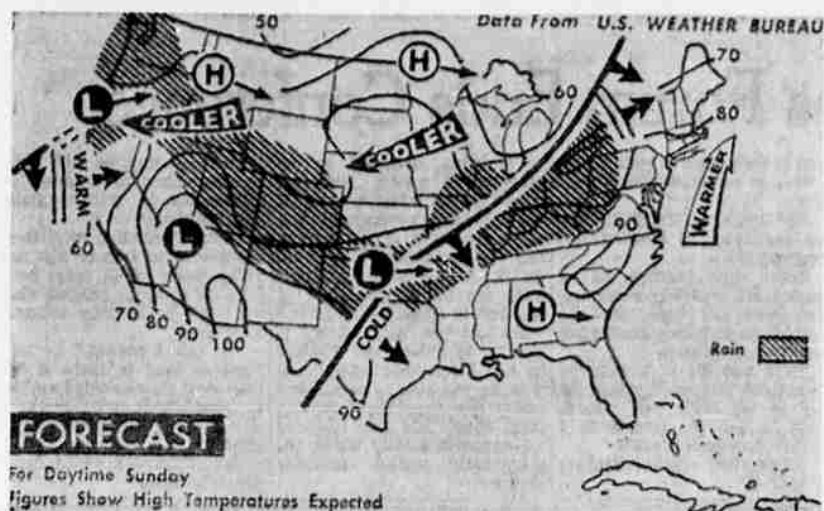




## Emerald Empire Weather

## Civil Rights Progress Outlined in Address

Progress—and lack of it—in civil rights in the United States since its founding was outlined Friday noon at the annual May Fellowship luncheon of Eugene Council of United Church Women by Mrs. Arthur Flemming.

Mrs. Flemming, wife of the University of Oregon president, speaking on the national theme for the observance, "One Family Under God," said that the United States has made progress in civil rights.

But, she said, "sometimes the lot of the colored citizens is not any better today than it was before the Civil War."

## Fair Hosts Space Confab This Week

A "non-technical report to the nation" on the U.S. space program will be given by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration this week.

It will be done in a three-day conference on the grounds of the Seattle World's Fair beginning Tuesday.

The official name of the event is "The Second National Conference on the Peaceful Uses of Space," and its program runs from the formidable (speeches by a host of federal space officials) to the gala (public appearances by U.S. astronauts).

James E. Webb, administrator of NASA, and Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson are scheduled to give major talks.

A half-page ad in the Wall Street Journal not long ago billed the conference not unlike a circus, enticing readers with a "star-studded program featuring a Who's Who roster of speakers . . . pioneers in space . . . and men who have gone over 100,000 feet above the Earth in balloons, X-15 planes, and Mercury capsules . . ."

Then—in 1954—the Supreme Court ruled "for the first time" that segregation in the public schools in this nation must stop. This, Mrs. Flemming noted, has only partially carried out in some areas, and no integration at all has been done in three states—Mississippi, Alabama and South Carolina.

However, in recent years, there has been "an awakening of citizens throughout the country to the fact of social change," she said.
