

Two Groups Co-Sponsor Horse Show

Committee workers are deep in preparation for "Carrousel Americana," Northwest Charity Horse Show scheduled June 8, 9, and 10 at the Lane County Fairgrounds.

Inspired by last year's success, the event is being co-sponsored for the second year by the Eugene Hunt Club and the Eugene Welfare League.

In addition to four horse show performances, a style and champagne supper are planned as extra events. Guest performer at all of the horse show performances will be Slim Pickens, rodeo star and Hollywood actor, who has prepared a new formal horse show act.

Last year's show attracted some 300 entries and that many or more are anticipated this year. Entries close May 14, and should be submitted to Mrs. Gale Roberts, show secretary, Rt. 4, Box 44, Eugene.

The three-day event will be a formal point show for the American Horseman Assn., the Assn. of Hunt Clubs in Oregon, and the Oregon Horsemen's Assn.

Featuring 37 classes of entries, the show will include hunter and jumper events, five harness classes, three-gaited and five-gaited sections, Arabian horses, a parade division, a Roadster division, Tennessee Walking horses, an equitation division, Appaloosa horses, Shetland ponies, Hackney ponies, Welsh ponies, Morgan horses, and a registered Quarter Horse Western Pleasure class.

The chairman for this year's show are Arthur Kline, representing the Hunt Club, and Mrs. John Titus and Mrs. Robert Glass, representing the Welfare League.

The judge for all divisions will be Leonard W. Hook, of Mexico, Mo., well-known in this field in many parts of the country. Dr. William B. Anderson, of Portland, will serve as the American Horse Show Assn. steward, to interpret all rules and regulations.

Performance time will be 7 p.m. standard, 8 p.m. daylight on Friday and Saturday nights and 12:30 p.m. standard, 1:30 p.m. daylight for the Saturday and Sunday afternoon shows.

Saturday afternoon's performance will feature a special children's matinee act by Slim Pickens.

Reserved tickets for the horse show performances may be obtained by mail applications to Northwest Charity Horse Show, 2450 Charnelton St., Eugene. Admission will be \$2.25 and \$2.75 for evening performances, \$1 general admission for the Saturday matinee, and \$2.50 for the Sunday afternoon performance.

Following Friday's performance, the "Golden Gateway" will include a fashion show, dancing and cocktails. Tickets sell for \$3.25 per person.

Following Saturday's horse show, a gala champagne supper is planned with dancing until 2. Tickets, at \$6.50 per person, will be limited to 500 guests and must be ordered no later than May 25.

Scholarships Awarded at NCC

Darrel Crouter, a Northwest Christian College junior from Prosser, Wash., Thursday received a \$500 scholarship at NCC's annual Honor Day ceremonies.

Crouter's scholarship, the largest single award of the \$6,048 of scholarships given at the ceremonies, came from two sources. The Bond Scholarship Fund provided \$300, and the other \$200 was from the Ronald Coulter Lorimer Memorial Scholarship Fund.

Other large single awards presented Thursday included three \$405 scholarships. These scholarships went to Robert Chapman, a junior from North Kenzie Christian Church of Eugene; Harold Taylor, a senior from Ogden, Utah, and Donald D. Cole, a junior from The Dalles.

Chapman's scholarship included \$300 from the Lorimer Memorial Fund, and \$105 from the General Scholarship Fund. Both Taylor and Cole received alumni scholarships, providing full tuition for the coming school year.
