten

regular contributing churches and some gifts from individuals and other churches has been only \$694.38.

In the Eugene-Springfield area, released-time Bible classes—for third, fourth and fifth graders—are held for students in these three grades from Adams, Bailey Hill, Dunn, Edison, Frances Willard, Harris, Howard, Ida Patterson, Lincoln, River Road, Santa Clara, Stella Magalady, Laurel Hill, Willakenzie, Westmoreland, Willagillespie, Meadowlark, Silver Lea and Twin Oaks elementary schools.

All classes are held in locations off the school properties. Council records show that of the 870 children enrolled, 157 gave no church preference on their enrollment cards, and some 150 only "occasionally" attend church.

The Rev. Vance Webster, pastor of First Baptist Church in Eugene, is council chairman. Teaching in the program is non-denominational.

Through the use of creative materials, Bible study, hymns and songs, dramatization and audio-visual materials, the students learn basic Bible stories and teachings, a Council official said.

Teachers in the program are Thelma Rose, Katherine Asher, Mrs. Robert Powell and Gloria Fendall.

Mrs. William Siefke, publicity chairman for the Council, said Tuesday that the financial problem will probably be discussed at the Council's annual meeting Tuesday.

## Education Council Sets Dinner Meeting

Eugene Council of Christian Education will hold its annual dinner meeting Tuesday at 6:30 p.m., daylight, at Friendly Street Church of God, W. 23rd Avenue and Friendly Street, Eugene.

Tuesday night's program will include election of officers for the coming year, committee reports, council business and a musical program featuring Jan Hartzell of Eugene, cellist.

A speaker for the program will be announced later.

The Council, an inter-denominational organization of clergy and lay members, organizes and conducts the weekly released-time Bible classes, and sponsors an annual interdenominational leadership training school.

Tickets for the dinner are \$1.50, and may be obtained from Eugene church offices or by calling DI-5-0628 or DI-5-6553.

The Rev. Vance Webster of Eugene, pastor of First Baptist Church, is president of the council.

## Radio Station Runs, Mostly, On Faith

VAN CLEVE, Ky. (AP)—Radio station WUTC turns its back on most advertisers, operating on faith instead of money.

The nine staff members draw no salaries, yet there's always a waiting list for jobs at the tiny studio hidden away in the mountains of eastern Kentucky.

On the air 63 hours a week, WUTC reaches into four states with spiritual, educational, agricultural, musical and news programs.

**No Rock 'N' Roll**

"We play no rock 'n' roll, no jazz. Nor do we accept cigarette or liquor commercials," says Lela G. McConnell, who came into Breathitt County in 1924 with only a few dollars in her purse.

Today, at 77, she is president of the station, a mission school, and a Bible institute, but still owns nothing of material value.

She draws no salary, has no bank account of her own. Her expenses, totaling about \$50 a year, come from the Kentucky Mountain Holiness Assn., which holds title to the 82 buildings making up the operation.

"How could I pay money out of the bank accounts of others," Miss McConnell asks, "if I had money of my own?"

**Won't Ask for Money**

Miss Lela, as the mountain folks call her, has an unshakable rule against asking people for money. Instead, she and her staff of 129 pray that the public will be touched by God and send what is needed.

The method has brought in approximately \$1 million for the maintenance and expansion of the association's facilities, scattered over 300 acres of rugged terrain. The combined value of the buildings runs into six figures but that represents only the cost of material. The labor was done by the staff and students.

A \$15,000 gift from a couple in Oregon led to the opening of WUTC. The call letters stand for "Win Men to Christ."

## Pastor Here For Lutheran 'Life' Mission

A Washington pastor, the Rev. Rueben Redal of Central Lutheran Church in Tacoma, Wash., will be in Eugene Sunday through Thursday for Central Lutheran Church's Christian Life and Growth Mission.

He will speak Sunday at noon, daylight, at the worship hour, and also Sunday through Thursday at 8:30 p.m., daylight, at the church.

Purpose of the mission is to deepen the spiritual lives of Christians in the congregation and to win the lost for Christ, a church announcement said. Plans for the mission have been carried out by the church's evangelism committee, headed by Duane Mellem, chairman. Special music will be featured at each service.

The Rev. Redal is a graduate of St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn., and Luther Theological Seminary in St. Paul, Minn. He has held pastorates in Iowa and Washington.

The public is invited to attend the services.

## Evangelism Chief to Be At Emmaus

The Rev. Mars A. Dale, assistant director of evangelism for the American Lutheran Church, will conduct a Spiritual Life and Growth Mission at Emmaus Lutheran Church, 1250 W. 18th Ave., Eugene, Sunday through Thursday.

On Sunday, he will be guest speaker at the church's 10:30 a.m., daylight, and noon, daylight, services. He will conduct 9 p.m., daylight, services Monday through Thursday at the church, with the public welcome.

The Spiritual Life and Growth Mission will emphasize spiritual development within the family, as well as within the individual, church officials said.

The Rev. Dale is credited with coining the "Preaching-Teaching-Reaching" slogan of such programs, when he said at a 1952 home mission board meeting, "We need preaching; and we need some teaching; and we need some reaching, too."

He is former president of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Canada, one of the groups merged into the American Lutheran Church in 1960, and has served a number of churches as pastor.

For his Eugene work, he moved into a trailer house until the church's parsonage was ready.

The pastor's first Christian work, as he puts it, was in 1917, when he worked with the American Sunday School Union in Medford. He then came to Eugene, and preached at several Emerald Empire churches until another assignment sent him to eastern Oregon.

He was ordained at First Baptist Church in Eugene in 1932, spent 14 years as pastor in Lakeview and two years at Ashland. He and his wife now have four children, 13 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren "to be proud of," he said.

Webster, who has appeared at many Eugene churches as speaker during his years here, has also been in charge of the youth camp at Harlow Lodge, the Baptist camp on the McKenzie River.
