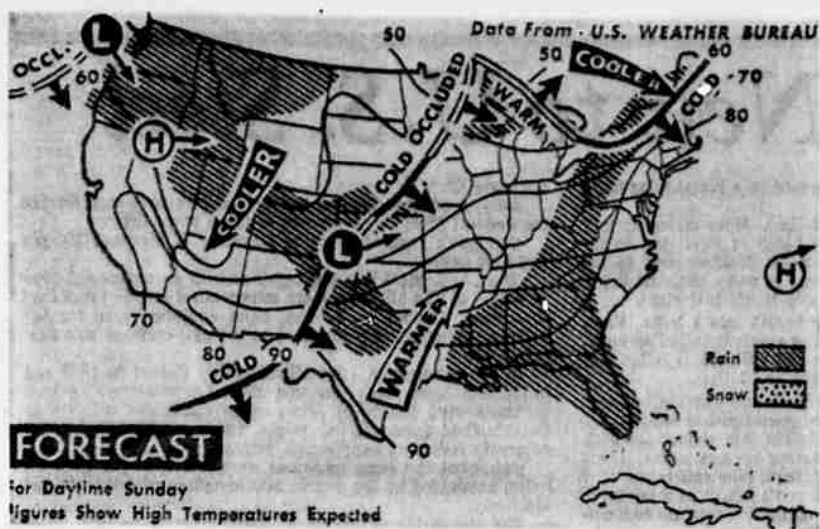




More Rain

Political Potpourri

Of Lady Candidates, Money and 'Moe'

Moe Moyer's first name (its really Marion) lends itself to all kinds of little goodies as campaign slogans. Moe, who's seeking the Republican nomination to the House of Representatives from Lane County, had a meeting recently and the people there kicked it around a while: "Don't eeny, meeny, miney, vote, Moe." "There's no Moe like this Moe." "That's all there is, there ain't no Moe." "There were others, just as bad, but the worst of all was: 'There's no business like 'Moe' business.'"

If one called the Eugene Business and Professional Women's organization a "feminist" group, he'd have a fight on his hands. Nevertheless, it's more than coincidence, probably, that the BPW has endorsed three candidates for election that are women.

They are: Ina Randolph, Democrat, for county treasurer; Jo Kittredge, for Republican candidate for Senator, and Veola Wilmot, Democrat, for state representative.

The Capital Press, a farm weekly published in Salem, has endorsed Robert Straub for Congress. The United Steelworkers of America local in the Fourth District has endorsed Robert Duncan for the same position.

Appointment time: Natalie Nash of Cloverdale is the chairman of the newly formed Lane County Volunteers to Re-Elect Wayne Morse. Art McChesney of Springfield is vice chairman.

Mrs. Richard Barker, Springfield, and Mrs. James Clark, Eugene, are heading up a "Funds for Flynn" committee. Anyone who wants to send a few shekels to help Pat Flynn in his congressional campaign is asked to contact either of them.

Charles Paddock, Oakridge, is campaign chairman for the Upper Willamette Committee for Richard Kennedy, Democrat running for his party's nomination to the Oregon House.

Lane County chairmen of the "Marksmen" is William D. Carlson of Eugene. The Mark in Marksmen is for Hatfield.

Heading the Lane County Fisher for Congress group is Fred Stephens, Eugene lumberman. The Eugene Fisher group is headed by Ralph Cobb, Eugene attorney.

Sen. Wayne Morse will concentrate most of his pre-primary campaigning in a three-day swing through Portland, Salem, Roseburg, Eugene and other Western Oregon points May 8, 9 and 10. He'll be in Eugene for a Roosevelt Memorial Dinner the night of May 10.

Morse will go back to Washington after that but will return May 17 for one last day of shaking hands and to vote in the May 18 primary.

Mike McCloskey, Democratic candidate for nomination to the Oregon House, had a birthday the other day—he was 28 on the 28th.

Mike just happened to be at the Junction City Candidates Fair that night and it just happened that one of his supporters knew he was coming and baked a cake. Blue icing on the big cake depicted Waldo Lake; other frosting was green treet.

Mrs. William Prager will honor Mr. and Mrs. Charles Porter (he's running for Congress) at a meeting and coffee hour at the Cottage Grove Eagles Hall starting at 10 a.m. standard, 11 a.m. daylight, May 9.

Jo Kittredge, the energetic gal who's running for Republican nomination to the Oregon House without any opposition, told a group of Republican women the other day about being a woman candidate.

A woman has to be better qualified than a man, she said, to be elected over the hidden opposition to females in office; she must have consumer interests at heart but not be a "feminist"; she probably has to wait until her kids are grown and out of the coop; and she must have "the thick skin of an elephant" to withstand the criticism.

And, Mrs. Kittredge told the women party members, a woman candidate must be able to curb her emotions. That's a lot, Mrs. Kittredge.

The next big political event will be at Elmira Grange Monday night, starting at 8 p.m., standard, 9 p.m. daylight.

Forty candidates have been invited to the "Candidates Fair" and the people running the show say more than 35 have accepted.

Grants Given

UO Reach Record High

Research and training grants received by the University of Oregon during this fiscal year will set a new record.

Thus far in the 1961-62 fiscal year grants received by the university have already exceeded by more than \$300,000 the record figure set during the entire 1960-61 fiscal year, the university business office has reported.

As of April 24, 1962, research and training grants received during the current fiscal year totaled \$3,063,718.68. The fiscal year ends on June 30, 1962.

During the entire 1960-61 fiscal year research and training grants reached the record figure of \$2,743,688.

There are 155 research and training projects going on at the university, utilizing authorized funds totaling \$4,829,521.68. Some of the projects are authorized over a period of several years.

This compares to 90 research and training projects going on last September 15, utilizing authorized funds totaling \$3,436,294.

The 155 projects now under way include 116 research projects utilizing authorized funds totaling \$3,191,971.68, and 39 authorized funds totaling \$1,437,550.

Visiting Critics to Lecture This Week at University

Josef and Anni Albers, artists and art educators, will be visiting critics in the University of Oregon School of Architecture and Allied Arts this week.

The couple will meet with classes and faculty and will give two public lectures as part of their five-day visit.

Josef Albers will speak Tuesday evening on "Color a Magic Power." This lecture, which is open to the public, will be at 8 p.m. standard, 9 p.m. daylight, in 150 Science. A discussion on "Designing as Visual Organization" will be given by Anni Albers on Thursday at 8 p.m. standard, 9 p.m. daylight in 150 Science. The public is invited to this lecture.

The Albers are German born and received their education in Germany. They came to the United States in 1933. From that time until 1949 Josef Albers was a professor of art and

Anni Albers an assistant professor of art at Black Mountain College in North Carolina. Josef Albers, who was at Yale University from 1950 to 1960, has lectured and given courses at leading universities, colleges and art institutes in this country and in Cuba, Mexico, Chile, Peru, Hawaii, and Germany. His paintings are represented in leading museums in America and Europe and in private collections.

Anni Albers is known for her work in the field of textiles as an artist, a designer for industrial production, and a lecturer and teacher.

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
