

Carpenters Requesting New Talks

Two Voting Units Reject Contract

PORTLAND (UPI)—A new contract for carpenters and pile-drivers in Oregon and Southwest Washington was rejected by two of the union's voting units Monday, and new talks appeared likely.

The Portland and Oregon carpenters units, containing most of the union membership, voted overwhelmingly to accept the contract, which was reached after a strike last month.

No Strike Authorization

But Southwest Washington carpenters and pile-drivers voted to reject it. A union spokesman said this meant rejection, since all units must accept a new contract.

Federal Mediator George Walker said the union has asked for renewed negotiations and employers are considering the request.

Southwest Washington, however, has not voted any strike authorization.

Portland and Oregon carpenters, many of whom struck last month, voted overwhelmingly to accept the contract. The proposal calls for a 20-cent wage and benefit increase each year.

Overtime Provision

The Southwest Washington carpenters objected to a provision calling for time and one half instead of double time for overtime on weekdays.

An employer spokesman said that if the double-time provision were applied to the three-year package offer it would mean an hourly wage rate of \$8.46 per hour for daily overtime in the third year of the contract.

The vote to reject in southwest Washington was by a 3-1 margin, an official said. Pile-drivers voted 85-33 to reject with one local not counted and incomplete figures in Portland showed 1,612 to 262 for acceptance. The Oregon State Council in Salem said the vote was 677 to 235 in favor with six locals to be counted.

Eugene Drivers Die In Two Car Plunges

Gerald James Shepard, 44, married with three children, and owner of a swimming pool firm, died Sunday in a car crash. He was driving a 1958 Buick Wildcat on Highway 20 about 11 miles east of Sweet Home.

Shepard's body was found in his submerged car in the South Santiam River about 3:30 p.m. daylight Monday. The vehicle had plunged off the twisting Highway 20 about 11 miles east of Sweet Home.

Shepard, owner of the Oasis Swimming Pool Co. in Eugene, had left home about 5:30 a.m. daylight Monday to go to Bend on business. Chuck Smith, Linn County Sheriff's deputy, said the car apparently went into the river about 7 a.m. daylight.

The car was spotted about noon daylight by a passing motorist. What caused it to veer off the highway and into the water, couldn't be determined, Smith said.

Decker's body was recovered about 2 p.m. daylight from Sodom Creek, a tributary of the Calapooya River, about five miles north of the Halsey interchange on the Pacific Freeway.

State police said his car had apparently veered out of the southbound lane of the freeway into the center strip, nosed over the embankment at the creek's edge and flipped into the water, between the twin freeway spans over the creek.

Decker, a former Lebanon area resident, was believed thrown from the vehicle. His body was found about 50 yards downstream. State police said the accident apparently happened either Sunday night or early Monday.

Overflow Crowd Hears Gus Hall

MADISON, Wis. (UPI)—National Communist leader Gus Hall, earlier permitted to speak in Oregon only after a stir, addressed an overflow crowd of students here Monday night on the University of Wisconsin campus.

A capacity crowd of 1,300 jammed the campus theater and 400 more stood in corridors.

Hall appeared on the Wisconsin campus only over protests from some groups in the state. His earlier appearances in Oregon created a similar fuss, but he was finally allowed to speak at several schools, including the University of Oregon.

In Wisconsin, Hall drew his only enthusiastic applause of the evening when he said a solution must be found to the arms race.

Voters Okay Recall Move In Beaverton

Many school districts over Oregon held elections Monday on budgets, support levies and other matters, and the voting in most was unusually heavy.

The biggest turnout was in Beaverton School District 48, west of Portland. Voters there recalled board members Dr. Vernon D. Hansen and Albert P. Jensen Jr., and approved a \$4,261,627 special levy for the 1962-63 year.

That amount is above the 6 per cent tax base limitation. The total tax for the rapidly growing district is \$7,231,500.

The unofficial count favoring the levy was 3,850-2,553. Hansen and Jensen, center of a bitter controversy stemming from their opposition to resigning school Supt. D. Herbert Armstrong, were recalled by substantial margins. It was 3,663-2,808 against Hansen; 3,510-2,922 against Jensen, the board's chairman.

Other results included: Lake Oswego voters approved, 1,655-448, a \$1,191,592 levy which will make their school district's next budget nearly \$2½ million.

Silverton voters for the third time turned down a reduced school levy that would have totaled \$254,450.

The Parkrose district approved, 809-405, a \$1,167,211 school budget levy.

The Gresham Union High School District approved, 205-55, a \$517,323 budget levy.

The Milwaukie Union High School District approved, 708-239, an \$826,569 budget levy.

Work to Begin Soon on \$35 Million Plant

International Paper Co. announced Tuesday morning that work will begin soon on a \$35 million pulp and paper plant and sawmill at a site in Gardiner.

The announcement was made at a press conference in Salem by Gov. Mark O. Hatfield.

The announcement dispelled any doubt that the company would build the plant, which eventually will employ 650 men in the Gardiner-Reedsport area. Richard C. Doane, chairman of the board of International Paper Co., said that the program will include a complete pulp and paper mill as well as a new sawmill.

Within Six Weeks

Construction should start within six weeks, the company said, and should be completed in 1964.

The pulp and paper mill will be located on a 125-acre site adjacent to the company's present sawmill and plywood plant and near the site of the new sawmill.

The plant will produce 100,000 tons per year of unbleached linerboard and corrugated products, as well as Kraft paper for grocery bags and sacks.

Peak employment could be 1,000 persons, Doane said. Hatfield praised the action as a "significant advancement in our state's economic picture."

"It is particularly important as a geographical diversification to bring a tremendous economic impact to southwestern Oregon," he said.

The new mill will process chips obtained from its own lumber and plywood mills in the state as well as from independent mills. Power will be

purchased from Bonneville Power Administration through the Central Lincoln People's Utility District.

Waste Discharge Allowed

The 1961 Legislature wrote new laws allowing the firm to discharge some of its waste into

the ocean and to take water from Siletcoos and Tahkenitch Lakes.

Dredging in the Umpqua River has been completed to provide fill for the mill site and preliminary work has been finished on dams in the outlets of the two lakes.

Although all this preliminary work had been going on, the company had never made a firm commitment that the plant would be built.

Polio Clinic Scheduled Wednesday

A make-up polio immunization clinic for Lane County residents who missed last week-end's clinics will be held Wednesday at Harris Hall adjacent to the Lane County Courthouse.

The hours for Wednesday's clinic will be 9 to 11:30 a.m. standard, 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. daylight, and 1:30 to 4 p.m. standard, 2:30 to 5 p.m. daylight. Plans for the make-up clinic made Monday evening by a steering committee of the Lane County Medical Society.

Committee members said no coupon books will be sold at Harris Hall. They said the make-up clinic is for persons who had purchased their coupon books but for one reason or another couldn't attend last week's clinics. Unsold coupon books are being recalled from drug store outlets.

A second clinic has been scheduled for June 23 at the same 11 locations as last week-end's clinics. This serum will provide protection against Type 1 polio — one of three strains. The initial dosage provides protection against Type 1 polio. A third clinic will be held in September.

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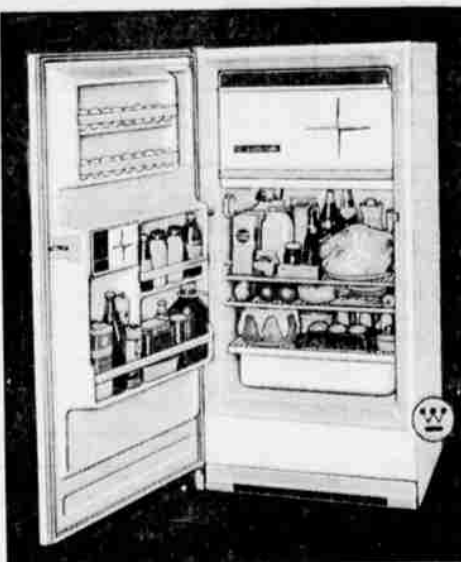
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
