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Story Snaps College Mark

FRESNO, Calif. — Oregon State's Dale Story broke the national collegiate 5,000-meter record Saturday with a 14:03.5 clocking in the West Coast Relays.

Burly Named Most Valuable

FRESNO, Calif. — Oregon's star miler Dyrrol Burleson Saturday night for the second straight year was named the outstanding collegian in the West Coast Relays.

Burleson ran a 3:57.9 anchor lap as the University of Oregon four-mile relay team shattered the world record with a time of 16:08.9.

Burleson was presented the Shannon Award, a trophy he won last year when he anchored the four-mile relay team and the medley relay teams with times of 4:00.3 and 4:00.4.

Clark, formerly of San Jose State, was second Saturday in 14:06.1.

Other meet highlights:
• World record-holder Jay Silvester won the discus with a throw of 190 feet, 2 1/4 inches.

• Jack Yerman, former California star, ran the 440 in 46.8 with Oregon State's Bob Johnson second in 46.7.

• Southern California's Dallas Long got off a heave of 64.9% in winning the shot put. It was his best ever but short of Bill Nieder's world record of 65.7.

• Larry Stuart of Santa Ana Junior College got off a toss of 256.2 in the javelin, best in the country this season.

The meeting between the world's only two 16-foot pole vaulters, John Uelase and Dave Turk, failed to live up to expectation as neither could clear 15-8 after going over 15-2 1/2, the same as three other vaulters.

Stopping over here for the weekend, Snell said his only appearance would be at the Coliseum Relays in Los Angeles May 18. He then plans to return home.

Burleson is scheduled to compete next week end in the Far West championships at Eugene, Ore. He and his University of Oregon teammates bettered the world mark for the four-mile relay at the West Coast relays.

Burleson said afterward he was hoping to meet Snell in the mile at the California Relays in Modesto May 26.

"I'd like to run against Burleson and I challenge him now for the Coliseum Relays," Snell told newsmen, "but it looks like we won't be able to arrange it."

Snell's world mark for the mile is 3:54.4. Burleson's United States record is 3:57.6.

Bain made 5 and Post, on a "keeper," went 13 for first down on the 16. Post, on the same play off his right tackle, made 8 and Bain went the remainder of the way.
