Mother of the Year Honored in Salem

SALEM (U)—Oregon's Mother of the Year, Mrs. Bertha Hurlinger Kirsch, 72, Maupin, was honored Monday in ceremonies in the office of Gov. Mark Hatfield.

The governor presented Mrs. Kirsch a scroll and she replied that she felt "so humble and unworthy."

"I thank God for His help... and my understanding husband," she said. "To all the people of Oregon I give my true thanks."

Mrs. Hatfield, standing beside her husband, presented certificates of merit to other nominees for the honor. Mrs. Hatfield is the honorary chairman of the Oregon Mothers Committee.

Recipients included Cora Rathbun, Salem; Hazel Swift, Gresham; Lena Harrang, Sweet Home; Vivian Patterson, Warren; Godsey Harris, Enterprise; and Edith Strain, Portland.

Mrs. Kirsch has been a life long resident of Oregon. She was born and raised in the Willamette Valley.

Mrs. Clara McCracken, chairman of the Oregon Mothers' Selection Committee said standards for choosing the Oregon mother included success as evidenced by the achievements of her children; religious affiliation; traits of motherhood; exemplifying the golden rule and civic activity.

Mrs. Kirsch will go to New York City next week as Oregon's candidate for Mother of America.

GRANTS PASS (U)—Bloodhounds led searchers Monday to an elderly woman who vanished in a brushy, forested area near her home in southeastern Josephine County Sunday.

Mrs. Mary Brown, about 70, was in good condition.

Search for Mrs. Brown, wife of Clair Brown, was started Sunday by local residents after she was seen wandering and apparently confused near the edge of a farming community.

Youth Crushed

DAYTON (U)—Jack Richard Hallemann, 18, Dayton, was killed Sunday in a dairy farm accident about 15 miles north of Salem.

He apparently drove a tractor too high up a pile of manure, and tipped over backwards, crushing him.

Budget Approved

MEDFORD (U)—The Oregon Welfare Commission has approved a budget of \$45,904,673 for its 1963 fiscal year.

The commission made the approval at a regional meeting here. Representatives of seven counties attended the meeting.

Seattle Man Killed

BAKER (U)—Herman H. Saathoff, 34, Seattle, was killed in a one-car accident near here Saturday night. Saathoff died when the car plunged off State Highway 86 into an irrigation ditch. Two passengers, Clyde Betts, Halfway, Ore., and Loretta McBride, Baker, escaped serious injury.

Grave Robbers Hit Corvallis Cemetery

CORVALLIS (U)—Grave robbers Sunday night stole the bones of a man who died 44 years ago, the Benton County sheriff's office reported Monday.

Someone dug into the grave by candlelight and removed the bones from a rotted casket, Deputy Wayne Yates said.

The grave was that of a 51-year-old man. It was at the 100th Cemetery on a hill at the west edge of the city.

Oregonians Urged to Woo Fair Visitors

SALEM (U)—Gov. Mark Hatfield Monday asked a large crowd of labor, farm, business and civic leaders to go all out in selling Oregon this summer to tourists because of extra visitors expected due to the Seattle World's Fair.

He asked that airport, train and bus terminals follow the state's lead in painting green welcome mats in their facilities, that cities consider welcome signs on streets at city limits, and that a paint up, spruce up campaign be waged in every community.

The governor put emphasis on anti-litterbug drives and warned against such practices as price gouging.

Hatfield said Capitol guide tours will be expanded, that certain branch offices of state agencies have been schooled in tourism, and that another person is being added to the Oregon Highway Department's travel information division to coordinate the attraction of regional and national conventions in Oregon.

Other speakers included Glenn Jackson of Medford, chairman of the Highway Commission; Gerald Frank of Salem, chairman of Hatfield's Planning and Development Committee, and Art Kirkham, veteran Portland broadcaster and host in Oregon's official exhibit at the Seattle fair.

Portland to Host PTA Convention

PORTLAND (U)—Several thousand delegates are expected for the convention of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers here May 20-23.

The four-day meeting will include addresses, panel discussions, field conferences, and special group sessions on the varying needs of children.

Range Plan Wins Okay

SALEM (U)—Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., advised Gov. Mark Hatfield Monday that the Defense Department has approved the allocation of Navy facilities at Boardman.

The state wants the western half of the 100,000-acre Navy bombing range to make up part of its Boardman Space Age Industrial Park in Morrow County.

Morse said that an official announcement of the acceptance would come later from the Defense Department.

The state will pay the costs that will result when the Navy moves its facilities located on the western half to the eastern half.

The approval came although the state still must get title to a plane approach corridor that will jut out like a panhandle to the east of the bombing range.

The state will combine the western half with 50,000 acres it has acquired from private land owners and the Bureau of Land Management to lease to Boeing Co. for space-age research.

NATO Command

OSLO, Norway (U)—The North Atlantic Treaty Organization's new Baltic command headquarters at Karup in Jutland, Denmark, will be activated July 1, officials announced. Lt. Gen. Tage Andersen of Denmark will head the command.

Narcotics Seized Aboard British Cruiser

SAN FRANCISCO (U)—U. S. customs agents and British authorities investigated Tuesday an international smuggling ring responsible for millions of dollars worth of narcotics seized aboard the British cruiser HMS Belfast.

Disclosure of the seizure—estimated of its value ranged from \$2 million to \$6 million—was made Monday by Frank Long, chief U. S. customs agent. The attempt to smuggle 134 pounds of heroin and 26 pounds of opium into San Francisco was part "of a huge operation by an international smuggling ring," Long said.

The Belfast docked here Saturday on a goodwill visit. British consulate and Royal

Navy spokesmen announced the arrest of two Chinese crewmen in possession of the narcotics. Petty Officer Ah Lee Wong, 35, and Kan Ping Kwok, 27, civilian canteen helper, both of Hong Kong.

Some \$70,000 worth of undeclared jade and diamonds turned up in sugar and 16 other crewmen were restricted to the ship in that connection. Importation of the gems into American waters constitutes no violation of customs unless an attempt is made to land them.

Long indicated prosecution is a matter for the British since none of the contraband was landed in the United States and it was seized by the ship's officers on the high seas.

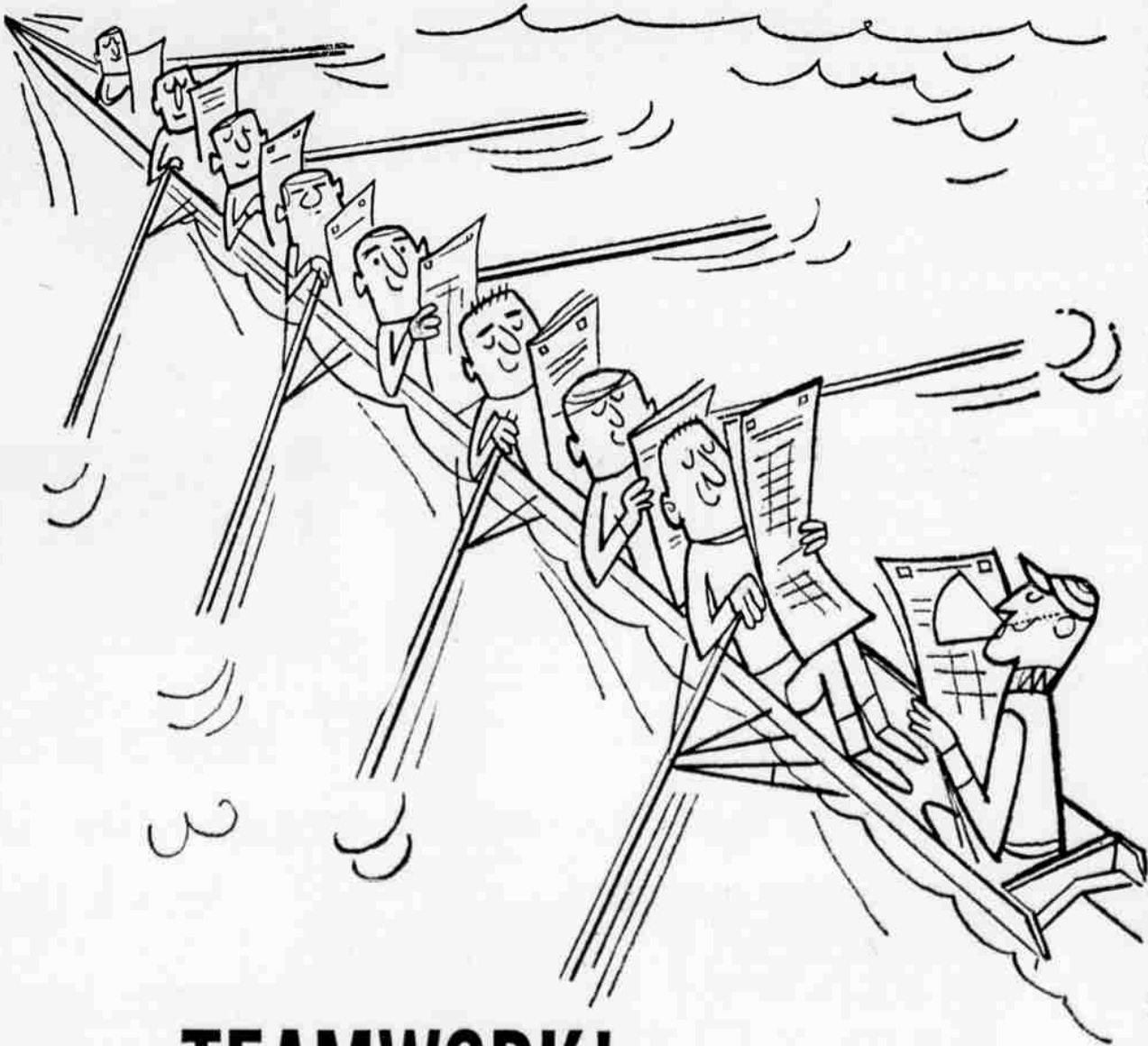
