Eugene Weavers Guild is congratulating its member, Dorothy (Mrs. Frank) Taylor, who was one of the four prize-winners in the textile division of the Northwest Craftsmen Show in the Henry Gallery of Seattle. The exhibit, which will remain on display until June 10, is sponsored by the University of Washington.

Mrs. Taylor, one of the "better" weavers of the Guild, according to its members, received one of the four \$50 awards for her showing of white material designed for a wedding gown. It was woven of rayon with taffeta and organza ribbons.

The exhibit was open to weavers of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and British Columbia.

Right on the heels of this, Dorothy received word that she had three pieces accepted—"Jured in" is the proper
