

Clay Pledges Troops to Stay

BERLIN (AP)—Gen. Lucius D. Clay made a farewell pledge Saturday that U.S. troops would stay in Berlin until the city and all Germany are unified, as long as Berliners want them.

Clay spoke—with a catch in his voice—at a ceremony conferring on him the city's honorary citizenship. He was the first foreigner to get the honor in this century, and the second one in history. His only predecessor was Czar Nicholas I of All the Russias.

"As our government talks with the Soviet government," Clay said, "and conceals its views with our Allies—including of course the German Federal Republic—to determine if there is a basis of negotiations, rumors of alleged misunderstandings between the Allies are certain to be aired."

"I urge you not to be concerned by them but to have confidence in us."

Even before Clay spoke, Mayor Willy Brandt had expressed confidence in President Kennedy.

Clay's reference to the German Federal Republic, inserted in his prepared text, was considered significant in Berlin. He is known to be against proposals on Berlin unless they are favored by the West German government. He and most West German leaders are particularly insistent on keeping U.S. troops in the isolated city as a guarantee of American concern with its fate.

Clay was to have left Berlin Sunday, and with it his post as Kennedy's personal ambassador in the divided city. He has delayed his departure until Tuesday in order to see Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, due in Berlin Monday for a two-day visit. (See story, Page 5A).

Spain Facing Labor Unrest In Provinces

Strike Fever Seems To Be Spreading

MADRID, Spain (AP)—Labor unrest appeared to be spreading Saturday in the wake of a government proclamation of a state of emergency in three northern provinces comprising an industrial heartland. At the same time, there was a student demonstration in Madrid to back striking coal miners.

Reports from Asturias Province, where around 20,000 miners have been on strike for a month in quest of more pay, said approximately a third of the striking miners had returned to work following the government action.

But in Bilbao, one of Spain's major industrial centers, strike fever seemed to be spreading to various major factories.

Gen. Francisco Franco Saturday ordered a state of emergency in the provinces of Asturias, Vizcaya and Guipuzcoa, all scenes of strikes large and small.

This decree suspended various sections of the Spanish Bill of Rights and gave government officials wide powers in dealing with disorders or disturbances, including a ban on the right of assembly and on the normal freedom from search and arrest. Strikes are illegal in Spain.

In Bilbao, a vital industrial center which produces a large share of Spanish products for export or internal consumption, strike talk or action was reported in several fields.

The Franco government action was not directed against the strikes themselves, as much as against the threat of some disorders or violence growing out of the strikes, officials insisted.

Judge Bars Phone Calls As Testimony

PORT ORCHARD, Wash. (AP)—The judge hearing the case of a doctor accused of trying to poison his wife ruled out Friday testimony of a long distance telephone operator by which the state had hoped to show romance as a motive.

Interception of a telephone message in detail would be illegal, Superior Court Judge Frank W. Ryan held.

Dr. Robert Boehme, 42, is charged with assault with intent to kill his wife, Dorothy, 35, by injecting poison in her arm in the guise of taking a blood sample.

Prosecutor Gordon Walgren told the jury the state would show the physician carried on a romance with Mary Boehme, 29, a pretty nurse who formerly was married to Dr. Boehme's brother.

The prosecutor said telephone calls, partly monitored by two Bremerton telephone operators, were placed between the doctor here and Mary in San Francisco in 1959. Walgren said one such call so alarmed the telephone operator that she informed authorities and an investigation ensued that led to Boehme's arrest.

In suppressing testimony of a telephone operator, Mrs. Mary Peterson of Bremerton, Wash., Judge Ryan said:

"When the telephone operator listened long enough to hear the message in detail, I think it constituted an interception."



What Now?

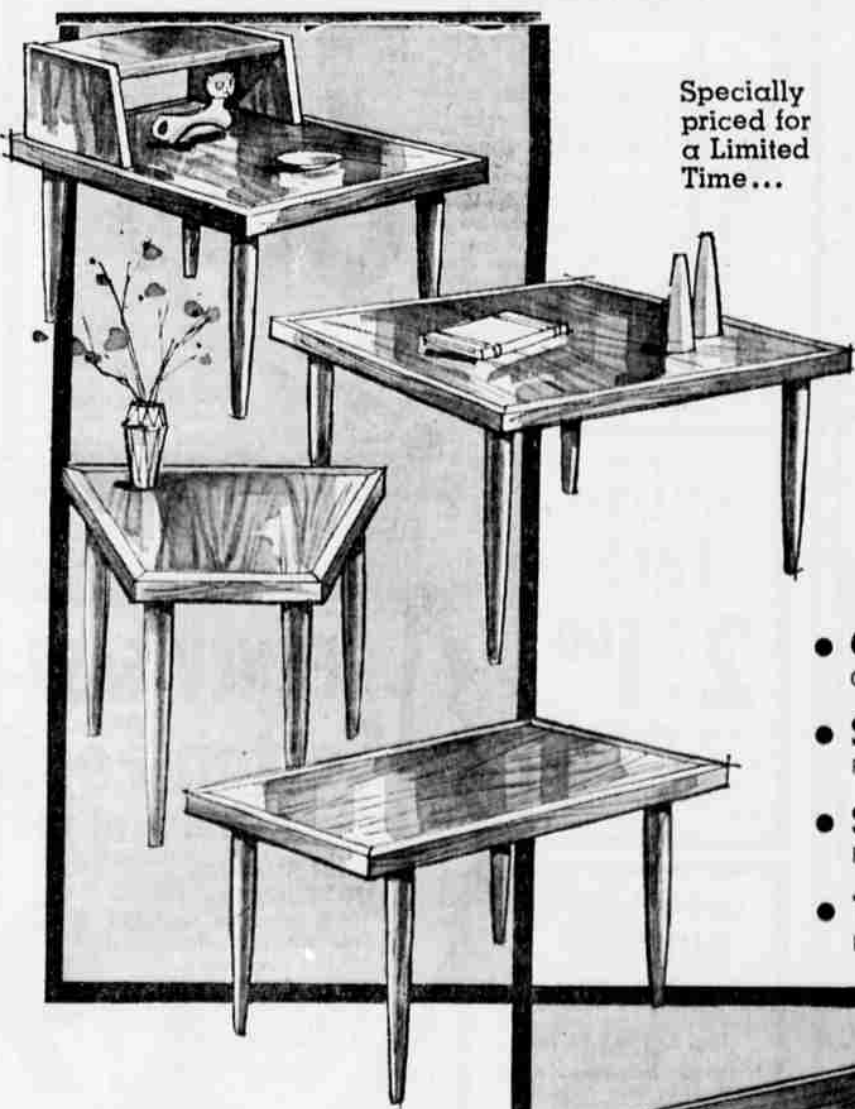

Fluoridation Fight Blamed for Fire

PRINEVILLE, Ore. (AP)—A controversy over fluoridation of water drew the blame Saturday for an explosion and fire that damaged the house of a newspaper editor.

Police said someone had poured volatile liquids—probably gasoline and oil—in the bedroom and living room and then touched them off in the home of Ron Swift, 25, editor of the weekly Central Oregonian Friday night.

Swift, who is not married, was not home at the time.

He said there had been two previous arson attempts and that he has received a number of threats because the newspaper has published articles on fluoridation.

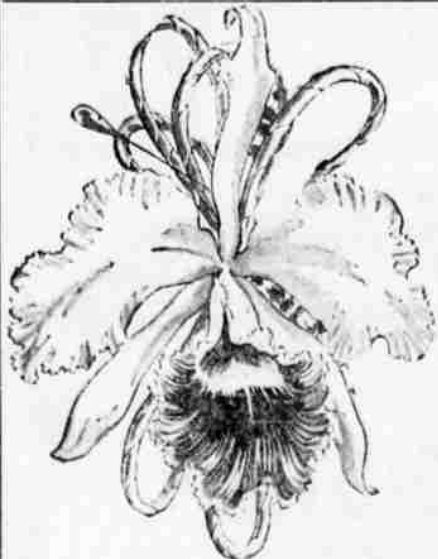
