

CENTO Nations Hit Red Secrecy Hit by Rusk

LONDON (AP)—U.S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk warned Monday the East-West arms race cannot be ended unless and until Soviet Union abandons its obsession on secrecy. He spoke at the opening ministerial session of the Central Treaty Organization (CENTO).

"The Soviet Union has, thus far, been unwilling to agree to an effective treaty banning all nuclear testing," Rusk said. "In the circumstances, the United States has had no choice but to assume its responsibility to look to the common defense and conduct a limited series of atmospheric nuclear tests."

Rusk then added: "Secrecy and disarmament are incompatible."

Rusk assured America's friends in CENTO that the United States would go on working with them to insure the defense and stability of the Middle East against continued threat of Communist aggression.

Ailing Justice To Resume Work in Fall

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court will operate on an eight-man basis for the remainder of the current term because of the illness of Justice Felix Frankfurter, it was announced Monday.

A medical report said that Frankfurter, hospitalized earlier this month because of a mild stroke-like seizure, has been advised not to resume his duties until the new court term next October.

In recent weeks, the court has been marking time in the hope that Frankfurter might return to the bench before the term ends sometime in mid-June. Monday the justices again began handing down decisions on several minor cases.

In actuality, seven justices will make the remaining decisions for the rest of this term. Newly appointed Justice Byron R. White has heard oral arguments in cases only during the past two weeks and undoubtedly will decline to participate in voting on other decisions.

The court Monday:

- Denied a hearing to Mickey Cohen, Los Angeles racketeer figure, who claimed he was convicted twice for the same offense in income tax evasion cases.
- Voted 7-0 to set aside the incest conviction of Willard Carnley, Pensacola, Fla., on grounds he was not represented by an attorney at his 1958 trial. Carnley was sentenced to from 6 months to 20 years in prison.

A medical report on Frankfurter's condition said his condition "continues to improve." It said: "He must remain in the hospital for further treatment. It is still anticipated that he will return for the next term."

6 Dissidents Lose Suit Against 701

PORTLAND (AP)—Circuit Judge James W. Crawford turned down Saturday a suit asking that the big Local 701 of the Hoisting and Portable Engineers be put into receivership.

However, Crawford said he found a few things that disturbed him and said he would keep watch over the union for a while.

The suit was filed by six dissident union members. He said he was naming two accountants to supervise a union election coming up in June and to assist with quarterly audits of the union's books in the next year.

There were indications that the union was not democratic enough, the judge said, although he found no evidence of misappropriation of funds.

Crawford referred to a charge that P. R. "Red" Wages, union business agent, worked his friends into key positions.

"There was too much cronyism. Cronyism was rampant," Crawford said.

The hearing lasted 1½ weeks.

JFK's Father Enters Clinic

NEW YORK (AP)—Former Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy, father of the President, is undergoing treatment at a New York clinic for the paralytic stroke he suffered Dec. 19.

Kennedy arrived here Sunday from Palm Beach, Fla., aboard the family plane, Caroline. He was taken in a semi-reclining chair to a waiting automobile and driven to the New York University Institute of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation.

A spokesman at the clinic said the former ambassador to London would be under the personal supervision of Dr. Howard A. Rusk, head of the institute, and Dr. William Foley of New York Hospital.

Doctors said Kennedy is considered improved sufficiently to undergo rehabilitation treatment under clinical conditions.

ADA Elects Chairman

WASHINGTON (AP)—Americans for Democratic Action Sunday elected John P. Roche, chairman of the department of politics at Brandeis University, as its national chairman. Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt was named ADA honorary chairman.

World's Fair Week To Honor Sweden

SEATTLE (AP)—Sweden Week opened Monday at the Seattle World's Fair.

Herman Kling, Sweden's minister of justice, was billed as the honor guest at an opening ceremony in the Plaza of States.

Gunnar Jarring, Swedish ambassador to the United States, was to introduce Kling.

A highlight of the week will be a series of performances by the Royal Dramatic Theater of Stockholm, opening its first United States tour.

The series will begin Monday night with a performance of "Miss Julie," by the 19th Century Swedish dramatist August Strindberg. "The Father," by Strindberg and "A Long Day's Journey into Night," by the late American playwright Eugene O'Neill, will also be presented. The troupe will play in New York later.

A cannon from the Swedish warship Vada, sunk in Stockholm Harbor in 1628 and recovered in 1960, was brought to Seattle to be fired by two men dressed in 17th Century military uniforms as part of Monday's ceremonies.

Sunday was Arkansas Day and Portland, Ore., Day at the fair. State Sen. Merrill Peterson, Dumas, Ark., represented Arkansas Gov. Orval Faubus. He noted that Faubus worked in the Washington state woods during the depression year of 1936 and has a sister, Mrs. Cressie Poole, in Brewster, Wash.

Mayor Terry Schrunk of Portland said Oregon tourism has increased 40 per cent in the first week of the fair. He said the Portland, Eugene and Grants Pass offices of Expo-Lodging, the fair's housing agency, reported heavy reservations.

Eisenhowers End Vacation

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and his wife, Mamie, ended their winter vacation in southern California's desert sunshine Sunday and left for the East aboard their private railroad car.

Well-tanned and sporting a grey Homburg, the former president chatted and signed autographs at the railroad station where about 300 well-wishers gathered to see them off.

Eisenhower indicated he would return to California next January.

"I'll see you all next January if I'm still healthful," he said in parting.

Mrs. Eisenhower expressed some reluctance in leaving the warm weather.

"My, this lovely sun. I hate to leave this beautiful place," she commented.

The Eisenhowers plan to travel to Abilene, Kan., for the dedication of the Eisenhower Library May 1. They will then go on to their Gettysburg, Pa., farm.

Oklahomans Vote Tuesday In Primary

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla. (AP)—Republicans and Democrats in Oklahoma will select nominees for governor, one U. S. Senate seat, Congress, the state legislature and state offices in primary elections Tuesday.

Henry Bellmon, a wheat farmer from Red Rock, is expected to win the Republican nomination for governor. Five major candidates seek the Democratic nomination.

Unless one candidate gets a majority, the two top vote getters in each race will meet in a runoff May 22.

Top contenders for the Democratic gubernatorial nominations are former Gov. Raymond Gary, Lt. Gov. George Night, State Sen. Fred Harris, W. P. Bill Atkinson of Midwest City and Preston Moore of Stillwater.

Gov. J. Howard Edmondson, a Democrat, cannot succeed himself under state law.

Sen. Mike Monroney is expected to win the Democratic nomination for a third term.

About 550,000 Oklahomans are expected to vote.

Strong Earthquake Hits Northern Japan

TOKYO (AP)—An earthquake rocked northern Japan Monday, creating panic and killing at least one woman.

Hardest hit was Sendai, about 150 miles north of Tokyo, where the quake shook concrete buildings and sent crowds in movie houses and department stores fleeing outside for safety.

A freight train approaching the city jumped the tracks and crippled rail service.

Alabama Expects Record Vote Turnout

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—Alabamans, perhaps in record numbers, will cast ballots in a Democratic primary Tuesday for a governor, one U. S. senator, and a host of other officials.

Voters also will take the first step in a unique plan to eliminate one of the state's nine congressmen—a cut made necessary by population changes.

Other officers to be nominated range from lieutenant governor to legislators and scores of lesser officers.

Voters also will elect a new state Democratic Executive Committee and settle the fate of eight constitutional amendments.

Keen interest in local and state races may attract a record number of voters. The record is 618,462 votes cast in the 1958 gubernatorial primary election.

Racial problems and the need for more money for schools keyed the governor's race. All candidates made strong pledges to maintain segregation and to find new revenue for public schools.

Santa Clara Meet Set

SANTA CLARA (AP)—A public meeting will be held next Monday night to discuss a serial levy to purchase equipment for the Santa Clara Volunteer Fire Dept.

Purchase of a fire truck and other equipment is proposed for the district which was organized in 1945 and began operation in 1946.

The proposed truck would replace one of the district's two trucks which is considered obsolete but could be retained as a reserve unit.

The meeting will be held at the grange hall at 8 p.m. standard, 9 p.m. daylight. Members of the fire board who will direct the meeting are James Blackford, chairman, Caryle Craig, George Hermack, Lynn Emerick and Henry Mortensen.

The plan to eliminate one of the state's nine U. S. House members calls for nomination of candidates from each of the present districts. The nine then will run statewide for the eight seats May 29. The candidate getting the least number of votes will be eliminated.

All nine incumbents in the House are seeking renomination in their present districts.

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
