



JOHN GOREY OF LONG BEACH Duffers Put Their Shots Into His Yard

Candidates Eye November Election

A long, hectic political campaign is in store for Oregon, with the general election six months away. Some of the candidates already are campaigning. Both parties have strong candidates for all major offices. Right now, it would be hard to predict the outcome. That situation always lends itself to a bitter campaign.

This is the lineup of candidates that the voters will find in the months ahead:

- U. S. Senate—Sen. Wayne L. Morse, Democrat who has served since 1944, faces a strong challenge by Sig Unander, former state treasurer who's an old hand at politics.

- Governor—Gov. Mark O. Hatfield, Republican who wants a second term and possible high national office, is opposed by Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton. Thornton won a victory by huge proportions in the primary.

- Congress, 1st Dist.—Republican Congressman Walter Norblad, who usually doesn't have to campaign much, might have to. R. Blaine Whipple, Tigard, displayed some good vote-getting ability in a district that approaches becoming Democratic.

- Congress, 2nd District—Democratic Rep. Al Ullman, Baker, might be in for trouble, too. He faces handsome Robert W. Chandler, Bend publisher, whose first political venture was to seek the GOP nomination which he won Friday.

- Congress, 3rd District—Rep. Edith Green, Portland Democrat, should have little trouble. Her opponent, Stanley E. Hartman, is a Portland druggist who is unknown politically.

- Congress, 4th District—Robert B. Duncan, Medford Democrat who has been speaker of the state House of Representatives, faces a battle from Carl Fisher, young Eugene radio station executive. The GOP's 2-2 break in Oregon congressional house seats is at stake.

The voters approved letting state legislators set their own salaries 233,207 to 172,521. They rejected changes in the six per cent limitation 255,317 to 135,874.

Portland Judge Arnold Denekew was nominated for the state Supreme Court 240,550 to 147,646 for Judge Lyle Wolf of Baker.

Incumbent State Tax Judge Peter Gunnar polled 262,359 votes to win the tax court position.

- Labor Commissioner—Norman Nilsen, Democrat, who now holds the office, faces Republicans in the 30-member upper house. Five Republicans and four Democrats won renomination, and three House members won Senate nominations.

- In the 60-member House, 20 Republicans and 21 Democrats were renominated. Six former members—three from each party—also won nomination.

The legislature might have more women than usual. Three of them were nominated for Senate seats and 11 for the House.

Two Portland House members lost—both Republicans. They are Gust Anderson, labor leader who is dean of the House with seven sessions; and Sam Wilderman, lawyer.

The legislative contests should be intense, as the race for control of the House is close. Democrats controlled the 1961 House 31-29. They control the Senate 20-10, and are a shoo-in to run the 1963 Senate, too.

Reapportionment claimed Sen. Francis W. Ziegler, R-Corvallis, as a victim. He lost to Sen. Walter Leth, R-Salem, their districts having been merged.

It will claim two more victims in November because of the same circumstance. Rep. Robert F. Smith, R-Burns, and Rep. Emil A. Stunz, D-Nyssa, will face each other.

So will Rep. Kessler Cannon, R-Bend, and Rep. Ben Evick, D-Madras.

Home With View Has Its Hazards

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP)—When John Gorey bought a home where two golf courses meet, he thought he was in a pretty fair way. Ever since, though, he's been getting teed off. "Every time I putter around

in the yard, a golf ball comes bounding over the fence," he sighs. "It's rough, no pun intended."

They didn't warn of the hazards before he moved in back in '59. "We were greenhorns out West," the ex-Chicago admits.

He liked the view. Out front was the 12th hole green of the city's 18-hole golf course. Out his bedroom window was the second green of its 9-hole course. Only a street lies between

But they didn't tell him about the duffers. Every hour or so one lofts a ball Gorey's way, sometimes half dozen or more in a day. He has trapped more than 300 in 2½ years.

The agents didn't say he'd spend half his time wondering if his big picture window would survive.

Nor that kids—some in their 20s—would tramp through his bushes at odd hours hunting stray balls they could sell.

"I don't mind a bona fide golfer so much," the engineering firm executive mutters. "I'll even help him look. But these other..."

Gorey found how to turn a handicap to advantage. "I send the best balls back to the company brass in Chicago."

He brightens at the thought. "Some balls are brand new," he brags.

Twelve dozen balls from the Gorey rough are bouncing and rolling around Chicago fairways even now. That's better than par, Gorey feels.

"I'm no golfer myself," he admits. "But my, how they bounce coming across the street."

Consolidation Move Loses

A consolidation measure that would have made Coos Bay Oregon's fourth or fifth largest city was defeated at the primary election, because North Bend rejected the idea by only 16 votes.

A recount is expected. Under the proposal, Coos Bay, North Bend, Empire, Eastside and a large unincorporated area would have merged. All but North Bend voted for it.

Coos Bay approved the proposal 1,969 to 205; Empire 649 to 156; Eastside 303 to 97, and the unincorporated area 721 to 334.

The vote against it in North Bend was 1,278 to 1,260. In 1948, North Bend killed a proposal to merge with Coos Bay.

The proposed new city would have about 25,000 population.
