Circus to Invade McArthur Court

McArthur Court will be filled with wild animals, clowns, acrobats, tumblers, trapeze artists and other performers Tuesday and Wednesday when the Shrine Circus comes to Eugene for its 11th annual presentation.

Performances will be held at 3:30 and 7:15 p.m., standard; 4:30 and 8:15 p.m., daylight, on both days.

The circus, produced by the Polack Bros. and sponsored by the Eugene Shrine Club, will feature Pat Anthony, a wild animal trainer, who will put 17 lions and tigers through their paces.

Aerial acts will be presented by Miss Liane, a trapeze artist from Vienna; Billy Barton, who performs what he calls the

"giant cloud swing," and the Acrostyites, known for their ability to work at greater heights than most circus acts.

The Torelli Sisters and their mixed group of ponies, poodles and monkeys will present a small animal revue while Peggy and Mac McDonald will present the Bealou elephants, featuring Baby Kae.

Acrobatic skills will be provided by the Fredonias in an aerial tumbling routine while the Rassos, returning from a European tour, will present a cycle balancing act. A dozen other novelties will also be on the bill. There will be a large number of clowns to furnish the fun-making portions of the program.

Tickets, available at the J. C. Penney Co., are \$1.50 general admission, 75 cents for children under 12 years, \$2 and \$2.50 for reserved seats.

Budget Group To Meet Tuesday

Members of the Springfield Budget Committee will conduct a final meeting Tuesday morning to review the 1962-63 budget of the Springfield Utility Board's water and sewer departments.

The meeting will start at 7 standard, 8 daylight, at the Springfield library.

The committee had already completed its work on the city's 1962-63 budget, but under a new interpretation of the budget laws budget proposals of the utility board's water and sewer departments must also be reviewed.

Utility board members last week approved a water department budget totaling \$101,132 and a sewage disposal plant budget amounting to \$168,807. No tax revenues are involved in these totals.

Second Polio Clinic Coupon To Be Offered

What if a person missed both the first clinic and make-up clinic for the Sabin oral polio vaccine last week?

Dr. Loren Barlow, chairman of the Lane County Medical Society's health committee, has answered that the coupon books for obtaining the vaccine will be redistributed to various drug stores in the county prior to the second clinic, to be held June 2 and 3.

The books were called in after last weekend's first clinic.

Anyone who missed the first clinic should receive a dose of the Type 1 vaccine from his own private physician at some appropriate time—at least four weeks away from any future clinic which the person may attend, Dr. Barlow advised. The cost of receiving Sabin immunization from a private physician will be higher, he noted, because it involves only one dose and will not be included in the mass program which makes possible the lower costs.

What about "booster" doses of Sabin vaccine in the future? As far as the doctors know, Dr. Barlow said, booster doses are not being recommended.

A fact sheet issued prior to the immunization program said that Dr. Albert Sabin, who developed the Sabin vaccine, feels that boosters will not be required, assuming that the level of immunity in the community is kept up by private immunization of all infants or small children each year.

Although there will be a minimum of meetings for these candidates, the public will see a lot of them—on television. The campaigners have saved their fire and money for those TV paid spots.

Morse will vote in the College Crest precinct early Friday and then take the rest of the day off receiving visitors.

"Boy was that a lonesome place," Adair said at home.

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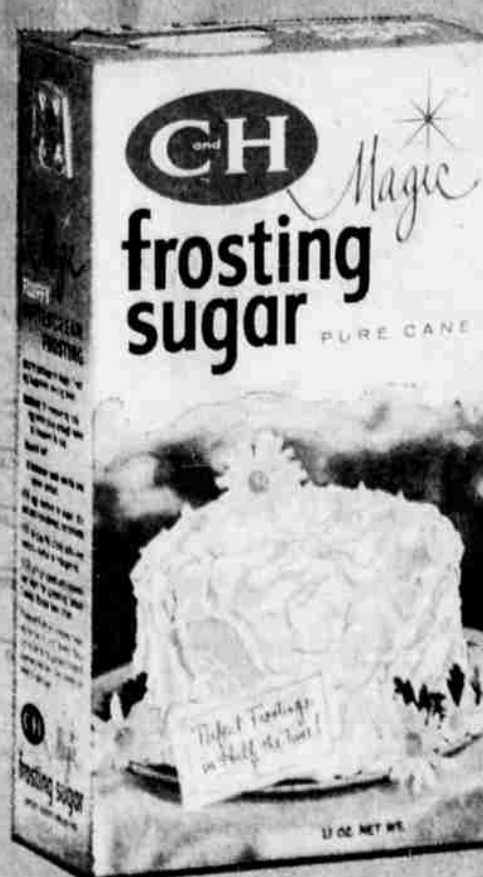

IRISH STEW!

1 1/2 lbs. beef
Salt
Paprika
Flour
3 tablespoons butter
1/4 cup sliced onions
1 1/2 cups diced potatoes
1/4 cup diced carrots
1/4 cup diced turnips
2 tablespoons flour
1/2 cup beef stock or stock substitute

Cut beef into 1 1/2" cubes. Season with salt and paprika; dredge with flour. Melt butter in pot; add beef and brown. Add onions and brown. Cover meat with boiling water, cover pot, reduce the heat and simmer meat for 1 1/2 hours.

Parboil potatoes for 5 minutes. Add carrots and turnips to the stew and simmer for 10 minutes. Drain potatoes, and add to stew ingredients; simmer for 20 minutes.

Dissolve flour in beef stock (or substitute) and stir into the stew, bringing to the boiling point.

Delicious served with dumplings or biscuits.

Makes 4 to 6 servings.

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
