

Liston Denied License

NEW YORK (UP)—Sonny Liston blithely interpreted his latest ban more as a boon today with the growing possibility that the Floyd Patterson fight now will be shifted to "my home ground" in Philadelphia.

The Pennsylvania Athletic Commission was among the first to sanction Liston Friday following the New York commission's refusal to license the hulking, 28-year-old challenger because of his criminal record and habit of associating with underworld figures.

Liston also was promptly welcomed by official boxing groups in Chicago, Washington, D.C., and Seattle.

But it was considered something of a foregone conclusion that the multi-million dollar heavyweight title fight will eventually be held in Liston's hometown of Philadelphia.

The only possible hitch could be Patterson himself but the champion, who is expected to announce his decision today, tipped his mitt by saying: "He's already served his time. I feel sorry for him."

Amid the general conjecture as to whether or not the fight ever will be held, it was reported that the New York commission's ruling against Liston was virtually dictated by Gov. Nelson Rockefeller, who is known to be greatly disturbed by boxing conditions in his state.

Rockefeller may be upset, but Liston wasn't when informed of his turn-down by the New York commission.

"It doesn't bother me at all," said the outspoken heavyweight challenger, who has been arrested 19 times and jailed twice. "I will continue to train as if nothing happened."

"A lot of friends sent telegrams to say how sorry they were, but it's Patterson they should feel sorry for, because now I'll probably get to fight him in Philadelphia, and that's my home ground."

When Liston and Patterson signed contracts on March 16, the site for the fight was left unsettled although it was pretty much understood it would be held either at Yankee Stadium, Sept. 17, or at the Polo Grounds, Sept. 26.

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Title Bout May Be Held In Seattle

The chairman of the California Athletic Commission has voiced reluctance to grant a boxing license to Sonny Liston, but prospects appeared favorable today for the Washington State Athletic Commission to support a heavyweight championship bout between Liston and champion Floyd Patterson.

The status of Sonny Liston hasn't changed since he fought Eddie Machen here two years ago. Wilbur F. Lewis, chairman of the Washington State Athletic Commission, said Friday at Seattle.

Liston was denied a boxing license in New York. The Seattle World's Fair along with Philadelphia and Washington, D.C., are reportedly being considered as alternate sites for the proposed September championship bout.

Chairman Douglas Hayden of the California Athletic Commission said in San Francisco that his group agreed with New York.

"I don't feel that Liston has sufficiently rehabilitated himself," Hayden explained. "Nor has he made too much effort toward eliminating the people with whom he has been associated."

Hayden added that he felt Liston should first get "the services of an outstanding manager, with unquestionable reputation, to handle his affairs."

Horn Ends Amateur Career With Fourth Round TKO Win

"Professional boxing is in the wind for Eugene," was the comment heard at ringside after the Eugene Boxing Club had held its third highly successful amateur boxing card at the fairgrounds Cow Palace Friday night.

A near capacity crowd was on hand as Springfield middleweight Bob Horn, in the five round main event, ended his spectacular amateur boxing career with a fourth round TKO of Madras's Alfonso Villanueva.

Horn's TKO was the highlight of a fast, well run 11-bout card that saw the Eugene Boxing Club walk off with the unofficial team title.

Eugene won four of the fights, Knott Community Center of Portland and Albany three each, and St. John's of Portland 1.

"This will probably be our last card until next September, then we plan on staging one once a month," commented Eugene contractor John Gabel, president of the Eugene Boxing Club.

Horn, 20 years old and Montana Golden Gloves boxing champion, was in complete control all the way. After a slow first round, he decked his opponent for eight counts in both the second and third rounds.

Early in the fourth, the former Springfield High School football player caught Villanueva squarely on the jaw with an overhand right, sending him to the floor for the third and final time.

Horn, who is managed by Moyer and Gabel, will step into the professional ranks next Friday with a bout in Klamath Falls.

Albany's little Johnny Manning and Marty Allard, though, almost stole the show from Horn.

Manning pulled one of the biggest upsets of the night with a crowd pleasing win over Portland TV champion Sammy Howard.

Both are only 10-years old and weigh just a little over 60 pounds. But this didn't stop them from putting on a whirlwind of a performance, that saw punches coming at the rate of 10 per second.

Allard, a spunky 115-pounder, was voted by the audience as "the most outstanding boxer." There may have been better

fighters, but Allard's was the one that caught the crowd's fancy.

National AAU boxing finalists Richard Sue and Jody Harris both won their bouts.

But Sue, only 16 years old, had a rough three rounds, just barely winning a split decision from Albany's Tommy Rudolph.

One of the grittiest performances of the night was turned in by Eugene heavyweight Jim Lacy, who was appearing in his first amateur fight.

In the first round Lacy slipped, fell out of the ring, and was followed by his opponent who fell right on top of him.

Stunned for awhile, Lacy came back after about a five minute rest to take a split decision from Portlander Jim Phillips.

Tonn's victory in the two mile came under the most unusual of circumstances. Colpitts grabbed a quick 20 yard lead and watched it diminish until halfway through the sixth lap when Tonn spurred past him and opened up a 15 yard lead.

As Tonn got the gun, signifying a lap to go, Colpitts slowed almost to a walk, apparently thinking the race had ended. Tonn, seeing his foe fade, and fall far behind, then eased up his pace.

Meanwhile, a teammate yelled to Colpitts to hurry up—the race wasn't over. Colpitts closed the gap between himself and Tonn to a mere yard before Tonn realized his foe was back in the race. Then he turned on the power and won by the 15 yard margin he had held at the beginning of the last lap.

Two special races were run in addition to the regular Frosh-Rook events. Lew Powell of the Emerald Empire Athletic Assn. won the 440 in 49 flat. And Norm Hoffman, running unattached for Oregon State, captured the 1320 in a swift 3:03.6.

Thanks to Oregon's new "Mr. Bed Covers" there was college baseball at Howe Field Friday.

The Oregon Webfoots won their first Northern Division game of the season, defeating Idaho's Vandals 16-6. The handful of about 300 original spectators who remained until the very last (3 hours and 8 minutes) would have sworn the temperature was nudging the 20-below-zero mark.

A number of incidents besides the occasional showers contributed to the longevity of the contest.

First off it was the Law School "beer binge" parade that threatened a lengthy delay—before a few of the Webfoot ball-

players tossed more lethal fists than did the would-be neophyte barristers. They retired, carriage and all, following the skirmish. Then came a German shepherd who thought Howe Field was his play pen and the players and umpires his obedience trainers.

Long before another pesky pup put on the same stunt coach Don Kirsch sat on the bench with his head in hands, wondering, "What next?" Catcher Ray Haroldson and second baseman Dave Moore had already hammered out two-run homers over the vulnerable left-field fence and Oregon was in front 8-2.

So the eventual outcome was no great concern for Kirsch. He was suffering from mental fatigue—getting the game in.

But the game never would have been played in the first place without the use of the new infield tarp, although there were times when playing the necessary official 4 1/2 innings was in doubt.

The finishing touches on the hopes of the Vandals, who

Thursday had stopped Oregon State's streak of 18 straight wins, came to an end in the fifth inning when Oregon scored six runs for a 14-2 lead. Shortstop Leon Hayes contributed a two-run homer. It was the second of the season for Hayes, as well as for Haroldson and Moore.

The 16 bases on balls issued by the three Idaho pitchers, plus a wild pitch and a balk and four errors by teammates contributed to the debacle.

It just wasn't one of the better days for coach Wayne Anderson's Vandals who have now won 12, lost five and tied two. Oregon now has a 19-6-1 record for the season.

Bob Christiansen, talented right handed pitcher who has hurried several masterful mound jobs in recent weeks, needed the 12-hit (five for extra bases) attack by his mates. He gave up 13 hits, but managed to strike out eight while walking three for his fifth decision of the season against two losses.

The weather contributed to the free-hitting and high-scoring game—but the infield was in fine playing condition despite rains throughout Thursday night and early Friday morning that made the tarp resemble a fly-casting pool. Removing the tarp and diverting the casual water to the grass portions of the field was quite a production. Oregon has lost a few ball games this season, but none at home to Jupiter Pluvius.

USC Spikers Rout Stanford

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Southern California scored nine first places and an easy 79-52 victory Friday night over Stanford in a Big Five conference dual track and field meet.

A sparse crowd of 1,045 sat in 60-degree weather in Memorial Coliseum to see the Trojans win their 27th consecutive dual victory over the Indians, dating back to 1933.

The lone meet record was broken by Stanford's Dave Weill in the discus throw. He had a mark of 187-2. The old record was 185-5 1/2, set in 1953 by Sim Inness of Southern California.

Stanford also scored the only sweep of the evening, taking the broad jump. Dan Moore won at 24-4 1/2. Larry Chukwudebe was second at 23-3 and Chuck Barth third at 22-3.

For Two Years

NCAA Puts Colorado on Probation

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP)—The National Collegiate Athletic Association put the University of Colorado on two years probation Friday, reprimanded the University of Missouri and declined to reduce the three-year probation against New Mexico State University.

Colorado was banned from taking part in postseason bowl football games or appearing on the NCAA football television series. No other sports are involved.

The Colorado penalty stemmed from a slush fund operated by Everett Grandelius football coach until his dismissal March 17.

The NCAA censured and

reprimanded Missouri—without penalties—for giving a prospective athlete an interest-free loan.

The president and vice president of New Mexico State asked for reduction of its probation received last Jan. 11 for violating a rule to advise a college or junior college when an athlete is attracted from other schools.

Walter Byers, NCAA executive director, said the Colorado infractions included improper financial assistance 1959-61 to 21 student football athletes; football coaches causing grant-in-aid assistance to three athletes to be reduced or terminated; and members of the football staff arranging for medi-

cal expense payments to two athletes or their immediate families.

In addition, he said, Colorado football coaches recruited prospective athletes with the offer "of improper financial aid," and the football staff operated "a required practice session for a number of days in addition to the permissible 20 practice sessions."

Outside of the football season, the NCAA allows only 20 days of spring drills.

Byers said all the football coaching staff members involved are no longer at the university.

Byers noted that the university started an investigation of

its own, "which was very effective," and took action once the facts in the case were uncovered.

The action against Missouri did not affect the eligibility of its athletic teams in taking part in bowl games or NCAA championship events. Byers said the action was taken because of an \$83 ticket purchased by an alumnus representing the university for a prospective athlete on a loan basis. He did not identify the athlete who received the loan.

The NCAA, while declining to reduce the probation against New Mexico State, agreed to a review of the case in 1964 instead of 1965 as originally set.

North Golfers Down Three Foes
