Mike Rose Wins Honor

Mike Rose, the scrappy football guard from Grants Pass, was named the 1962 winner of the Emerald Athletic Award Saturday night at McArthur Court during the presentation ceremonies at the All-Campus sing.

Rose, a 188-pound English major who started his football career as a fullback and shifted to the line after in his collegiate career, was selected by a committee of faculty, students and general public as the outstanding senior on the basis of excellence in athletics, scholarship and citizenship.

The award, sponsored jointly by the Oregon Daily Emerald and the athletic department, was begun in 1951 and Rose was the 12th winner. Previous selections included Jack Keller, Jack Hutchins, Jim Livesay, Ron Lowell, Pete Williams, Lon Stiner, Phil McHugh, Jim Bailey, Whim Hastings, Dave Edstrom and Dave Grosz.

Rose averaged nearly a straight B for his four years of college work and played regularly his last two seasons despite the handicap of a bad shoulder which put him out of action in several games. In his sophomore year he played both left and right guard to help spell the only two experienced guards and his coaches rated his work as important in the Webfoot's 8-2 record.

In addition to his athletic and scholastic accomplishments, Rose was president of his fraternity and was considered one of the most effective presidents of the Order of the O in recent years.

Palmer Gets Lead Again

FORT WORTH, Tex. (U.P.)—Pennsylvania strongman Arnold Palmer fired a pressure-packed 66 Saturday and regained the lead after 54 holes in the \$40,400 Colonial national invitation golf tournament.

Already a five-time tournament winner this year, the sturdy belter shaved four shots off the rugged 72-yard par 70 course to register a three-round total of 205, five under par.

Three strokes back at 208 were Gary Player, a 70 shooter Saturday, and hard-core Australian Bruce Crampton, who took a double bogey six on the 18th green to wind up with a 67 for the day.

Player, the salty little swinger from South Africa, birdied the first two holes and at that point held a three-shot lead over Palmer. He also birdied the 11th but bogied at Nos. 7, 14 and 17 wiped out his lead.

Palmer, meanwhile, whittled off eight straight pars and then caught fire. He birdied No. 9 for a 34 and proceeded to notch birdies at 11, 12 and 17 for a 32.

Crampton had his moments of glory also, making the turn in two-under 33 and trimming three more strokes off par at the 11th, 13th and 16th.

His second shot on 18 landed in the water to the left of the green and cost him a penalty stroke. He chipped nicely to within five feet of the hole but then pulled his putt.

In '500' Qualifying

Barrier Broken By Parnelli Jones

INDIANAPOLIS (U.P.)—Parnelli Jones, king of the high-banked sprint car tracks, broke through the one-minute barrier at the old 2 1/2 mile Indianapolis Motor Speedway Saturday and won the pole position for the 46th 500-mile race with a record qualifying run of 150.370 miles an hour.

All four of his laps were under a minute and the best, 59.71 seconds, worked out to be a record 150.729 miles an hour.

Besides Jones in the three-car front row May 30 will be Roger Ward of Indianapolis, the 1959 winner, who qualified for his 11th start at 149.371, and young Bobby Marsham, Pottstown, Pa., who averaged 149.349 for the 10-mile test.

The two-year-old record qualifying average of 149.056, by Jim Hurtubise of Lennox, Calif., was bettered by five of the 19 drivers who qualified in Saturday's opening session. Hurtubise wrecked his car Friday but hopes to run next weekend.

Veteran Len Sutton, Portland, Ore., turned the 10 miles in 149.328 and A. J. Foyt Jr., Houston, Tex., last year's 500 winner, averaged 149.074.

The partial field, to be completed in trials Sunday and next weekend, averaged 147.769. The full 33-car field last year averaged 145.302.

Ten of Saturday's qualifiers were faster than Eddie Sachs' pole record of 147.481 last year. Sachs, of Coopersburg, Pa., hoped for a third straight pole victory but lost a wheel in a practice run.
